With ref. to memo. of yesterday relative to the amts. expended from time to time on the construction & enlargement of the Shingwauk & Nanawash Homes respectively; also the Annual per Capita Subsidy given to each Institution from its establishment & the number of pupils to which the same was extended I beg to report that an order in Council was passed on the 5<sup>th</sup> Dec<sup>r</sup> 1873 making a grant of \$1000.<sup>00</sup> towards the erection of the Shingwauk Home; also a grant of \$60. per annum for each of 20 pupils attending thereat; also a grant of \$75.<sup>00</sup> for each of eight aged & infirm ind. who should reside in the Asylum when it was proposed to establish in connection with the Home. The grant of \$60.<sup>00</sup> per annum for each of 20 pupils was continued the same each year until 1881 when it was increased to \$60. per ann. for each of 30 pupils. inter alia you state that you have  
judged it expedient to reduce the  
number both of the pupils and  
the staff at the Shingwak and  
Wawanosh Homes, during the  
winter months; and you state  
that you have now accommoda-  
tion for 74 boys at the Shing-  
wak, and for 26 girls at the Wa-  
wanosh, being 100 pupils in all;  
and you express the hope that  
the Dept. will provide for 100  
pupils at these Homes from the  
1<sup>st</sup> July next, at \$60<sup>00</sup>/<sub>xx</sub> each per  
annum, instead of, as at present,  
for 77 pupils in attendance thereat;

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You further state that you propose erecting a new Wawanosh Home and Laundry near the Shingwak, and of disposing of the present girls' buildings, which are at an inconvenient distance of three miles; the new ~~Wawanosh~~ <sup>Wawanosh</sup> Home to have accommodation for 50 girls, and towards its erection you hope <sup>that</sup> the Dept. will make you a grant, during the coming Spring, sufficient to enable you, at least to make a commencement.

I beg to inform you, with reference to the proposed reduction of pupils at the Shingwak and Wawanosh Homes, the Dept. will have no objection thereto, provided that it is understood that the contribution of the Dept. shall only be paid in full on condition that the number of pupils, namely, 66 boys and 11 girls, is kept up, and that should there be less than these numbers the grants shall be proportionately reduced.

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reduced. The Dept would be glad to be advised what reduction in the staff you propose making.

(2.) An item will be inserted in the estimates of the Dept for 100 pupils at \$60<sup>00</sup>/<sub>xx</sub> each; namely 74 boys and 26 girls, to be educated at the Shingwak and Thawanosh Homes instead of 77 pupils, the number towards which the Dept at present contributes. And, should this increased grant be approved of, Parliament will be asked to vote the money.

(3.) As respects the proposed ~~work~~ <sup>construction</sup> of the new Thawanosh Home and Laundry near the Shingwak, and the sale of the present Thawanosh buildings, I have to request that you will state ~~at~~ what price you will receive for the present buildings, and the size and cost of the new buildings proposed to be erected for the education of the girls. I have etc.

I have carefully estimated the amount of work completed on the above buildings since the last application was made to the Indian Department - Aug<sup>r</sup> 20<sup>th</sup> last for a payment of \$600<sup>00</sup> on account, and find it to be in value upwards of \$350, leaving work uncompleted to the value of nearly \$550.

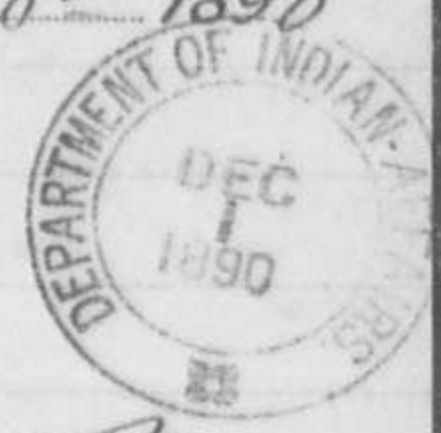

In reply to yours of the  
 21st inst. (No 74.138) - I have to thank you for  
 consenting to place on the Estimate an item for  
 maintenance of 100 pupils, at \$60 each, at our  
 Home. Instead of 77 pupils, it should be 100.

In reply to your question -  
 (1) I am doing without a local Superintendent the  
 the boys being 29 in number, & the School house changed  
 so that the School master can look after them while at  
 out door work. The account keeping & most of the other  
 duties of the local Supt. devolve upon myself. This of course  
 ties me at home & gives me an excessive amount of work, &  
 so can be of a temporary arrangement for a few months.  
 Our tannery & weaving shops are closed & boot shop will be  
 closed also in a few weeks. The bootmaker going to chop cord wood.  
 The value of our present Wawanosh Building & land  
 (15 acres) we estimate to be between \$3000 & \$3500, but  
 this must of course depend on the demand there may be for  
 house property. Just at present there would be no chance  
 to sell.

