

Whitehorse Indian School  
Manual Training:

With Mr. Supt. Meek I viewed the room suggested for manual training. I think the Supervisor of Vocational training would be satisfied with its physical features.

The proposal is that the Territory move in some equipment and that the Indian Affairs Branch supply the additional hand-tools needed. As the Territory hopes to set up its own establishment some day and would likely want some of its property returned, careful inventories will have to be kept.

In a discussion with the high school principal I learned that all local officials concerned were in favour of an arrangement whereby the public school would have the use of the room daily from one to three o'clock in the afternoon, and that the Indian school class would be conducted on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays from three to five o'clock. I suppose that the Indian boys might be allowed in at other times under supervision (by someone other than the instructor).

It was stated that the Instructor, Mr. Donald Armour, could be obtained for \$100 a month, but I offered the opinion that, in view of his probable grading by our rules, \$75 is a more appropriate figure. He will average about twenty-five hours a month. Besides, the art teacher, Miss Farley, will average thirty-nine hours a month for a salary of \$100, and her qualifications in her field appear to be superior to Mr. Armour's in his.

(a) Manual Training.

We have noted Major Clark's report of November 11 with a recommendation that we establish a manual training shop at Whitehorse. I am not quite clear as to whether this will be a joint enterprise but gather that it is. If so, why are the Indian school boys to be taught from 3 to 5 while the white children attend from 1 to 3. As it is an Indian school (?) why should not the Indian children attend at the best time.

I am aware of the plans to erect a large school at Whitehorse and wonder whether we could not have our Indian children sent to this public school as we are doing elsewhere across the country. I of course am not aware of local feeling but as other school boards are admitting more and more Indian children, I wonder whether the time is ripe for such a suggestion at Whitehorse.

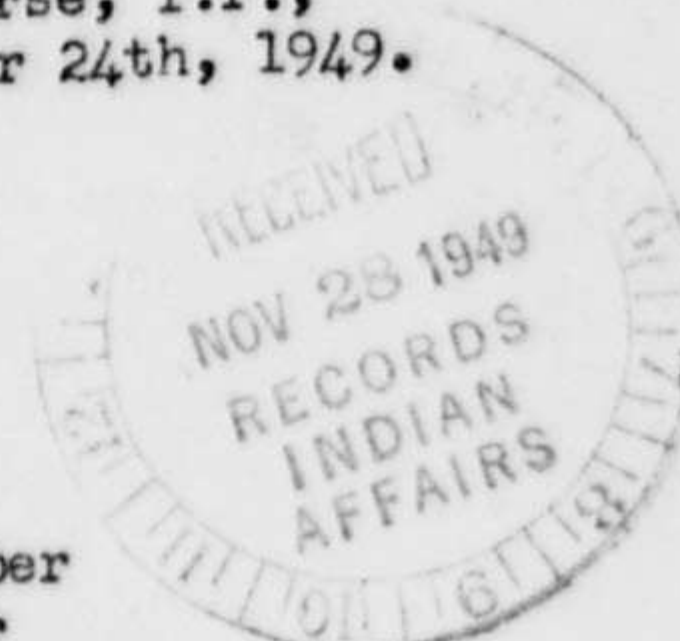

Whitehorse Indian Day School

Reference your letter of 18th instant, file 929-11 (E), and Manual Training. The establishment of a manual training shop at the above school will be a joint enterprise between this Branch and the Yukon Territorial Government insofar as the same teacher will be used under two different arrangements, and the same shop will be used. It is also likely that some tools will be used jointly by the different institutions, but as the Territorial School already has a moderate supply of tools, and as this Branch will obtain tools independently, it is not a joint enterprise in the full sense of the word.

The reason the Indian school boys will be taught between 3 and 5 PM is because the three teachers of the Indian school requested it. The average age of Indian children is considerably above the corresponding grade at the Territorial School, consequently our own teachers do not wish to lose a minute of teaching time. Also as almost all the boys are boarding at the school, there is not a great deal for them to do after school during the winter months when it gets dark so early.

Regarding your second paragraph: the Yukon School Ordinance does not discriminate against Indians, but the several times Indian children were placed in Territorial Schools it ended as a fiasco. A case as recent as 1947 happened at Mayo. Neither the administration nor the teachers would discourage admitting Indians to Territorial Schools, it is always a few parents who raise a violent objection. Regardless of this, I believe the time is at hand when the suggestion of admitting senior grade Indian pupils into Territorial Schools should be made. Most of the Indian children would have to be maintained at some institution, as the parents live away from Whitehorse.

We are in receipt of your letter of November 24th in connection with the arrangements that you can make with the Yukon Territorial Government for manual training instruction at the above school.

We have also received a letter from Mr. C.A.F. Clark, our Educational Survey Officer, regarding the same matter, and we are prepared to allow the teacher that is being employed \$75.00 a month. Mr. Clark understood that the teacher would give approximately 25 hours instruction a month to the Indian children. If he is prepared to accept this amount, you can make complete arrangements with him and you can forward a monthly Voucher for the amount that we have agreed to allow.

You may also purchase expendable material to an amount of \$90.00.

A requisition should be forwarded for the tools that you consider are needed.

Reference your letter of 15th instant, file 949-11 (E1) and the matter of manual training instruction at the above school. I have seen Mr. Donald Armour who is agreeable to a salary of \$75.00 a month for approximately 25 hours teaching time to pupils of the above school.

These arrangements have been given to Yukon Territory officials. Mr. G. Bidlake, Territorial Agent, Whitehorse, informs me the following telegram has been received by him:

"Commissioner authorizes removal of tools and material to Lee's school stop Details regarding sharing of expense with Indian Affairs Branch can be arranged later."

Mr. Hullah is at Dawson and is fully conversant with all aspects of this arrangement. Work has already been started on the new manual training room. Mr. Armour is doing most of the alterations himself in the building owned by Rev. H.I. Lee. He estimates cost of new materials, lumber, nails, alterations to lights, etc., a maximum cost of \$400.00. Is it in order for Indian Affairs Branch to pay 50 per cent. of the total cost of alterations desired by Mr. Armour.



Progress has been made in the installation of a manual training room at the Whitehorse Indian School. During the Christmas holidays, Mr. Armour, the manual training instructor, brought over from the Territorial School, benches, tools, and equipment including a few power tools, in readiness for the reopening of school after the holidays. At the request of our day school teachers, the Indian pupils are to receive manual training from 3:15 PM to 5 PM three days per week. This tends to upset the day school schedule much less than if such training were given at the expense of day school time.

Manual Training

Mr. Donald Armour, manual training instructor for Whitehorse Indian School, has been to see me this morning concerning the programme laid down by Training Division for the manual training course.

It is Mr. Armour's opinion that the Basic Operations required in Woodwork are too advanced for the average elementary school pupil, Indian or white. Some of the requirements in the list for Third Year seem very advanced indeed and would be a challenge for adult minds.

Mr. Armour has requested permission to use the programme laid down by Territorial school officials until our own requirements are brought more into keeping with the abilities of the pupils.

I am not certain if you require a list of all pupils given instruction who are attending the Whitehorse Indian School. As you are aware, a number of half-breed children, the responsibility and charge of the Yukon Territory, are in attendance at the Whitehorse Indian School, and are taught in our classrooms. Do you wish a record kept by the manual training instructor of these children of non-Indian status?

Your comments regarding Mr. Armour's views on the Manual Training curriculum would be appreciated.
