Reverend Sir:

The following is an extract from the annual report of Mr. P. B. Ashbridge, Indian Agent for the West Coast Agency:

"Due to existing conditions on the Coast making it imperative that Indians seek other than their natural source of livelihood, it is respectfully recommended that manual training and domestic science be conducted on more practical lines. At present the girls are taught fancy sewing and are employed in kitchens, both admirable in their way, but they should be taught how to make fishing nets and the operation of canning machinery, also how to wash without the aid of electric washing machines, and the baking of bread without electric bakeries. They should also be taught simple home nursing, hygiene, and kindred subjects.

"Boys should be taught practical boat building and operation of marine engines. These Indians are natural mechanics and could very easily be taught under a competent instructor. Every year these Indians lose hundreds of dollars owing to shipping furs not properly prepared, and this art could be taught to advantage."

As you have a number of Indians from the Coast in your school I am bringing Mr. Ashbridge's suggestions to your attention. I expect that you will give these your careful consideration as their adoption would result in the pupils receiving the practical training that they require.

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



Dear Mr. Hoey:

I have your letter of May 2nd in which there are quotations from the report of Mr. P.B. Ashbridge, Indian Agent for the West Coast, with regard to Manual Training, etc. for Indian children.

In reply I beg to say that we are endeavouring to bring Coqualeetza School more and more in line with the wishes of the Department, and I fancy we are having fairly good success along lines which will be of assistance to the graduates of this School in later life. Some fancy sewing is of course taught the girls, but we are laying more and more stress on making their own clothes. The carding, spinning of wool in preparation for knitting and weaving articles of clothing is taught. They are taught to use native dyes from hemlock bark, alder bark and onion skin, etc. We have what we call a Home Economics Kitchen a separate unit from the main Student Kitchen. Here the girls are taught to plan, prepare and serve a meal similar to one that would be served in the ordinary home. I may say that all our girls use the wash tub. We have no electric washing machines or electric bakeries. We also have a Home Nursing Class which is under the care of our School Nurse, who is a graduate Registered Nurse. Here the girls are taught Home Nursing, Hygiene, etc. In addition, our Senior girls are detailed to the Prentorium where they learn to take care of the dishes of sick persons. These are washed separately. We use different colored dish pans, different colored dish cloths, and in every way try to impress upon them the need for keeping such dishes separate. The girls also get training in the taking of temperatures and the preparing of meals for the sick, although we do not of course allow them to do any nursing where they would come into close contact with tubercular cases.

Our boys are getting a very fine training in Boat Building. We built two 35 foot boats last year, and we are completing a second one this year, 33 feet in length. I am enclosing a copy of the specifications and materials used for this boat. This is a boat similar to the ones used on the inside waters. Next year, all being well, we may build a 38 footer, which will be of heavier construction suitable for the off-shore fishing in which our Queen Charlotte Island Indians engage. I am thoroughly conversant with both these types of boats. For fifteen years I was on the Coast in inland waters in Mission work, and for four years I was stationed at Queen Charlotte in the Marine Mission Work. I have just returned from a trip to the Islands and other points up the Coast in the endeavour to bring the School into closer touch with the people, to keep

in touch with graduates and in every way help to make the influence of the School more effectual and permanent. While in Skidegate, I saw Vernon and Clifford Jones rebuilding an old hull. Both these boys had been trained in our Boat Building Shop. They secured this 36 foot hull which had been in disuse for a good while, put in a new keel, some new timbers, raised the deck combing, laid on some new planking and recaulked the whole hull. They were also putting a new forefoot on her, and had secured an engine which they were installing without any other assistance than that of their father. The father was greatly delighted, and thanked me for the help we had given these boys. It just means that they will have become independent. It was very encouraging to me, and I would like to thank the Department sincerely for the assistance which they have given us in making this training possible.

Our Manual Training classes are this year being conducted on much more practical lines. It will likely result in a somewhat less spectacular exhibit, but I am quite sure that the boys will have gained greatly in knowledge that will be of practical use. Over a year ago I thought of the making and repairing of Fish Nets, and I had a young Cape Mudge fisherman under promise to come and give the boys training along that line. He was also going to show them how to rig up trolling outfits and give them some idea of how to use such gear at different depths and at different seasons of the year. However, he failed me, but I have it in mind for another year. I have myself conducted a Junior and Senior class in Navigation and Seamanship throughout the year. I have several senior boys going out this year to work on Seine boats, and I am quite sure the knowledge they have gained will be of great use. They are taught "The Rule of the Road at Sea", Compass and Chart work, some knowledge of the buoyage system, the laying of courses, and practical suggestions in seamanship are given. The Department of Marine is tightening regulations all the time, and these young men will need not only to have local knowledge in the future, but knowledge such as I have indicated above which will make it safe for them to take their vessels into strange Coast waters. The traffic in such waters is increasing all the time.