(3) In regard to the proposed new buildg for  
frils. The laundry might I think be built,  
fitted with necessary appliances, & have rooms  
in it for the laundresses to live in, for abt \$1800.

The new Wawanoosh Home for 50 frils might be  
built I should think for \$6000.

These are merely rough estimates. I have not  
as yet put out plans or specifications, but will do  
so in the course of the winter if there seems any  
prospect of a grant being made.

(4) I wd like to call attention to the fact that any buildg  
that is done now in connection with our Homes here  
we can do ourselves, without employing any outside  
parties, - unless for mason work & plastering. We make  
all the doors, sash, flooring, wainscot, turned work  
&c in our own factory.

It would suit us better for this new work above  
proposed to be spread over two years - than for it  
all to be done in one year. I would like to  
build the laundry & commence the new Wawanoosh  
this coming season, & so not dispose of the present  
Wawanoosh (unless some very good chance should offer)  
until 1892.

We have 29 boys & 15 frils - 44 in all this winter & shall  
expect maintenance grant for that number unless there  
be an increase.

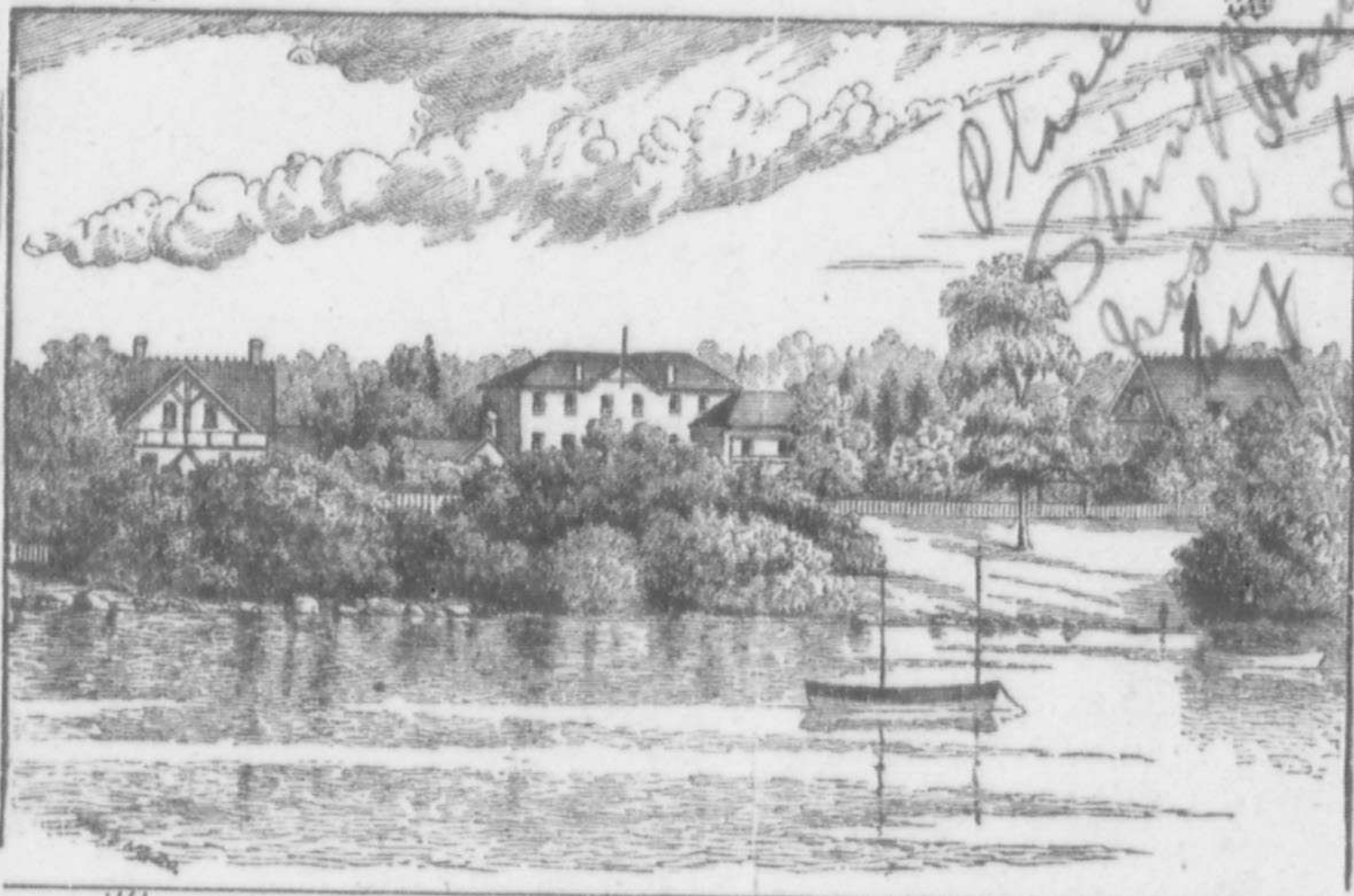

### DATES TO REMEMBER.

JULY, 1871.—Chief Little Pine, of Garden River, accompanied Mr. Wilson to Toronto and other places, and addressed the white people, urging that a "Big Teaching Wigwam" might be built for the young Indians belonging to his tribe. This was the beginning of the Shingwauk Home.

SUMMER OF 1872.—Chief Buhkwujjenene, of Garden River, accompanied Mr. Wilson to England to plead the cause of his people. About £800 was collected, and with this sum the first Shingwauk Home was erected.

SEPTEMBER 22ND, 1873.—The first Shingwauk Home was opened; 15 pupils, boys and girls, were present.

SEPTEMBER 28TH, 1873.—The first Shingwauk Home was burned to the ground, six days after the opening.

JULY 30TH, 1874.—The foundation stone of the new Shingwauk Home was laid by His Excellency, Lord Dufferin, Governor-General of Canada.

OCTOBER, 1874.—Our work was re-commenced with 18 Indian children, boys and girls, who, with their matron and teacher, occupied a frame building temporarily for the winter.

AUGUST 2ND, 1875.—The present Shingwauk home was publicly opened by their Lordships Bishop Hellmuth and Bishop Fauquier.

AUGUST 19TH, 1879.—The Wawanosh Home was opened for use, with 15 Indian girls.

JULY 23RD, 1881.—The Marquis of Lorne and suite visited the Shingwauk Home.

AUGUST 29TH, 1883.—The Bishop Fauquier Memorial Chapel, in connection with the Indian Homes, was opened.

APRIL 15TH, 1885.—A talk with Chief Buhkwujjenene about the troubles going on in the North-West suggested the idea of establishing several Branch Homes.

