Dear Mr. Hoey:

Replying to your letter of April 28th,
File: 153-0-1, with regard to a school site at Ucluelet
being nearer to Alert Bay, I may say that I noticed at
the time the statement was made, and was sure there
was some mistake. With regard to a school at Ucluelet
serving the area now served by the Ahousaht Residential
School, the statement would of course have been correct.
However, I had not commented upon it to anyone, for as
you say, it had no bearing on the erection of a school
at Alberni.

I have been waiting to hear from the
Commissioner with regard to our conference. Captain Barry
informed me that he would be away from the office until
the end of June, and was leaving the afternoon of the
day upon which I saw him, and that it would be necessary
for me to take up the matter of the eligibility of pupils
to enter Coqualeetza School, with the Commissioner.
I think I shall suggest to the Commissioner that he accept
my list of pupils as submitted to our committee in Toronto
and send it to the Indian Agents concerned and allow them
to pass on the list, making any changes that they feel
right. The Indian Agent is of course a man who has the
final word, and I am quite agreeable to abiding, by his
recommendations in each case, or if he should differ, the
matter would be then one for consultation with the
Commissioner or with yourself. However, I do not
anticipate any such action being necessary. Your Indian
Agents know the homes, and I am quite sure that we can
come to satisfactory understanding in the case of these
pupils.

Dear Dr. Cochrane:

I desire to acknowledge receipt of your letter of May 11, in which you ask from me a more definite and explicit assurance that the Coqualeetza school, if taken over by the Department, would be operated as a T. B. sanatorium on a strictly non-sectarian basis.

In my letter to you of May 8 I stated: "The policy is that this sanatorium (Coqualeetza) should be conducted as a government institution in the sense that the hospital in operation at Cu'Appelle is conducted". The institution at Cu'Appelle was built by the Government and is operated as a government institution. I have not at any time received a complaint with respect to either the sectarian bias or efficiency of the institution. In fact, I find it difficult to understand how sectarian bias could develop in an institution conducted in the sense that the Cu'Appelle hospital is conducted.

Answer

The school at Coqualeetza is a government-owned institution, and should it be decided to operate it as a sanatorium, provision would be made for its operation in the regular parliamentary estimates. Under existing





RESOLUTION ADOPTED BY THE EXECUTIVE OF THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS
OF THE UNITED CHURCH OF CANADA, AT ITS MEETING, JUNE 12th, 1939.

"RE PROPOSAL THAT COQUALEETZA RESIDENTIAL SCHOOL BE TAKEN OVER BY THE
DOMINION GOVERNMENT FOR USE AS A SANATORIUM FOR INDIAN TUBERCULAR PATIENTS.-

"After hearing the statement of the Secretary in reference to the negotiations with the Indian Affairs Branch of the Department of Mines and Resources, and also in regard to the correspondence with the representatives of the British Columbia Conference, the Executive resolves to approve of the handing over of the Coqualeetza Indian Residential School to be used as a Government Tuberculosis Sanatorium, when the Secretaries are satisfied that the following essential matters are safeguarded:

- "(1) That adequate provision is made for the education of United Church children, now in Coqualeetza, in a new and larger residential school to be erected in the immediate future at Alberni, and in improved day schools, or additions to existing day schools, at such places on the British Columbia coast as the Secretaries may think necessary.
- "(2) That, during the transition period, and as long as necessary, some of the United Church pupils from British Columbia are accommodated in the Edmonton Residential School.
- "(3) That we have adequate assurance from the Department that the proposed Sanatorium shall be conducted on an entirely non-sectarian basis.
- "(4) That the Department consents to name the new school the 'Coqualeetza Residential School at Alberni.'
- "(5) That the date at which Coqualeetza shall cease to be used as a residential school shall be a matter of consultation and negotiation between the Board of Home Missions and the Department."

I have read with interest Dr. Stone's memorandum which you enclosed. I think, as you suggest, it covers the main points I have raised in my letter. I realize, of course, that the amount of work you can do as a Department depends upon the annual amount made available by the Government.


I am glad that Dr. Stone states that it would not be advisable from a professional standpoint to move tuberculosis patients from the North to the South in British Columbia, and that he would not, in any case, advise it. The two reservations which he makes are not at all unreasonable, and I am sure that we as a Board of Home Missions of the United Church will do all we can to provide the best possible care for any tuberculosis patients from amongst the Indian children or adults of Northern British Columbia.

Re - Coqualeetza Residential School

My dear Mr. Crerar:

The Executive of the Board of Home Missions, at its meeting last week, dealt with the proposal that Coqualeetza Residential School be taken over by the Dominion Government for use as a Sanatorium for Indian tubercular patients. I am enclosing the resolution adopted by the Executive in regard to the matter. I think it requires very little comment.

