NMC MISSION: To empower and facilitate leadership, spiritual expression and justice to enable Indigenous people to exercise self determination with the Christian Church and in society.

Under NMC initiation and active participation, the Indigenous Studies Centre at Vancouver School of Theology offers a Master of Divinity degree by extension for people in Native Ministries.

MORNING: 8:30am – 11:30am

1 WHOSE RULES RULE?

Samaya Jardey, *Snuneymuxw First Nation*, BA in Anthropology and MSW, University of British Columbia, with extensive work in supporting survivors of Indian residential schools.

Indian residential schools in Canada were founded on Euro-Canadian worldviews and values that differ from Indigenous worldviews and values. For 150 years the former made decisions for Indigenous children, while historically the latter provided space for children to make decisions for themselves. This course will provide an opportunity for exploratory dialogue about how decisions are made and whose values govern in organizations created to work on behalf of and for Indigenous people. We will discuss and question whose values are at the foundation of organizations, such as government (DIA), nonprofit or Indian Act elected Chiefs and Council.

2 IMPORTANT IDEAS IN EMERGING INDIGENOUS CHRISTIAN THEOLOGIES

The Rt. Rev. Mark MacDonald, *Wyandotte*, National Indigenous Anglican Bishop of Canada.

Much is happening in an emerging spiritual movement among Indigenous Peoples across the Land. This course will look at some of the important ideas that are developing and their impact among the Peoples of the Land. *This course meets the requirements for the M.Div. degree program but is open to everyone. Some class sessions will be joint with "Aboriginal Christians in a World of Religions".*

3 ABORIGINAL CHRISTIANS IN A WORLD OF RELIGIONS

The Rev. Dr. Martin Brokenleg, *Lakota*, Vice-President & Co-Founder of Reclaiming Youth International, retired Director of the VST Native Ministries Program.

Aboriginal Christians develop a unique set of theological skills bringing together their own Native religious traditions and those of their European-formed Christian denomination. This course explores these basic skills and builds on them when encountering other forms of Christianity, other forms of traditional Aboriginal religions, new Native religions and religions from other parts of the world. Each encounter creates new problems to think about and new theological thinking. Students will read a resource bibliography, gain impressions of encounters with other religions, dialogue their reactions and record their new learning appropriate to the degree of credit they seek. *This course meets the requirements for the M.Div. degree program but is open to everyone. Some class sessions will be joint with "Important Ideas in Emerging Indigenous Christian Theologies".*

AFTERNOON: 2:00pm – 5:00pm

4 DISCERNING INDIGENOUS THEOLOGIES

The Ven. Paul Sneve, *Sicangu Lakota*, Director, Niobrara School for Ministry.

This course will emphasize non-systematic (Indigenous) theology using anthropological tools that enable one to see local theology more easily and how it contrasts with traditional Western European theologies. We will explore these theologies as they were negatively informed by Greek/Hellenistic philosophy. The result will enable Indigenous Ministers (Lay or Ordained) to present scripture and theology in a more familiar light that does not force unnatural Western concepts upon their people.

5 RESTORATION OF WELL-BEING: CANADA'S FIRST PEOPLES

Bill Mussell, *Skwah First Nation*, Consultant specializing in Indigenous issues and actively engaged as chair/president of the Native Mental Health Association of Canada, member of the Mood Disorders Society of Canada, and former chair of the First Nation, Inuit and Metis Advisory Committee to the Mental Health Commission of Canada.

Topics will include aboriginal worldview, historical context, health determinants, paths to recovery, cultural competence, self-care and "helpful helping". A variety of methods will be employed to promote quality teaching/learning experiences.

INDIGENOUS SCHOLAR IN RESIDENCE: Ray Jones, *Gitksan*, Chair, Native Ministries Consortium; Member of the Board of Governors, Vancouver School of Theology; and Chair, Aboriginal Ministries Council of the United Church of Canada. Ray also serves on the United Church of Canada's Basis of Union Task Force, currently working on the inclusion of the history of Aboriginal participation since union in 1925, and the inclusion of Aboriginal content in the United Church of Canada logo. Ray is a residential school survivor.

6 EMERGING PATTERNS OF INDIGENOUS GOVERNANCE AMONG CHRISTIAN CHURCHES

The Rt. Rev. Mark MacDonald, Wyandotte, National Indigenous Anglican Bishop of Canada.

We will examine developments in Indigenous governance, especially in the Anglican Church of Canada, but with relevance to other groups as well. We will consider the effect of Christian faith and practice embodied in Indigenous culture and governance, but we will also consider ways that Indigenous Peoples have adopted their own forms of governance in modern times.

7 INTERPRETING THE BIBLE IN CULTURAL CONTEXT

The Rev. Dr. Walter Vogels, priest of the Society of the Missionaries of Africa, (The White Fathers), and Professor Emeritus of Old Testament, Faculty of Theology, St. Paul University, Ottawa.