AUGUST, 1885.—Mr. Wilson, accompanied by three Shingwauk boys, paid a visit to the North-West, going as far west as Regina.

AUGUST 6TH, 1889.—The Kasota and Washakada Homes, Elkhorn, publicly opened by the Lord Bishop of Rupert's Land.

DECEMBER, 1889.—Site acquired for a new Institution, at Medicine Hat, N.W.T.

## Our Indian Homes.

TWENTY-ONE years ago there was erected on the Canadian banks of the St. Clair River, on the Indian Reserve three miles below Sarnia, an unpretentious little frame school house; it was painted red, and the whole cost was only about \$400. That was the beginning of our work among the Indians. Since then, by God's blessing, we have been enabled to erect as many as forty buildings at an aggregate cost of about \$40,000. Four hundred and seventeen Indian children have entered or passed through our schools. Those who came first are now out in the world, many of them married and settled with families of their own. Two of our pupils now at the Shingwauk are children of former scholars.

Many we know there are who doubt the wisdom and necessity of expending so much on the training of Indian children. They ask us, To what good is it all? What becomes of our pupils after they leave us? Are they following the trades which we have taught them? Are any of them now teachers among their own people? In reply we would say Yes; some of our pupils have become teachers—others are now making their living by the trades which they have learned—one, as is already known by our friends, is a clerk in the Indian Department at Ottawa, another is at St. John's College, Winnipeg, preparing for the ministry. We do not pretend that any large proportion of our pupils have made an independent start for themselves. By far the largest number we know are still on the Indian Reserves, farming in a small way, working by the day at saw mills, or as deck hands on steamboats.

This will probably not seem satisfactory to our helpers; neither is it satisfactory to ourselves; but it must be remembered that there are at present considerable difficulties in getting our Indian boys and girls placed out among white people. On the white people's side there is a good deal of prejudice against Indians; and on the Indians' side there is a natural shyness which will often prevent them from seeking employment, or taking it when offered. These difficulties have been to a great extent overcome in the States. In the State of Pennsylvania, numbers of children who have been educated at the Carlisle Indian School are now out living with and working for the white farmers in the State, and we hope that before long a similar state of things may exist here. Several of our Wawanosh girls are already out in service, and others are expecting to get places early in the New Year.

