



Dear Mr. Graham-

I must again approach you concerning more room in the barn. It is evident that the Dept. does not see our real need in regard to isolation and extention. While we shall in the new building have some relief in isolation it will not by any means take ~~of~~ it all nor will it take care of development. The present barn room is all taken up and we do not now know what to do with the calves which are now arriving. The present stalls are all taken up with fresh cows and only this morning a cow freshened and should be for a time in isolation but she has to be kept in the stauntions in the main barn.

To offset this condition I have already advocated the conversion of the horse-barn into pens to be used as freshening stalls and also to be used for milk testing purposes. If we are going to make anything of the dairy we must be in a position to properly test in order that our cows may go on record and also to be in ~~aposition~~ to weed out individual boarders.

We are just in the position now where ~~with~~ a little additional expenditure will place us in a state of advance whereas if we are to be tied up for some time it will ^{mean} a heart rending start ~~still~~. We have never used the horse-barn and it does seem as though it is still to remain so, when it could be utilized to such great advantage at the present time.

As you know I have spent no end of time and energy to place the dairy on the present footing and I do not want to see things go to the wall. The cost of these stalls and the conversion of the horse barn would entail an expenditure of four hundred dollars together with the present proposed building which I think can be erected for about eight hundred dollars instead of one thousand, as I intend doing a great deal of the work with our own help.

To say the least there is no encouragement in having a forced tie-up but if the above arrangement is not allowed I can only say that I shall be at a loss to know what to do.

There is also another item which would be well considered at this time. The present pipe line to the barn is in bad shape owing to the fact that the pipe put in was not of high enough pressure. This line should either be lifted and replaced with seventy pound pressure pipe at an approximate cost of \$600.00 or a reservoir tank built to reduce the pressure to fifty pounds at a cost of about \$75.00. This would still leave us ample pressure and while the concrete mixer is here it could be installed and with a few extra lengths of pipe the line could be made right.

It would also take care of the surplus water now running away and which could be utilised to great advantage during the summer months for irrigation purposes.

I am as you see out to save the unnecessary expense. I do not know who was at fault in the beginning never-the-less the line must now be repaired and could now be done at a very reduced cost.

Regarding the former let me ask that there be no tie up if at all possible. The extra room will mean so much and it undoubtedly will save the Dept. money in six months time. With cows freshening the dairy herd should be kept up to its greatest capacity. This can only be done by giving us the added room, which will allow scientific handling, and at no cost to the School or Dept.

I have your letter of January 7th, confirm-
your nightletter of the 5th inst., authorizing the Reverend
Principal of St. George's School to go ahead with the isolat-
ion barn in connection with the present building, and asking
for prices on materials, and for timesheets to be kept.

Your letter goes on the explain that you want
a rough sketch showing the work that it to be undertaken im-
mediately, and a detailed estimate of the cost.

I might say that I showed the Reverend Principal
this letter, and he has written a letter which I am enclosing
explaining his views on the whole matter. I am also enclos-
ing a rough sketch showing the new addition that he proposes
to build. The Reverend Principal points out in his letter
that he wanted to change things around generally, so as to
make the barn efficient for future use, and also to have the
new addition used as an isolation building when there is need
of it. His application for \$1000.00, he figured, would
cover all these changes and improvements, which are as follows:
The present horse portion of the barn to be turned into calf
and breeding pens, and the present calf pens to be used for
eight stanchions; the new addition to be used for isolation
at the present time, and eventually to be turned into calf
pens which will be available for isolation at any future
date if needed, and a storage loft to be put in the upper
part of the new addition, as they have no storeroom at pre-
sent, and are using a portion of the pig pen for this, which
is badly needed now for the increasing number of pigs.

The Reverend Principal also points out that
the water pressure on the existing pipes is too great, and
suggests building a reservoir at a lower level to take away
the high pressure, which could be done for about \$75.00,
whilst the mixer was on the ground.

The new stanchions and pens will cost approxi-
mately \$250.00, alterations in present barn \$150.00, new
addition about \$535.00. These, of course, do not include
considerable labor that the school will provide, but for
material and experienced labor.


If the Reverend principal is given authority
to spend \$1000.00, I think he can put the barn into good
shape to handle the requirements. As we have no time
sheets please forward a supply.