This course is an introduction to different methods for reading the Scriptures. Some methods try to discover the intention of the author which requires to know his cultural context. Others stress that the reader gives the meaning, but each reader comes from a different culture. Finally there is the text itself with its structures which transcend cultures. These methods will be applied to biblical texts, especially to the paradise story (Genesis 2:4b-3:24). *Required course for M.Div. students entering NMP since May 2010, and highly recommended for those who are at the beginning stages of Biblical Studies. This course is open to everyone.*

8 INDIGENOUS WAYS OF TEACHING AND LEARNING FOR GOD'S 21ST CENTURY MISSION AND MINISTRY

Dr Jenny Te Paa, Maori, Te Ahorangi (Dean) Te Rau Kahikatea, St Johns College, Auckland New Zealand.

This course will focus on three developments in Indigenous theological education; a) Historic Injustice; b) Present Uncertainties - the inherent tensions between models for integration or separation; c) Future Possibilities - exploring new possibilities for Indigenous ways of teaching and learning. *This course meets the requirements for the M.Div. degree program but is open to everyone.*

AFTERNOON: 2:00PM – 5:00PM

9 A RULE OF LIFE FOR HEALTH, HEALING AND HOLISTIC LIVING: NATIVE AMERICAN PROVERBS AND WISDOM KEEPERS

The Rev. Debbie Royals, Pascua Yaqui, Director of Development for the Indigenous Theological Training Institute, and Health/Spirituality faculty member for CREDO Institute.

This course utilizes the various wisdom and proverbs of our Indigenous ancestors and elders as a guidepost for balanced living. Together we will experience and discuss how their guidance informs our own values and choices. We will engage in developing a Rule of Life that reflects our individual spirituality, our understanding for interdependent leadership within our communities, and leading others by our example of spiritual-minded relationships with our Creator, each other and the earth.

10 CHRISTIAN MISSION? OR SPIRITUAL IMPERIALISM? INDIAN RESIDENTIAL SCHOOLS AND THE TRUTH AND RECONCILIATION COMMISSION OF CANADA

Marie Wilson, Commissioner, Canada's Truth and Reconciliation Commission, and **Ray Jones**, Gitksan, Chair, Native Ministries Consortium, Member of the VST Board of Governors, Chair, Aboriginal Ministries Council of the United Church of Canada, and residential school survivor.

Canada is in the midst of a unique, dynamic Truth and Reconciliation process to confront and heal from an assimilative and Christianizing process that lasted for 150 years, removing Indigenous children from their homes, families, culture and spiritual beliefs. Through the courage of residential school survivors and the courts, all Canadians now have the right to know, the responsibility to remember and the invitation to walk in reconciliation through the mandate of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission. This course will explore the spiritual dimensions of Truth and the many possible meanings of Reconciliation.

INDIGENOUS SCHOLAR IN RESIDENCE: Stephen Kakfwi, Dene, former Dene Nation President and Northwest Territories (NWT) Premier, a founder of the NWT Dene Cultural Institute and the national Indigenous Survival International (ISI). His career demonstrates the strong spiritual foundation of the Dene. www.stephenkakfwi.ca

COURSE CREDIT

Native Ministries Summer School courses are nonsectarian and interdisciplinary. Courses examine historical and social data, literary-oral traditions, artistic and other cultural aspects of Indigenous religions. Courses also examine the philosophical and theological dimensions of aboriginal thought. Daily attendance and the keeping of a journal are usually the requirements for those taking the course for NMC credit.

Native Ministries Summer School courses may be taken for transfer credit. Please contact the Native Ministries Program office to inquire about transferable degree credit.

COSTS

A \$35 (Cdn) non-refundable fee is due with your registration. This is in addition to other fees.

TUITION

Tuition is \$275 (CDN) per course for NMC credit (15 contact hours). Auditors pay full tuition. Spouses of students registered in the NMC program pay a fee of \$25 to audit a course. Tuition fees can be paid in advance. **All fees are payable in Canadian dollars at registration.** We accept MasterCard and Visa.

Early Registration: Tuition for early registration, before April 30, 2012, is \$250 (Cdn) per course.

The Master of Theology in Indigenous and Inter-religious program requires a Master of Arts or Master of Divinity degree for admission. For the Master of Divinity degree, applicants must demonstrate that they are preparing for or are already exercising ministry with indigenous people.

GOALS:

Acknowledge the historical and contemporary role of indigenous spiritual and intellectual traditions as a world religion,

Employ learning and teaching methods that are culturally respectful and appropriate,

Equip people for engagement in indigenous and/or inter-religious community leadership, and

Foster innovative theological research

PROGRAMS:

We provide four study options:

Diploma in Theological Studies by extension – 24 credits of learning for theological enrichment and as a base for public and pastoral leadership in a variety of contexts, obtained both off site and through the Native Ministries Consortium Summer School.

Master of Arts in Indigenous and Inter-religious Studies – 42 credits of research and presentation directed toward the challenges of indigenous survival in a religiously diverse and globalized world, obtained on site, through NMC Summer School and a substantial field experience component.

Master of Divinity by extension

– 90 credits of comprehensive preparation for professional ministry settings in community, church and world, obtained both off site and through the NMC Summer School.

Master of Theology in Indigenous and Inter-religious Studies – 24 credits of advanced research and presentation for use in future academic, educational or leadership work, obtained on site and through the NMC Summer School.