Our work has, as we had anticipated, very much increased during the year which has just closed. Our new Homes at Elkhorn have been opened. Improvements to property and additions to buildings have been made at the Shingwauk Home; and a site for another Institution in the far West has been acquired at Medicine Hat, in the Province of Alberta.

We can only make brief allusions to each of these undertakings, as so much room is now taken up by our long list of pupils that space has become very limited. It seems also unnecessary to give more than a cursory glance at the progress of our work, as all details of interest appear from month to month in the pages of *Our Forest Children*.

### THE SHINGWAUK HOME.

The Government made us a grant of \$2,500 last spring, and this, with other contributions, has been expended as follows:

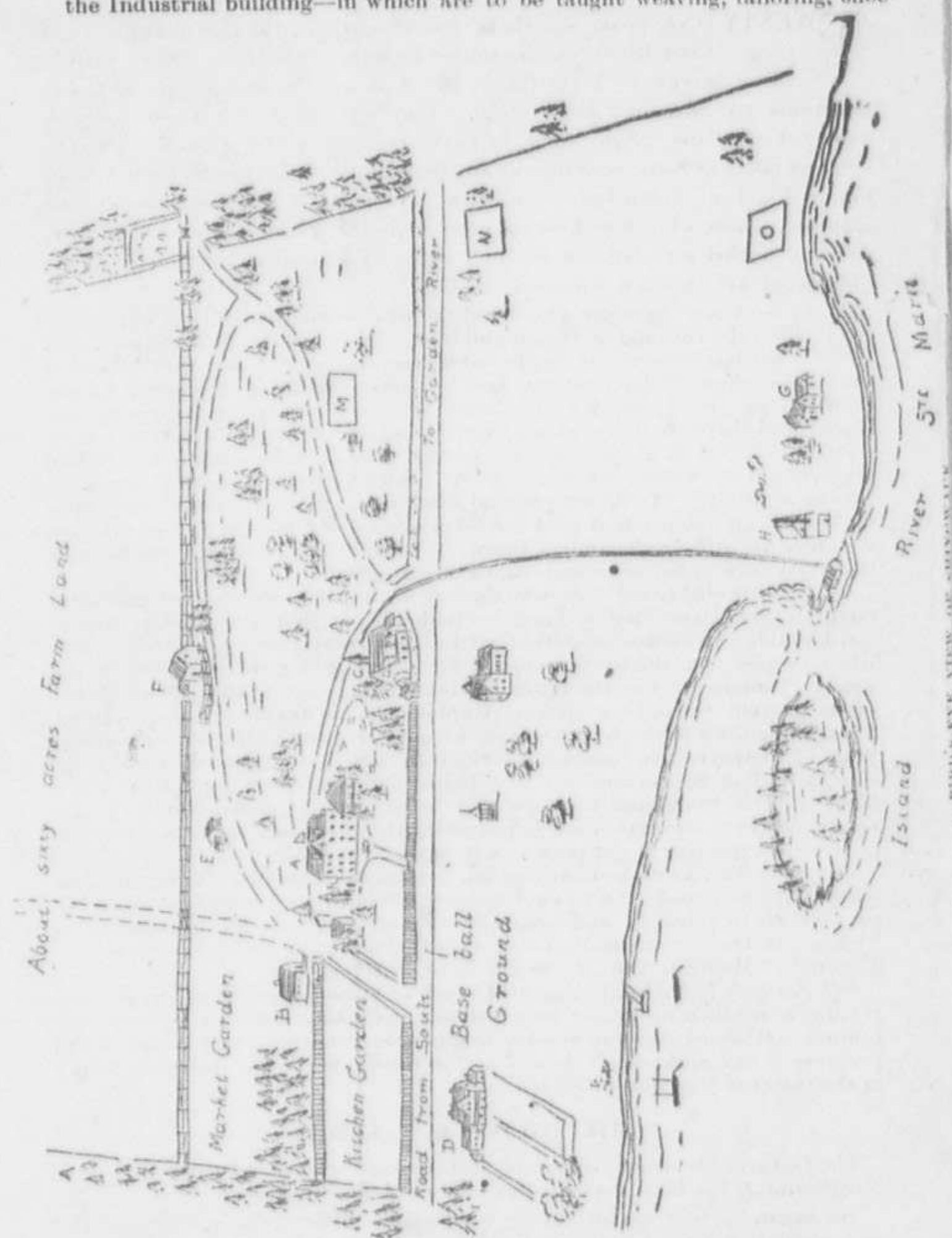
We began by putting up a nice comfortable little stone cottage for the accommodation of our newly engaged foreman of factory and carpenter, with his family. At the same time a number of men and teams were busy grading and levelling the wide stretch of land between the Institution and the river. This was satisfactorily completed, sown with grass, and a handsome little band-stand erected. Here the base-ball matches are now played, and visitors come to sit under the trees in summer and listen to our brass band. Then we

