

Dear Mr Hoey:

It is my unpleasant duty to report to you a fire, which occurred yesterday, and which destroyed our pig house, along with twenty two pigs. Most of which were ready for the butcher. It is a big loss to us, and one which must be replaced as soon as possible.

With the help of the entire staff and the boys, we were able to save the barns, but we had great difficulty in doing so, and we had to work very hard and constantly all afternoon until evening. There was a high wind blowing, as there generally is here, and the burning building was only about sixty feet from the barns. Had the wind turned a little, we could never have saved them. We seldom ever get any rain in this part of the country, and so the wooden structures are ready to explode into flame as soon as they come into contact with fire.

The fire was no doubt caused by a spark from the feed cooker, located in the building. This source of fire hazard should never have existed, but like a lot of other foolish ideas, which have been allowed to exist here, it was not adjusted in time.

It is a very serious loss to us. Especially the loss of the pigs, which were ready to help out in food and revenue. In many respects, the removal of the building is a good thing. For although it was a expensive one, it was much too near the main school building, and was therefore a nuisance in respect to sanitation. It bred swarms of flies, and produced terrible odours. Also it was not conveniently built.

It will cost one thousand dollars to replace it, and I would like to build a properly constructed pig house, conveniently and in safe proximity to the main

building. We can ~~do~~^{do} all the work ourselves if we have the material. The biggest part of which would be the cost of cement.

I would urgently recommend that the sum of up to one thousand dollars be spent for this purpose if that sum is available.

Dear Mr. Hives:

I have for acknowledgment your letter of the 25th instant, in which you intimate that the piggery at the St. George's School was completely destroyed by fire on August 24.

It is indeed disturbing in a period as critical as the one in which we find ourselves to learn of the destruction of this building. We have been reminded recently by the Purchasing Division that certain supplies, including building materials, are becoming increasingly difficult to secure. It is my hope, therefore, that you will experience no difficulty in securing the supplies necessary for the construction of the new building.

I am sending forward a cheque for \$1,000.00 from the funds contributed by the New England Company and you are authorized to proceed with the construction of the building. It is scarcely necessary to emphasize that the cost of the building itself should be kept down to the lowest possible figure. When I think of the sacrifices the people of England are making at this time it almost breaks my heart to accept these funds for the upkeep and maintenance of our school buildings.


Dear Sir:

While Dr. Moore, of Ottawa, was here recently, the matter of our milk production and consumption was discussed. Quite frequently, when pupils are ill, and the doctor finds it difficult to diagnose, the milk is blamed; although our cows are well and carefully looked after, and our milk is carefully taken care of. Also the cows are tested for T.B. regularly. At one time a Veterinary Surgeon made a monthly visit from Vancouver to attend and inspect the cows, but really we cannot afford such an expense, and his services were discontinued.

To do away with any uncertainty regarding the safety of using our milk supply, I would recommend that a pasteurization system be installed. The cost of this installed would be not more than one thousand dollars, and would have a capacity of fifty gallons, which amount would be sufficient for this institution. If the cost of this had to be taken from the New England Company funds, I do not know of any better way of using it at the present time. Dr. Moore assured me he would endorse such a project, and would be willing for help to come from his Service if necessary.

I would also refer to letter No. I-I-3 from the Director, and relative to Special Grant of \$10.00 per capita pupils for the year 1942. Our attendance for that year, according to the Audit Report was 156. I would be very much obliged if this Special Grant could be available for us to use now. I have sent for, and am expecting two car loads of coal immediately; and two more next month; so that our next Winter's supply will be on hand. This will entail a cost of over \$1400.00 by the time it is in the coal bins.

Will you kindly see what you can do with these two

I enclose herewith letter dated the 6th instant received from Mr. C.F. Hives, Reverend Principal of the St. George's Indian Residential School, in which he requests assistance to the extent of \$1,000.00 for the installation of a milk pasteurization system, which he discussed with Dr. Moore during his recent visit from Ottawa.

With reference to the item of a request for an advance from the Special Grant of \$10.00 per capita pupils for the year 1942, I would recommend that this be forwarded in order to enable Mr. Hives to purchase his fuel supply at a cost of \$1400.00 as the fuel situation in British Columbia is very difficult and uncertain. This, of course, is presuming that the grant was made as stated by Mr. Hives.

