Dear Sir: Re: Engine at St. Eugene Indian Residential
School, Cranbrook, B.C.

In answer to letter from Major D. M. MacKay, Indian Commissioner for B.C., dated February 8th, 1938, I beg to report as follows. On looking at my records of the above school, I find that the following machinery is in operation:-

School Lighting Plant.

This plant consists of a 7 H.P. Petter Horizontal Gasoline Engine directly connected to a 4 K.W. 125V. 32A.D.C. Generator. The current from this floats through the batteries.

Laundry

The Laundry Machinery is operated by a Motor and the power is supplied by a 15 H.P. Otto Gasoline Engine directly connected to a 10 K.W. 125V. 80A. D.C. Canadian Westinghouse Generator.

Water Service

The water service is supplied by a Gould 5" x 6" Triplex Pump, belt connected to a 7 H.P. Z type Canadian Fairbanks Morse Gasoline Engine, also a No. 3 Canadian Fairbanks Morse air compressor used to provide air pressure in the storage tank for the fresh water system.

From the above it is somewhat difficult to judge which engine is partly out of commission, and unless the Z type engine has a special fuel pump installed, the fuel feed is generally supplied by suction from a small tank. In either case the fuel pump plunger or piston is only from 3/8" to 1/2" in diameter and about 4" long. Possibly the difficulty in taking it out is caused by the piston being somewhat worn and having a ridge inside the gland.

I would suggest that the Engineer take the whole Engine down and take off the fuel pump casting and take it to a Garage or Machine Shop and have it reground or renewed. In either case the cost should not exceed \$10.00. While the engine is down the valves should be reground and the piston rings and other internal parts thoroughly cleaned out.

When I visit the school next summer I will make an inspection of this engine and report on same.

Dear Sir: Re Kootenay (St. Eugene) Indian Residential School.

I enclose copy of a report by Mr. T. J. Arnall, Engineer for the Department of Public Works, with reference to the condition of a Petter Diesel engine at the Kootenay Indian Residential School near Cranbrook. As you will see from the contents, it is necessary that this engine be repaired immediately.

In the meanwhile, an attempt was made by Indian Agent Irwin to obtain an estimate as to the cost of repair of this engine. The Cranbrook Foundry and Shop company, however, stated in a letter to the Indian Agent, copy of which is enclosed, that they could make no estimate without dismantling the machine. Their argument seemed a good one and we then asked them for an estimate of dismantling and then reassembling the motor, if necessary. They estimate the cost as \$30.00. I enclose a copy of this estimate. While this is a fair charge for the dismantling and reassembling of a machine, it would seem out of proportion to the probable cost of repairs required according to Mr. Arnall—see his letter enclosed. However, if you consider it necessary for a definite estimate to be first made before authorizing the repair, this seems the only way out of it. If, therefore, you concur in this, I shall be much obliged if you will authorize me to allow Indian Agent Irwin to incur this expenditure.

Dear Sir:

In reply to your letter of April 23rd, File No. 155-0-5 with reference to Laundry equipment, Tubular boiler and Refrigerator for the Kootenay Indian Residential School, I can only say that I regret the delay in supplying this information for you but enclose herewith a letter from Mr. H. S. Haynes, General Manager for Parks & Company, which explains itself.

Mr. Haynes visited the Kootenay Indian Residential School with me early in May and found, on investigation, that a verticle tubular boiler of the dimensions applied for by the Reverend Michael Murphy, O. M. I., Principal of the School, would be wholly inadequate to do the work required and, if installed, would later have to be replaced by a more powerful steam boiler such as described in his letter of July 4th.

Mr. Haynes, therefore, decided to make no move in the matter before consulting a Mechanical Engineer with respect to the type of boiler required to supply sufficient steam for the Laundry equipment and domestic hot water for the School.

Mr. Stanley B. Jepson, Mechanical Engineer of Metals Limited, Calgary, arrived in Cranbrook on Saturday, July 2nd, and in company with Mr. Haynes, Reverend Michael Murphy and myself made a thorough investigation of the heating requirements of the School and his report, which deals minutely and in much detail with the above, I herewith enclose.