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laid an iron tramway from the Institution down to the steamboat dock. Then we built our furniture factory; placed the boiler, engine and machinery, and got all into good working order. Then, just before winter set in, we put up the Industrial building—in which are to be taught weaving, tailoring, shoe-



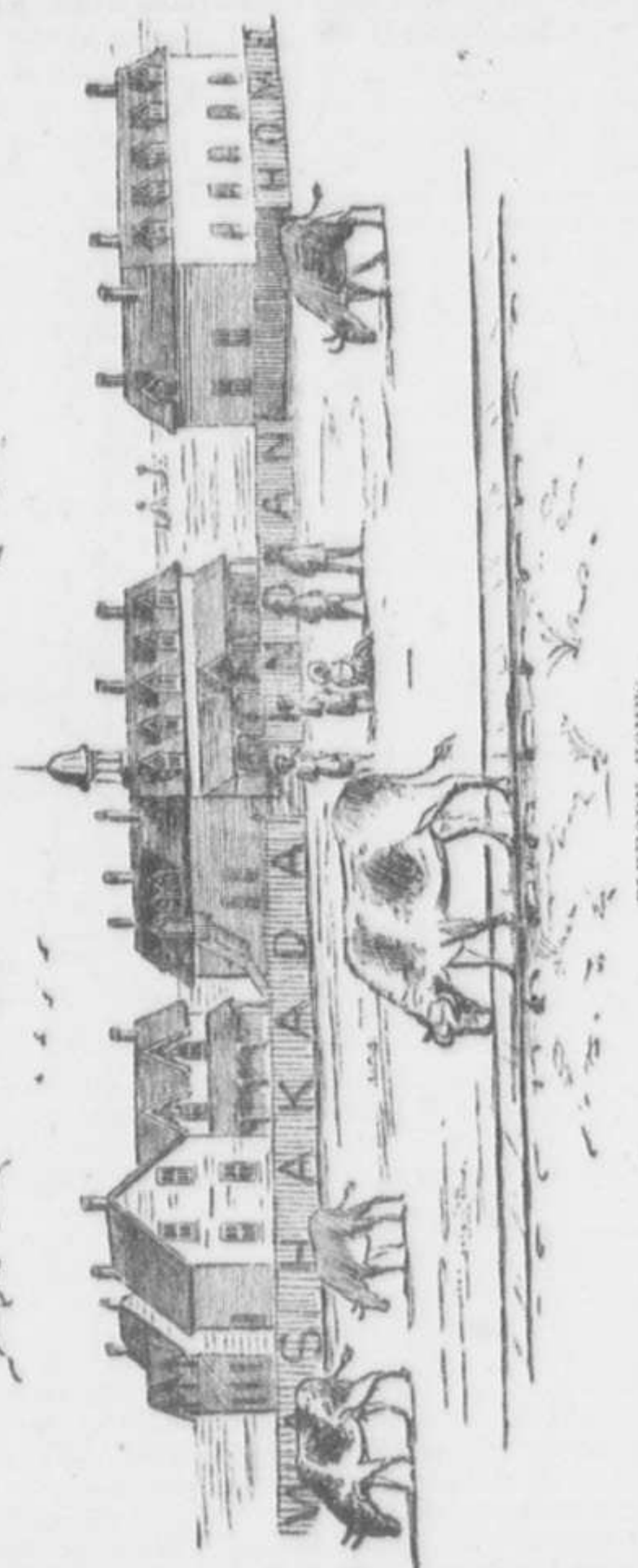
making, and, perhaps by-and-by, harness-making. We also erected telegraph poles, and the Shingwauk, Hospital, Industrial and Factory are now all connected by telegraph. Besides being a convenience, it is also teaching the boys an employment which may some day be of use to them. The accompanying bird's-eye view of the Shingwauk shows at a glance what our improvements

have been, and the sites also are marked for other additional buildings, viz.: A "School Building," where both boys and girls will go to school and have their meals; a new "Wawanosh Home," and a new laundry. It may take three or four years to complete all these buildings. When all are in operation we hope to have accommodation for about one hundred and fifty students.

