





Sir:

The Principal of the St. Paul's Anglican School on the Blood Reserve has applied through the Agent, Mr. J.E. Pugh, for authority to purchase some cedar posts and barbed wire to fence some land cut into by the C.P.R. Right of Way and also for repairs to the school boundary fence.

The Agent says that the cost of material would be about \$85.00.

It seems to me that many of our Schools expect too much from the Department in the matter of expenditures of this nature and I think that this expenditure which the Principal now asks the Department to assume ought to be borne by the School Authorities.



Dear Dr. Scott.-

May I crave your indulgence regarding the condition of the road from the main Highway through the Reserve, up to the school. You will recall that a gravelled motor road has just been completed through the Reserve from Cardston to Stand-Off. This leaves two miles of the usual dirt road still ungraded from the highway to our front gate. Despite several attempts which have been made locally to fill in several of the holes (veritable quagmires in wet weather) the road still continues to be one of the worst in the whole country side, and with so much traffic, both public and otherwise to the school, it becomes very embarrassing to be requested to bring out a team of horses in order to have cars come to the Institution.

Such moreover greatly militates against the publicity of so desirable a public and Government Building.

With the end in view of having the road made passable and presentable for the general public, also for ourselves, I have approached the Provincial authorities with the request that the road be graded and gravelled similar to the main Highway. I was immediately informed that this two miles of road did not come under the purview of a 'Main Highway' and that no estimates could be considered for such improvement. On pressing the matter it was thought that probably a joint action would be considered for a fifty-fifty proposition between the Indian Department and the Provincial Government.

It would cost an approximate amount of Two Thousand dollars (\$ 2000.00) to grade and gravel the road .



In order to reduce the cost in the aggregate I would gladly put on two teams and a man. From your own personal experience you will readily see the dire necessity of having an improved road up to the school, this would also then coincide with the general improvement now made through the Reserve, but apparently unless we can get a joint action, nothing can be done.

I therefore submit this question, in the hope that something tangible may be done in the near future, first, to provide a passable road in all weather, and second, to remove the stigma of having "an unpassable road to a good school".



I beg to acknowledge receipt of your letter No. 103-1-9, of the 30th of October, concerning a road from the main highway to the St. Paul's School, and in reply I beg to state that I have taken this matter up with the Minister of Public Works of this Province, and I am advised that they are not in a position to assist us in the construction of this piece of road. I have, however, entered into the detail of cost and find such cost as follows.

Grading, \$350.00, Culverts, \$85.00. Gravel, approximately, 1500 cu. yards for two miles of road, with a two mile haul @ \$2.00 per yard, \$3000.00. A total cost of \$3435.00.

In connection with the grading, I might say that this covers the pulling of the dirt from the side of road to the centre by means of graders, and I am advised that it will take, approximately, 22 rounds of the grader on this two mile length to make this a reasonable road, and the sum of \$350.00 covers that work.

The gravel will have to be hauled two miles to an average point, and will require, approximately, 750 yards to the mile. I might say that in placing less than this amount of gravel on the road would only mean further maintenance within a short period. Canon Middleton advises me that he can place one or two teams on this work. This, however, will not reduce the cost to any great extent. The road, no doubt, would be an asset to the school. In view of the cost, however, I rather hesitate to make a recommendation.

Dear Dr. Scott.-

With further reference to our correspondence of October 30th, relating to the improvement of the two mile stretch of road leading to the School from the main highway.

There seems to have arisen a slight misunderstanding somewhere in the chain of events. I personally interviewed the Minister of Public Works of the Province in connection with the project, and he promised ready assistance in co-operation with the Indian Department. His Deputy however seems to have taken a different view, and states that no provision is being made for the second class roads.

This would appear to leave the matter entirely with ourselves. Mr. Pugh has submitted figures covering the estimated cost, and while the sum of \$ 3000.00 for gravel seems rather prohibitive, the road thus completed would stand for all time. The grading alone, including the culverts, can be done for \$ 435.00. To have the two miles gravelled would give us the same advantage as the Agency and the R.C. School, it would also ensure a uniformity of roads between these points.

If the whole scheme be considered too expensive, would it be possible to have the grading and culverts repaired according to the figures submitted.?

On my next visit to Edmonton, I intend taking up the matter again with the Minister of Public Works.

Dear Dr. Scott:-

With further reference to our correspondence regarding the grading of the two miles of road leading from the main highway up to the school. Since receiving your letter of last December 27th. have interviewed Mr. Stringer a local M. L. A. who personally took up this matter with Mr. MacPherson, Minister of Public Works, Edmonton. The policy now maintained in connection with these roads according to the Minister and Mr. Stringer, is for each party concerned to work on a fifty per cent basis and the Province will then maintain the road to completion. From what I can gather from recent interview with the Minister, he is very anxious to know what assistance to expect from the Indian Department towards the grading and gravelling of this two miles now under discussion. I feel convinced that if we could make the Minister a definite offer as to what we were prepared to do he would be inclined to give a similar grant. He seems very reluctant to make a statement regarding the amount voted until a definite amount has been voted by the Indian Department. In this connection both Mr. Indian Agent Pugh and myself discussed this matter only last week with Mr. Stringer, because the road at the present time is almost impassable and in addition to the culverts which sadly need repairing, the road is gradually getting worse and worse in so far that cars coming from town and elsewhere will not come to the school, but rather 'phone ahead asking if a team can meet them at the end of the two mile road. I can assure you that anything that can be done in the immediate future towards the re-construction of these two miles will be greatly appreciated.


Concerning gravelling this road, the cost of which has been estimated at \$3,000.00, the Department has arranged for a grant of \$1,500.00. Would you ascertain if the Provincial Minister of Public Works would secure a like appropriation, so that the work could be satisfactorily completed? I add, for your information, that the \$1,000.00 which was available for fencing and other improvements at this school will be assigned for this purpose and that it will be necessary to postpone the fencing, etc., until next year.

Dear Mr. Pugh:

With reference to your 402-11 C.E. of December 15th, last, I have to inform you that Canon Middleton is hopeful that he can arrange with the Provincial Minister of Public Works to divide the cost. I have asked him to look into this question further and have promised a grant of \$1,500.00 from this Department towards the gravelling of the two mile road, the total cost of which you have estimated at \$3,000.00.

In the meantime, I have to authorize you to expend \$435.00 for grading and culverts. This preparatory work will have to be done anyway, and the Department would be pleased if you would attend to the matter at the earliest suitable date.



Dear Dr. Scott:-

Since writing you on April the 12th. regarding the grading of the two miles of road leading from the main highway to the school, I have now received a letter from Mr. MacPherson, Minister of Public Works, Edmonton in which he states:-

"You appreciate the fact that if the Province undertakes the gravelling of this particular road as far as the school, that the remaining portion of the same road to Hillspring which is within the Reserve would, in the ordinary course, be left to Province to develop, and continuation west from the school would seem to be of real service to the Indians concerned. If I could get any assurance from your Department of their willingness to assume responsibility in such cases as this I would be glad to make a start on the road which you suggest. Trusting that you and your Department will see the reasonableness of this suggestion."
