These two girls have passed the B.C. Provincial tests for Grade VIII, and are now ready to begin their work for Grade IX. However, both of them have just passed their sixteenth birthdays and are thus eligible for discharge.

Since both girls, with their parents' consent, wish to continue with their education, I hereby make application to the Indian Department for the necessary permission to allow these pupils to remain in school.

It is my opinion, and that of their other teachers, that both girls are worthy and capable of doing high school work. Since there are only two of them, they will take the Correspondence Course from the B.C. Dept. of Education in Victoria, under the supervision of the Sisters at this school.