Our Wawanosh Home is at present sadly overcrowded. We have only beds for twenty-six girls, but have had to accommodate from twenty-eight to twenty-nine girls. After Xmas two or three girls are going out to service and thus the number will be reduced to suit the accommodation. One happy feature about the Wawanosh, especially noticeable this winter, is that the girls' fingers are, with few exceptions, always busily employed. Nearly all now have learned to knit, and quite a lot of pairs of socks and mitts are very neatly knitted every week by the girls during their play hours; they receive ten cents a pair. One great drawback in connection with the Wawanosh Home is its distance from the Shingwauk—nearly three miles. It is a long walk for the girls to come to church on Sundays, and a long way to bring a sick girl to the hospital. When our new buildings are completed these difficulties will be obviated.

#### THE ELKHORN HOMES.

The Homes at Elkhorn—the Kasota for boys, and the Washakada for girls, are now entirely completed and in full operation. Six hundred and forty acres of farm land also have been acquired some four miles from the Institution, and when the Spring opens, we hope, with Government assistance, to put up necessary buildings and commence farming operations. Mr. McKenzie has proved himself a very efficient and painstaking Superintendent, and Mrs. and Miss Vidal are doing all they

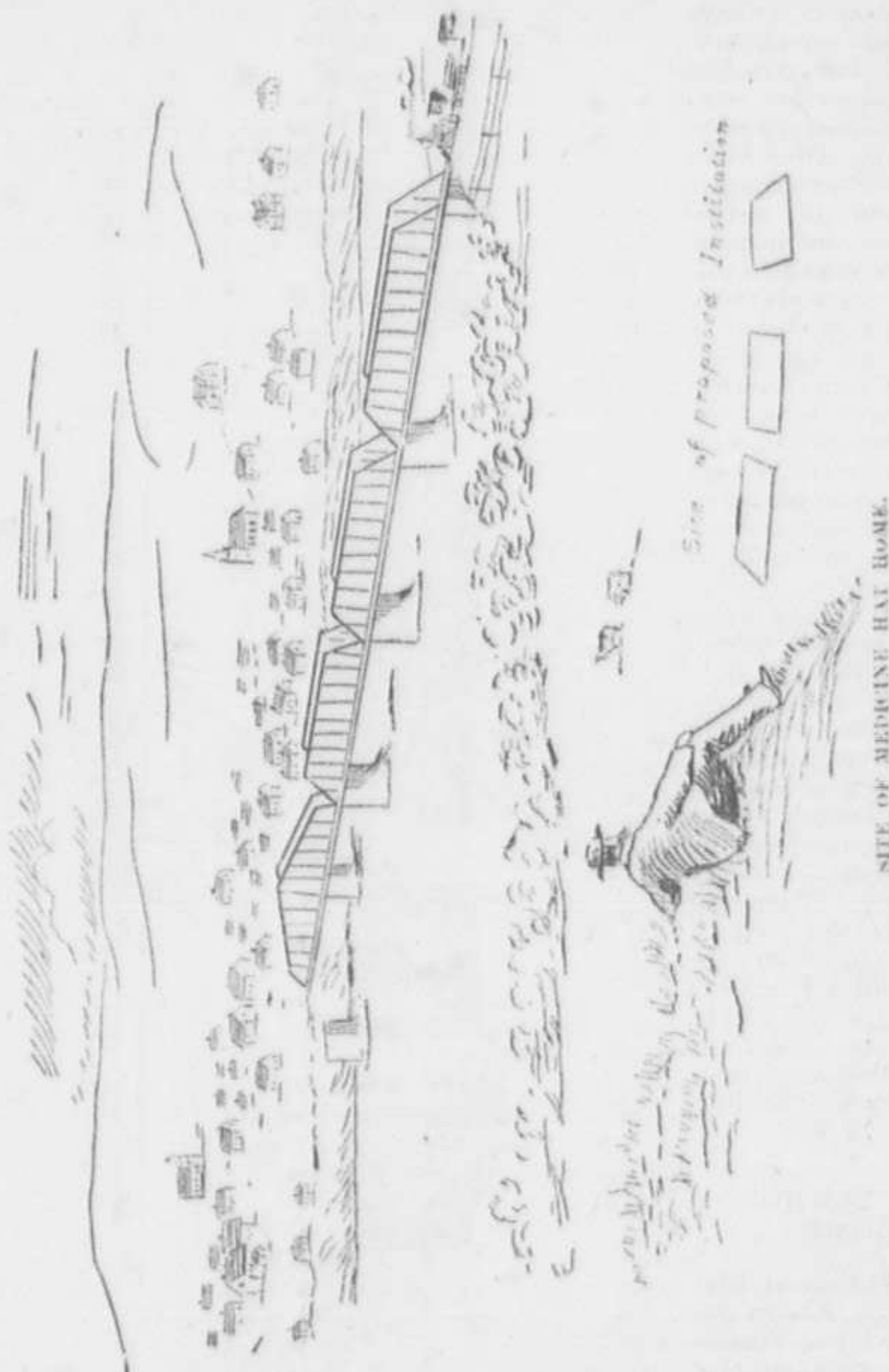


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can to make the Elkhorn Homes a success; they have, however, difficulties to contend with from which we are comparatively free at the Shingwauk and Wawanosh Homes, namely: the unwillingness of the parents to allow their children to come to school, and many a time has there been a long and hard chase after runaways. The Indian children in the neighborhood of Elkhorn are many shades wilder than those which have been usually received at the Sault Ste. Marie Homes, and it seems almost impossible to impress upon



the prairie Indians the benefit that civilization and education is going to be to their children. So far we have had thirty-four pupils at Elkhorn, but the average number at one time has seldom exceeded twenty. We hope that the Government will do as has been done in the States—appoint *native police* on every Reserve, and make it their special duty to bring the children to school, and when there to keep them there. As will be seen by our Financial Report

it has cost us \$378 during the year going after and getting in our pupils, and no pension of any kind has been made for this expense. Our Governor General Lord Stanley, and his staff, did us the honor to pay our Elkhorn schools a visit on the occasion of his late tour in the West.

