I am enclosing herewith Statement of Account received from Mr. James C. Haddow of Edmonton for work done at the school.



These floors were in bad shape, having heaved in ridges three to four inches in height and as Mr. Staley says, in some cases the doors would not open or close.

While the work was not authorized, I would recommend that it be paid if at all possible.



Referring to your letter of Nov. 26th, 1946,
in regard to fire fighting equipment for the Edmonton
Indian Residential School.

Under separate cover, I am mailing you sample
of the hose connection for nozzle, also the connection
for attachment to the water pipe.

In regard to the hand fire extinguishers, they
wish the small extinguishers and as there are four floors
in the building, with something over forty rooms, I do not
think that 6 to a floor or a total of 24, would be excessive.
I have been in touch with the War Assets Corporation in
Edmonton and while they have a large quantity of these on
hand, they not for sale as yet. I am advised that on a
recent test of two dozen of them, only about four were found
to be serviceable and the Manufacturers object very strongly
to the sale of them. There is a possibility that the whole
lot will be taken back by the manufacturers.



With reference to our recent letter pointing out the condition of our fire fighting equipment, I might say that a few days ago a pan of grease caught fire in one of the ovens in the kitchen and brought to our attention the exceedingly dangerous position we are in.

There is not a piece of fire fighting equipment in the kitchen and the nearest hose connection is at least a hundred feet away. As a matter of fact there is not a single piece of equipment, water or chemical, in that section of the building in which the kitchen, laundry and boiler room are located, nor in the chapel which is on the floor above them.

In view of this condition we have taken the liberty of ordering three Fire Guns in order that we may be in a position to handle any flash fire which may occur in the kitchen and pending your action in furnishing the equipment asked for.

Also while giving consideration to the question of supplying fire fighting equipment, I trust you will give favorable consideration to the matter of a night watchman for the school.

I might say that I am considerably worried as to what might happen in the event of our having a fire, not only on account of the lack of suitable equipment, but on account of the antiquated system of fire escapes on the building, where the children would have to climb up onto window ledges four feet from the ground in order that they may get onto the ladders outside.

On a recent visit to this school, Mr. Doucet of the Welfare & Training Division, was shown the crowded condition of our classrooms, which would eventually necessitate the opening up of another classroom, and in anticipation of this he advised us he would arrange that we receive another ~~twenty~~ desks.

More children have come in since he was here and the opening up of another room has become a necessity, so that, if it can be arranged that we receive the additional desks, steps will be taken towards the opening up of this additional room.

An extra teacher's desk & chair would also be required.

In connection with the manual training classes which have been started at the school, a requisition for a supply of tools was sent in several months ago, but so far we have only received a small portion of what was asked and we have not received any saws, hammers or squares, which are the most essential tools in any shop.

Mr. Doucet also arranged to have sent to us four looms so that the girls could take up weaving in their handicrafts classes and now that these classes are in operation, we shall be glad if these machines can be made available at as early a date as possible.

The question of raising mink at this school was also taken up with Mr. Doucet and in this connection we shall be glad to receive authority to purchase the necessary material for the making of pens, so that the boys could go ahead with these in as a manual training project.

DIRECTOR SURVEYS & ENGINEERING BRANCH

Re: Edmonton Indian Residential School,
Edmonton, Alta.

The Principal of the above school, Rev. E.J. Staley, would like to have a copy of the plans of this building together with an outline of the drainage system and the lighting system. This school was erected during the fiscal year 1923-24.

The Principal states that he is considerably worried as to what might happen in the event of a fire. One of his statements in this regard reads:- "On account of the antiquated system of fire escapes in the building, the children would have to climb to window ledges four feet from the floor in order that they may reach the ladders outside". It is thought that in using the word "ladders", the Principal means fire escape. If you have a plan of the building, it will probably show the fire escape.
