1: With regard to the Doalittle family, who Mr. Woodyatt states were paid arrears in 1874, I find that their case is not at all similar. These persons were established as being less than quarter blood Indians, and not because of marriage with foreign Indians or absence from the Reserve. The action was found to be illegal, and their restoration was ordered, and they were paid arrears in 1879.

2: The same remark applies to A. Russell and to the heirs of the Doalittle family.

3: George

3: George Peters. His case is not similar to that of Mrs. Gladiator. He was a minor and was attending the Mohawk Institute, and during that time his interest moneys were allowed to accumulate and the amount was paid to him on his leaving the Institute.

4: Mary Stathe was an orphan at an orphan's home and, as in the previous case, her interest money was allowed to accumulate until she returned to the Reserve, when it was paid to her.

5: Peter Froese was also a pupil in the Mohawk Institute and his arrears were paid him in like manner as



as in the other cases quoted.

6°. George Latham was also a prig in the Mohawk Institute and his arrears were paid him in like manner as in the other cases quoted.

7°. John Fraser.

This case is somewhat similar to that of Mrs. Gladstone.

He left the Reserve for eleven years. He was restored to the prig list on his return, but no arrears were paid him.

8°. Peter Garland's case is not similar.

He was off the list for one year and received no arrears on his return.

9°. Geo. D. Jones works at his trade in Brantford, and

and receives his interest money.