#### OUR FINANCES.

Our finances at the present time are sufficiently low to cause us a little uneasiness. We had hoped to begin the year with a small balance; but no, taking into account the balance deficit last year and the unpaid Government grant to put against it, and the balance deficit this year and the unpaid Government grant to put against it, we find ourselves about \$1000 poorer than we were a year ago. Our expenses have increased greatly, and the general contribution list has not increased in proportion. We must hope, however, for the best, and believe that He who has helped us hitherto and made our work prosper, will continue to bless us and raise up new friends to help us. So far from giving in or closing down any part of our work, we are looking forward, if God will, to a still further extension this next summer. Already has the land been acquired for a new Institution at Medicine Hat, Government has been applied to for a grant, and the answer so far is favorable.

Medicine Hat is an excellent location—approved by the Department, favored by the Bishop—and is in close contiguity to numerous large Indian Reserves, on which nearly all the people are untaught and heathen.

We trust that our friends will now come to our aid and help us in the erection of this new Institution at Medicine Hat—also that many new Sunday Schools may be induced to take up our work and aid us by adopting and providing for an Indian protegee in one or other of our schools.

#### List of Pupils at the Shingwauk, Wawanosh and Washakada Homes during the year 1889.

##### LEFT DURING THE YEAR.

1. David Osahge was working at the Shingwauk till towards end of January, when he went to Ottawa to enter on his duties as clerk in the Indian Department.
2. Thomas Johnson was sick during the latter part of the winter, and in May (1889) was sent to his home, where after lingering for some time he died. He was an earnest Christian boy.
3. Edward William went to his home in October, and is not coming back. His time was nearly completed, and he is now engaged in farming.
4. Peter Oshkahboos was away all winter on account of sickness. He came back to us for a few months during the summer, but returned to his home in the fall.
5. Amos Scotchman was very sickly last winter and spring, so we sent him home in the summer, and advised him to remain at home for a year.
6. Isaac Sampson did not return to us after the summer holidays. His time was nearly completed, and he is now engaged in farming.
7. Peter Stone: Poor little Peter was very ill with a scrofulous complaint all the winter, and was well nursed in the hospital by our good friend, Miss Pigot. He died February 26th, and was buried in our little cemetery.
8. Peter Negawmewenah is the naughty boy who tried to set the Shingwauk Home on fire Sept. 12th. He has been sent to the Reformatory.
9. Francis Baker was ill at his home with typhoid fever when school reopened the 19th of August, so could not come back. We have not heard whether he recovered.
10. Charlie Baker did not come back after the holidays because his brother Francis was sick, and his father was unwilling to let him come alone.
11. James Sharpe was sick a great part of the winter with pulmonary complaint, and when spring came we sent him to his home. We hear that he is somewhat better, and wants to come back to the Shingwauk.