Trusting the Department will give this matter
favorable consideration and will authorize me by wire whether
we are to go ahead on these lines,

The unit proposed for last year is O.K. as it is now ~~MEM~~ excepting that there should be a door on the boys side for entrance with milk, meat, vegetables, ect,

It is my aim to keep the two play grounds as separate as it is possible hence my reason for asking for the changes. As you stated when I saw you in Ottawa, it is easier to alter the plans than to alter the building. With the changes marked if satisfactory to you I feel sure that the first set of plans you get out will stand.

I am also enclosing with plans comments on changes asked for, and reasons.

I feel that it will reduce supervision to a minimum and make work easier on the whole.

I trust that you will have patience with me in what I have asked for and all of it will meet with your approval.

COMMENTS ON CHANGES ASKED FOR AND MARKED IN
RED INK

action proposed last year is O.K. as it stands with door as marked. Entrance on boys side for bringing in supplies as roothouses meat-shop, Dairy act is on this side of the school building.

GROUND FLOOR-

One office only, enlarged two feet. Matrons office not required. ~~Matrons~~ Matrons bedroom and remaining part of Matrons office made into Class room for white children As we wish to change sexes to opposite side of building Change classroom as indicated, sewing-room on girls side and equipped with cupboards extending to ceiling large enough to hold weekly change of clothing and surplus stock.

All Class rooms equipped with cupboards to hold school supplies.

Boys study room changed to opposite side, staff bedroom and bath-room in its place.

Residence as it stands in present plan. Do not change to ~~by~~ to boys side

BASEMENT PLAN

Door from passage to staff dining room. Built in buffet in staff dining-room. Position left to your discretion Girls dressing-room between recreation-room and lavatory This room to be used as dressing room night and morning and wherein can be hung up night cloths in the day time and day cloths in the night. This applies on both boys and girls sides. Partition may be half high with wire netting to ceiling. One Matron could with this arrangement supervise the washing, dressing, and play-room. Drinking fountains as indicated on both sides.

More bathtubs and showers on both sides.

Garage in residence basement if possible. This would be most convenient. and we do not need the full basement for other purposes.

Residence ground floor with no hall. Folding doors in partition between living room and dining room so that if necessary both can be used for reception room. Small vestibule at entrance.

Extra window in dining room as this window would look out onto the Fraser and the mountains

Double veranda upper part to be used as sleeping porch with door from upstairs onto same.

I am returning as you sent them critising and marking only one sheet as I have a full set of plans which you forwarded me one year and a half ago.

The changes asked for are to reduce supervision. By having the girls and boys absolutely separate I feel that it will take away great difficulties of discipline.

I have not touched the ~~plans~~ plans of the unit got out by you last year on these main plans but on the plans of the one unit marked the necessary door. The remainder to stand as it is.




You will doubtless hear of the following, but in case you do not, I think it is my duty in the interests of the Indian Residential School at Lytton, to report the following:

On Wednesday, the 9th inst., the boiler at the School burst, and the entire school was without any heat. This was a very bad state of affairs right in the middle of the cold weather and meant great discomfort to all. No school rooms could be opened and there was no water for the toilets, and the children were shivering around a few stoves, which said stoves, to my mind, are dangerous to use in such an awful, old building.

I sent down some fire clay from here for repairs, and temporary repairs have been made. Rev. Mr. Lett informs me he does not know how they will get the boiler repaired. It is out of date anyway, but something will have to be done to it if they have to stay in the old building for another winter.

I hope, therefore, that the Department will be able to get the money to start part of the new school anyway, as you know it is most urgently needed.



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

Dear Mr. Paget:

Trust Fund Cheque No. 958 of April 21, 1926 for \$200 was issued to Rev. H. R. Lett as an advance to cover the cost of erecting a fence at the Lytton Industrial School. Up to the present this office has received no accounts to support this advance.

The School referred to above is supported by Grants from the New England Co. and for that reason the impression seems to prevail in your department that the expenditures from the grants should not be subject to government audit.

It appears to me that as soon as this money is paid into the Trust Fund it becomes part of that Fund, bearing interest as such, and therefore payments made from this account must be treated the same as all expenditures made from the Indian Trust Fund.

Vouchers in connection with the Lytton Industrial School have been received in this office covering all payments with the exception of the advance to Mr. Lett. I can see no reason why the advance should not be accounted for, and I should like to have your opinion on this point.