I trust that you will see from this that we are endeavouring to cooperate with the Department in every way to give the pupils a training which will best suit them for after school life. I would say that about 75% of the pupils of this School make their living from the sea or from Coast industries. I trust that you will be reassured, and feel that the grants paid by the Department to this School are being expended to the best of our ability to produce results in harmony with the aims of yourself and other officers in charge.

At the same time, if there should be any criticism of the size of boats built at Coqualeetza, I trust that my twenty years experience and my practical knowledge of what is needed, together with the fact that we have a thoroughly capable Boat Builder in charge, will be given due consideration. When we first began, there was a disposition on Inspector Barry's part to want us to build a 24 or 25 foot boat for fishing purposes. A boat this size would be simply worse than useless in the areas from which most of our pupils come. It might do on the Fraser River, but in Northern waters it would be hopeless. I should have said that we build from two to four Row Boats each year, using both the Carvel and Clinker built types. The entire programme of Boat Building however, is kept upon an instruction basis and not a production one.

Dear Mr Hoey:

For some time now, I have been thinking of writing you with regard to some assistance to one of our Graduates, Joseph Edgar of Clo'oose, on the West Coast of Vancouver Island. This lad was a member of our Boat Building Class for the last -more than two years. Last Fall, Mr Huddleston, our Boat Builder, thought it would be a good thing for each of his six boys to make a Model of a fishing boat; then I was to act as judge, and the best Model would be used as a pattern for a boat.

Each boy made a Model, and then I examined each one. There was not very much difference between most of them, but the one made by Joseph I chose because the lines were a bit better than those of any of the others. Of course I did not know who had made it. Mr Huddleston concurred in my judgement, but suggested one or two minor changes that would be an improvement.

Well, that was the boat which you saw when you made your visit last June.

I have had a letter from Joseph and one from his father, and they are both very anxious to have this boat. The father says, "in order to give my two boys a chance to make a few dollars". I know they need a new boat, and the fishing grounds they frequent—right out on the open pacific, demand the best. I have been holding the boat at Four Hundred Dollars, as this would only give us the cost of materials, and allow a balance for replacement of tools and equipment etc. The Department gave us the money to get materials for our first boat, and then we sell, and re-imburse the School, and get more materials. This we must do in this case.

Joseph offers Two Hundred Dollars down, and the balance next year. It is a big order for him, and I have wondered if it would not be possible for the Department to make him a grant of One Hundred Dollars toward this boat. It is not more, perhaps, than they do for Graduates in other parts, and it would certainly be a great inspiration to this lad, and to others, for I would like to see other boys build their own boats. As I have said, this lad designed this boat, and worked on it right from start to finish, and I know it would do a lot to create a right sort of pride—that of craftsmanship—if it were made possible for him to secure it for his very own. I trust that you will give this request your earnest consideration, and if at all possible make a grant to this lad which will enable him to get this boat. I am quite sure that four hundred dollars is a big order for him. One the other had we can easily sell the boat for Four Hundred as it is a fine seaworthy craft, but the more I think of it, the more I feel that a Hundred dollars invested in this lad would bring dividends in character and accomplishment in the years to come.

I am in receipt of your letter of the 24th ultimo with reference to the boat that was built by the boat building class of the Coqualeetza Residential School last year.



Very careful consideration has been given to your suggestion but present regulations would not permit our making a grant in the manner that you recommend.

However, the Department would be prepared to purchase materials for the boat building class at a cost not exceeding \$100.00. This amount would be over and above any other purchases that we might be making for the Coqualeetza School. In this event you would accept \$100.00 from Edgar this year and in addition would receive materials costing \$100.00 from the Department. By handling the matter in this way we will not subject ourselves to any criticism from the Auditing Branch. You should, therefore, purchase material for the boat building class at a cost of \$100.00 and forward certified accounts in triplicate.


