



The Canadian Junior Drying Tumbler—Continued

Single Motor — Belted Motor Driven

Coils

Shall be located within the housing at rear and consist of 202 lineal feet of one-inch iron pipe, connected at each end with right and left return bends.

Fans

Shall be equipped with 2 single fans of the multi-blade type, 7½ inches in diameter, mounted on fan shaft beneath cylinder, for circulating air through the coils and thence through the cylinder and out through an 8-inch duct, leading to rear of machine. Shall be fitted with screened air intakes.

Gearing

Gears shall be machine cut from solid blanks of sufficient width and diameter, and provided with suitable cast-iron gear guards. Shall be equipped with hand wheel gear lock for bringing cylinder door into position and locking same.

Driving Mechanism

Reversing type shall consist of one tight and two loose pulleys, each 10 inches in diameter, requiring 1-inch and 1½-inch belts, operating in connection with a worm and cam movement, producing a fixed number of reverse revolutions of the cylinder.

Non-reversing type shall consist of one tight and one loose pulley, taking a 1-inch belt to operate cylinder. Cylinder shall revolve in one direction only.

Driving mechanism shall be mounted on cast-iron adjustable swiveling arm, bolted to machine, and embody strength, simplicity and reliability. Shall be 3-inch diameter tight and loose pulleys on fan shaft, taking 2-inch belt to operate fans. Fan belt shall be equipped with foot treadle shifter and shall be protected by sheet-metal guard.

Electrical Equipment

Specifications for electrical equipment cover:

- (a) Direct current, 110 or 220 volts.
- (b) Alternating current, 110 or 220 volts, single phase, 50 or 60 cycle.

Motor

Shall be Canadian design, of ample capacity and proper speed to insure quiet running, guaranteed to meet operating characteristics of machine and shall be mounted on tumbler, driving same by belt to overhung shaft. Shall be supported by two cast-iron uprights bolted to frame of machine and shall be equipped with pulleys of proper size for belting to fans, motor and driving pulleys.

Both direct and alternating current motors shall be horizontal type and insulated to withstand heat and dampness incidental to laundry machinery.

Direct Current

Shall be furnished with grid covers, as protection to commutator and brush rigging.

Alternating Current

Shall be squirrel-cage, constant-speed type.

Starting Device

- (a) Direct Current — Shall consist of enclosed hand starter and line switch with fuses.
- (b) Alternating Current — Shall consist of enclosed switch with fuses.

Wiring

Shall be furnished in conduit between motor and starting device. Proper terminals for line connections shall be left at starting device.





Tenders opened today indicate project will cost seventeen thousand dollars using wrapped and coated steel pipe in place of wood stave pipe as reported on by Tredcroft in June nineteen twenty five. Stop. Kindly advise if contracts are to be awarded at this figure. Stop. Immediate action required if system is to be completed in time for school opening."

Please advise me as soon as possible what action to take in view of the increase of the estimated cost from \$12,000. to \$17,000.

I beg to report that the brickwork is all finished. The pressed brickwork has been cleaned down and looks very well indeed.

The roof framing has been completed and shingling can be commenced as soon as the tinsmith has placed the galvanized iron around the eaves. I expect this will be done tomorrow.

The carpenters are at work covering the ceilings with shiplap in readiness for the metal ceiling.

The electricians and the plumbers have completed their rough work and the steam fitters are getting along with their work.

It is as difficult to secure lathers and plasterers as it was to secure bricklayers and so far the contractors have only been able to get two lathers.

In the meantime the plasterers are getting on with their work on the hollow tile, until they can get to work on the metal lath.



In the boys' wing, now nearing completion, specifications call for concrete floor in the bath room shoe repair shop, broom and clothes room and stairs. The inspector of construction has written to the Dept. for a small change which I hope you will approve. I did not find concrete satisfactory anywhere for stairs nor for public places used a great deal by children. Concrete floors are never clean, they are always dusty and therefore very unsanitary. The extra cost is small. Moreover concrete floors have not been specified for the present wing used by the girls.

You will oblige me greatly by approving of the change recommended by the Inspector of Construction.

The heating engineer suggests that a valve be placed on the main close to the boiler so that the whole of the new wing may be controlled from there.

I think the suggestion is a good one as if anything went wrong or for any reason it became necessary to close this wing it could be done without affecting the rest of the building.

The cost would be \$62.40 for which I enclose estimate. The same thing would apply to the East wing and the main building and I enclose estimates of \$114.85 and \$77.90 covering cost of this work if you should desire to have it done.

When the boiler inspector was here a week or two ago he ordered valves to be placed on the damper regulators.

The Principal asked me to secure an estimate of the cost and submit it to you and I enclose it herewith (\$33.00)