I also enclose a catalogue showing the Kelvinator system of Refrigeration together with a letter of explanation regarding details in connection with this system, also prices and cost of installation. With this information before us I feel that if it is not possible to meet the suggested expenditures this year it might be well to defer the purchase until 1939 rather than to install less expensive system which would not give the same satisfactory results. A boiler for instance which, according to expert advice, would not be capable of supplying sufficient hot water to meet the requirements of the School.

In examining old files the undersigned is reminded of non-receipt of payment cheques for services rendered the Department of INDIAN AFFAIRS during the month of December 1912 and February 1913, as Inspector of Construction at KOOTENAY INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL, St. Eugene Mission, near Cranbrook, B.C., a matter upon which an explanation had been received from another official, who was not responsible for such matters, to the effect that the payments would be eventually made but that it might take some time and that interest at six percent would be allowed.

That assurance was given me when being called upon for extra services months later, by the engineer who placed me in charge at the outset, and who was asked about the delayed payments at completion of the inspection services previously rendered but no final report having been acknowledged as received and the inspector relieved from duty. Resting upon that assurance the time has lapsed and the matter overlooked till recently.

May this matter have your scrutiny and, in event of paycheques having been issued and endorsed as paid by the Bank, the name or names of endorsers be reported to me as the proper party to acknowledge such payments? Should no payments be ascertained as having been made may a report be received as to what adjustment may be expected and when?





Dear Sir:

With further reference to my letter of May 30th, File 23/3562, and your letter of June 7th, File 155-0-5 in the matter of the repairs required to the Petter Diesel engine at the Kootenay Indian Reserve School, I beg to forward herewith a letter from Indian Agent Irwin, with a quotation from the Cranbrook Foundry & Machine Shops on cost of repairs, found to be required to put the engine in good running condition.

The costs in connection with dismantling this engine, and the estimated cost of the repairs stated to be necessary, appear excessive. I doubt however, if the outlay can be avoided as I understand the firm submitting the quotation is the only one in Cranbrook qualified to do the work required. Moreover, the engine should be repaired and in position for operation when the school term begins on September 1st.

I may say that I am somewhat reluctant to recommend this expenditure, but under the circumstances it cannot well be avoided. I should appreciate being advised at an early date of the Department's decision in the matter.

Dear Sir:

Referring to your file, No. 155-0-5, your letter of 4th, Inst., refers me to official letter of June 9th., 1913, of which a copy is not available owing to same having been destroyed by fire some years ago.

The figures quoted from Vol. 1, Page H-72, Auditor General's report for 1912-3, appear to show that ten salary payments must have been paid, while only nine were received and endorsed by me.

Services as Inspector were intended to have terminated at the end of 1912, as you state from information on your files, but during January and a few days in February 1913, release from duty had not been effected until final report of Feb. 4th., 1913, which does not appear to have been followed by any further correspondence, excepting the official letter of June 9, 1913, of which I must rely upon memory for guidance.

It appears to me that one monthly salary cheque has not been received by me and this may be ascertained by examination of the returned paid cheques.

It also appears, from Memo. at hand, that a cheque for January, 1913, had been received but none for December, 1912, nor the portion of early February, 1913, that matter being probably what was covered by official letter of June 9, 1913, a copy of which might inform me.

In order to reduce the problem to a minimum may I trouble you to have a copy of that official letter of June 9, 1913; also to have you examine the paid cheques for months of Dec. & Jan, year 1912-13 and the signatures of payee compared in case there may have been one for each of those months.

Owing to no data to show how the amount \$2,064.42 is made up, but at my disposal because of not having a copy of the Auditor General's report for that year may I ask you to send me a Memo of the items?

Thanking you for the trouble you have gone to in the matter and in anticipation of your obliging me by the further search of vouchers and examination of cheques and a copy of the letter mentioned, I am hoping that such may clear up what is to me a problem of importance and a bother to you.