The Secretaries cannot give a final answer until we get a report from Captain Scott in reference to the matter referred to in Clause (1) - that is, until Captain Scott and Captain Barry have been able to consider together, as they were directed to do, the placing, either at Alberni or Edmonton, or in improved day schools on the coast, of all the children who are now in Coqualeetza. I have a letter from Mr. Scott, saying he has not been able to get in touch with Captain Barry, because the latter has been visiting schools in the North. He thinks, however, that they ought to be able to have the conference the end of this month or early in July.

As far as Nos. (2) and (3) are concerned, you have already given us adequate assurance that you will meet our wishes in regard to these two matters.

We shall be glad to have your consent to the requests contained in Clauses (4) and (5).

We are just as anxious as the Department is to get this matter finally settled. I believe this is in the best interests of both the Government and the Church. You will see from what I have written that the final decision, as far as we are concerned, rests now with the Secretaries of our Board, and that we are waiting to be satisfied about Clauses (1), (4) and (5) before agreeing to the proposal in the name of The United Church of Canada.

It is urgently suggested that the Department give favorable consideration to the need for the following additions to present Day Schools, and for new schools on the Reserves mentioned:

Kincolith Skeena Agency, and extra room to be added

Ahousaht West Coast Agency: a Day School of one Room to provide accommodation for from 30 to 40 children.

Kitimaat Bella Coola Agency: I new one room Day School .

Clo'oose West Coast Agency: I new one room Day School.

Ohiat " " " : I new one room Day School.


Bella Coola Bella Coola Agency: Perhaps, later, an extra room on the existing Day School.


Cape Mudge, Kwakwalth Agency : Perhaps, later, one extra room on existing Day School.

The above schools have been listed in order of the need for urgency, and are necessary for a satisfactory solution of the problem inherent in caring for the pupilage of Coqualeetza Residential School already enrolled, and for such pupils as are in need of school privileges as set forth above, at West Coast points.

While the suggested plan as above, leaves some fifty children provided for for the time being, it is felt that these will, at time find a place as pupilage of the new School assumes normal conditions. As the suggested programme is actually worked out, doubt the extra Day School accommodation will take care of even more than the number allocated to them herein. Pupilage from northern points will in some measure be reduced also, as time passes, when shrinkage owing to illness etc requiring pupils to leave School is considered, it is quite possible that the fifty pupils on the West Coast will find places in the New School-or at least, majority of them. The above statement is respectfully submitted to the Department at Ottawa, and to the Board of Home Missions of the United Church of Canada, in Toronto, for favorable consideration:

Project 18. The addition of a third classroom to the PORT SIMPSON INDIAN DAY SCHOOL to accommodate the increasing attendance and take some of the girls who will be discharged from the Crosby Girls' Home to make room for orphans and destitute cases from the North at that residential school. The third teacher could be accommodated at the school with little difficulty by making use of space above the suggested new room. The school is under United Church auspices and in the Skeena River Agency.

Project 19. The addition of a second classroom at BELLA COOLA to accommodate the attendance which will by then be greatly increased at this point. No teacher's residence would be necessary. The school is under United Church auspices and in the Bella Coola Agency.

Project 20. The erection of a new school on SEA BIRD ISLAND to take the place of the present school held in the council house. The school would not of necessity require a teacher's residence though this might be an advantage. It would be administered under the Roman Catholic Church and would be in the Lytton Agency.

Project 21. The erection of a new school and teacher's residence at ROCHER DEBOULE to take the place of the present very old log building used as a schoolroom and for which rent is paid. This school is under the Roman Catholic Church auspices and in the Babine Agency.

Project 22. The erection of a consolidated two or three room school with or without teachers' residence on the TSARTLIP Indian Reserve to absorb the present Tsartlip Indian Day School and accommodate the Roman Catholic and other children living on the Saanich Reserves. This school would be in the Cowichan Agency.

Of the above projects those numbered 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 13, 17, 18, and 19, are in a very definite way either the corollary of the absorption of Coqualeetza and Ahousaht and the late Alberni Indian Residential Schools into one new residential school, or their necessity has been greatly hastened by the changes contemplated by the Honorable Minister and Department.

In the case of the present small Indian Residential Schools at Kitamaat and Port Simpson, I consider that instructions might well be issued that deserving children and particularly orphans from the northern part of the Province who are not Catholic children should be given preference over local children who could very well attend the existing or proposed day schools.

Much care has been taken in making the above suggestions and many hours spent in thinking out the problems involved. It is hoped that this report may be of definite assistance to the officials of the Department. It is certainly submitted with respect and as a professional suggestion of what might well be done in the way of the erection of new schools and additional rooms during the next three or four years.