I have your letter of the 14th instant, with reference to a request of the Principal of the St. George's Indian Residential School for an amount of \$1000.00 to install a milk pasteurization system. While I agree that such installations may be very desirable, at the same time it is difficult to understand why the Principal should decide to install one this year when both material and labour for such installations are needed for more necessary purposes. It might be presumed that the Principal is just looking for another method of spending the grant made by the New England Company and I should appreciate your again reminding him that there is no assurance that this payment is going to continue indefinitely. The Principal should review this matter very carefully and, if he still feels that it is absolutely necessary to make this installation, another letter can be sent for our consideration.

With reference to the second paragraph of your letter, a special grant at the rate of \$10.00 per capita was paid from the appropriation for Indian education to all Indian residential schools for the year 1942. You were advised regarding this payment in circular letter dated March 26, 1943. However, no such payment was made either to the Mohawk Institute at Brantford, Ont., or the St. George's Indian Residential School at Lytton, B.C. Both of these schools are specially favoured by receiving payments from New England Company funds and consequently the special grant was not paid to either of them. With regard to the St. George's School, an amount of \$4,575.00 was paid from New England Company

funds during the year 1942. I understand, of course, that some of this amount was in connection with the old debts but, with the amount provided for these deducted, the Principal received very substantial financial assistance and, as a matter of fact, a great deal more than any other Indian residential school in Canada.

Dear Sir:

Sometime ago I received a letter from the Director saying that the Residential Schools would be receiving a Special per capita Grant of ten dollars for the year 1942. On applying for this grant, I was informed that St. George's School, along with another were excepted, because they receive financial help from the New England Company.

My reason for applying for this Special per capita Grant at this time was to buy our supply of fuel for next Winter. We are being urged to do this, and warned of the difficulties we may encounter if we are not prepared with our fuel situation. I am very anxious to secure our supply.

Fuel prices have advanced 35% during the past year along with pretty well everything else, including salaries and wages. But fuel is something we cannot do without.

A car load of coal cost approximately \$375.00 by the time it is in our bins. We require four car loads, and I would like to secure it as soon as possible. One car load arrived a few days ago, and I expect another one shortly.

Will you kindly state our case to Ottawa, and recommend that a cheque for the amount of \$1500.00 be sent to us for the purpose of buying fuel for next Winter. And that this amount be taken from the New England Company funds. If required, I will forward receipted accounts showing that the amount is actually used for the purpose of buying our fuel supply.

Believe me, sir, I would not apply for this if I did not think it absolutely necessary. But in view of

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the warnings we have received, and the serious situation of last Winter, ~~it~~ makes it imperative that we secure our supply as soon as possible. And also, in view of the advanced cost of living, I find it extremely difficult to meet our financial obligations on the per capita grant.



Dear Sir:

A few years ago, a small frame building was constructed, for the purpose of accomodating the cannery equipment. The building was very poorly constructed, and had there been a fairly heavy fall of snow during any Winter since its construction, would, no doubt have caved in. It was built near to the electric light and power transformer. In fact, in order to save the trouble of moving the transformer, the roof of the building was made very flat, and the transformer lodges against and on the roof.

This creates a hazard, which has been pointed out to me by electricians as a very serious one. The building is convenient to the boys' playground, and boys have a propensity for climbing on building, even though they are punished for doing so a dozen times in a day. This they do, and I am afraid they will one day play around with the transformer, and either be electrocuted or cause serious damage.

This hazard could be eliminated by pulling down the poorly built cannery, and erecting another in close proximity, but a safe distance from the transformer. Mr Coleman, Inspector from the Vancouver office was here yesterday and took a snap shot of the situation.

To pull down and reconstruct this building would cost approximately two hundred dollars. We could do the work ourselves as part of the Manual training programme, but we should require extra material.

Will you kindly recommend that this matter be looked after.



I enclose herewith Mr. Indian Agent Strang's letter of the 29th instant together with that of the Reverend Principal Hives of St. George's Indian Residential School of the 24th instant and 17th ultimo requesting authority to expend \$175.00 for the reconstruction of a small building mostly used in connection with the canning of fruit and vegetables.

The present building was constructed so close to an electric light and power transformer that a part of the overhanging eave of the low built roof of this building was cut around the transformer which is reported by Mr. Strang to be carrying a current of 2350 volts. The low end of the roof is about eight feet from the ground and with boy pupils playing around the pole, there is always danger that one of them might climb the roof and come in contact with the input wires of the transformer with fatal results.

If the building is reconstructed, it would be moved away from its present location and this hazard would be overcome. If funds can be provided for this purpose, I would recommend approval of the application but consider that in any case steps should be taken by the school to remove the present risk.



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
