

Dear Sir:

In regard to the water situation here we are sending regular reports to Mr. D. D. Gow, of Winnipeg, who, I presume, is keeping you informed in regard to it.

The situation is getting gradually worse. We can just barely tide along by shutting it off at night and using as little as possible both for the building and the stock. They are spreading the bathing of the pupils over three days but as soon as this extra drain commences we are without water from this source. The well which supplies our pressure system is holding about the same and at the suggestion of the engineers who were here in the fall we are now tapping the pressure system pipes in order to get a supply from this source in the kitchen without having to carry it as we have been doing for some months from other parts of the building.

Apart from a few days we have had no water in the bathroom at our house for months and most of the time none in the hot water tank in the kitchen. The members of our family have to either go to town or to the school for a decent bath.

I beg to enclose Voucher No. 86 in favor of Brandon Heating & Plumbing Limited for Twenty Dollars and Sixty-five Cents (\$20.65) for the changing of flow of water from the pressure system which supplies the three upper flats of our school building to the kitchen. This change was recommended by the engineers, who directed the curbing which was put in in the fall, that is, if our supply from the gravity system continued to be inadequate. I might say that notwithstanding every possible economy in the use of water we still have a serious shortage.

Sir,-

This will acknowledge the receipt of your letter of March 14th in connection with the water supply situation at the Brandon Indian School. It is noted that the Department of Indian Affairs have asked that a further inspection and report be made as to the best and most economical way of overcoming the present difficulties.

At the present time there is little or nothing that can be done to overcome the shortage of water being experienced at the Brandon Indian School. It is hoped that with the spring break-up period now approaching, some improvement in the conditions may be experienced.

Mr. Rose at the present time is in the Estevan district in connection with the establishment of hydrometric stations and on his return to Winnipeg will stop off at Brandon and visit the Brandon Indian School. At that time he will make an examination of the flow of water in the spring which is situated about one-half a mile from the school and which it is proposed to connect up with the present water supply to the school. If the flow of water in this spring at the present time is insufficient to meet the requirements of the school, it will then be necessary to give consideration to other sources of supply for this school.

As soon as Mr. Rose has returned and made his report, a further communication will be addressed to you.







Sir,-

With further reference to the subject matter of your letter of the 14th instant and my reply thereto under date of March 20th, I beg to advise that Mr. Rose has now returned from his west trip, during the course of which he visited the Brandon Indian School and investigated the water supply conditions at that Institution.

Mr. Rose reports that the water supply at the Institution, while inadequate to meet the demands of all services, is not now more serious than the conditions that have prevailed during the greater part of the winter. There is nothing that can be done at the present time to provide an adequate water supply for all services and it is anticipated that with the break-up period now about to take place, that conditions will not become more serious and will probably be somewhat alleviated.

Mr. Rose made an investigation of the spring which has been referred to in previous correspondence, and made an actual measurement of the flow as it emerges from underground. He reports that at the time of his visit the flow was averaging a rate of somewhat in excess of 4,000 gallons per day. In view of the fact that the other springs have shown a lessening discharge, the fact that this spring appears to be maintaining a fairly large flow is a favourable feature. It would appear as if we would be warranted in creating a small reservoir at the point where this spring emerges from underground and conveying the supply either direct to the school or to the existing reservoir. However, this work cannot be undertaken at the present time, but should be given further consideration should the run-off conditions throughout Manitoba continue at a rate below normal. In the meantime whenever our engineer is in that vicinity, he will make it a point to further inspect this spring to determine whether or not there is a decrease or increase in the discharge.

I would ask that you please convey this information to the Department of Indian Affairs.



I wish to thank you for your letter of April 5, No. 133-0-5, informing us that \$500.00 has been set apart for this fiscal year for painting and miscellaneous repairs and asking us to advise in regard to items which we consider most important and I beg to submit list as follows.

MEMORANDUM:

The Honourable the Superintendent General,-

Funds are provided, in the Appropriation for Indian Education for the current fiscal year, to carry out certain painting and miscellaneous repairs at the Brandon Indian Residential School. It is proposed to perform the following work in the interior of the building:-

To paint auditorium, children's dining room, boys' and girls' study and waiting room, and to do some redecorating to a bungalow used by a member of the staff.

The labour will be performed by the school staff, without expense to the Department. It will be necessary to supply the material only, at a cost of approximately \$127.

It is proposed, further, to overhaul and renew part of the electric wiring, poles, etc. The manager of the Manitoba Power Commission states this work is urgently required, and he gives an estimate of \$442 as the amount necessary to place the wiring in good condition.

I would request your approval for having the above work carried out and would be pleased if you would advise the names of the firms from whom quotations should be obtained for the supplying of the paint, oils, etc., and also the name of an electrician to supply the materials required and perform the labour in overhauling the electrical wiring at this school.