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12. *Abram Isaac* was sickly in the spring, so we advised him not to return after the summer holidays. He had already been with us nearly his full life.

13. *Batiste Dosum* was sent for home (north of Lake Superior,) on account of his mother being sick, late in the fall. He will probably return to us in the spring.

14. *Dominik Hanton* was sent home sick late in the summer, having a large scrofulous swelling.

15. *Peter Megis*, aged 27, came to us when school recommenced after summer holidays, but found it too hard to learn at his advanced age, so left November 6th.

16. *John West*, aged 28, came at the same time, and left for the same cause.

17. *Adam King*, aged 16, came at the same time, was discontented, and showed no disposition to learn, so was allowed to leave.

18. *David King*, aged 13, a nice bright boy, came to the Home in May, was very happy and contented, and had begun learning telegraphing, but was taken away Oct. 14th by a foolish father. He is very anxious to come back to us.

19. *Joseph Ben* was formerly at the Shingwauk. Has been several months this past summer at the Kasota Home, Elkhorn, but obliged to leave on account of sickness.

20. *Bella Matthews*, aged 17, has gone out to service in Sault Ste. Marie, and is doing well.

21. *Philamine Sampson*, aged 16, has gone to service in Mr. Wilson's family, and is doing well.

22. *Louisa Tousseau* was prevented from returning to the Wawanosh Home through Roman Catholic influences. It is a disappointment both to ourselves and also to those who were kindly paying for her support.

23. *Maggie Causley* was sent for home late in the fall on account of sickness in the family. The Wawanosh has been too crowded to take her back.

24. *Mary Kadal* was a kind gentle girl, loved by all. She took sick during the summer, became consumptive, died Sept. 8th, and was buried in our cemetery.

25. *Hannah Grey* had a scrofulous swelling in her neck when she went home for summer holidays, so did not return.

26. *Emily Nauway* was sickly all through last winter, so we thought it best not to take her back after the summer holidays.

27. *Sarah A. Thomas* was a girl who seemed incapable of learning, so we refused to take her back after the summer holidays.

28. *Charlotte Baker* did not return after the summer holidays on account of the unwillingness of her grandmother.

29. *Marion Beeser* was at the Washakada Home, Elkhorn, until the end of August, when, her time being completed, she went to her home at Serpent River.

143. *John A. Maggrah*—age 21; Ottawa, from Manitoulin Island. Was five years at Shingwauk. Then taught school nine months at Elkhorn. Is now at St. John's College. Hopes to become a missionary. Supported by C.M.S. grant and by Ecangelical Churchman.

*I GIVE and bequeath unto the Rev. Edward Francis Wilson, or the Treasurer for the time being of the Lake Superior Mission, Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario, the sum of ..... ; to be paid with all convenient speed after my decease, exclusively out of such part of my personal estate not hereby specially disposed of, as I may by law bequeath to charitable purposes; and I hereby lawfully charge such part of my estate, with the said sum upon trust, to be applied toward the general purposes of the said mission and its various Homes, for the Christian training and civilization of Indian children; and the receipt of the Rev. Edward Francis Wilson, or the Treasurer for the time being of the said mission, shall be a sufficient discharge for the said Legacy. (And I direct that the duty upon the said Legacy be paid by my executors out of the said fund)*

The will or codicil giving the bequest must be signed by the testator in the presence of two witnesses, who must subscribe their names in his presence and in the presence of each other.

NOTE.—This testament must have been executed one year previous to death of Testator, to give it effect over Mortmain Acts.

*In reply to yours of the  
18th inst (No 3212-) received yesterday -*

*I herewith enclose you rough plans of  
the Shingwauk & Wawanosh Homes - showing  
the position of water barrels & water pails as  
precaution against fire.*

*We have also a hoisting apparatus for rails - &  
a year or so ago had a regular fire brigade with  
tin helmets & breastplates - & used to have practice  
about once a week - the alarm on the fire house  
being sometimes in the middle of the night - The  
firehouse is always kept hanging in the school room &  
is blown directly there in an alarm of fire. We  
have on 7 times succeeded in quenching fires - some  
of them quite serious ones.*

*Chaper of pupils - lack of time - & illness sometimes  
following from boys getting over heated & wet on cold winter  
nights - have been the hindrances to our keeping up the  
practice. Our nearest point for water supply -*

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
