Dear Sir:

As requested in your letter of February 18th No. 155-0-5 I am again bringing the urgent need of a new sink for the Kootenay Indian Residential School to your attention.

What is required is 1 only all Monel Metal fixture 156" x 26" wide, consisting of a Drain board and back with two 30x30x12 Monel Metal Sinks inset complete with outlets and continuous waste to extend to end of fixture on angle iron frame Price \$475.00.

Reference Twyfords General catalogue No. 324-4. I cannot too strongly stress the urgent need of this fixture being installed at the earliest possible moment.

As regards the floor of this kitchen, it is also in a hopeless condition, with large squares of tile entirely stripped. The cost quoted by F. Parks & Company for new tile and labour in connection with the setting of same is \$35. The price is reasonable and the expenditure, if at all possible, should be approved.


Dear Sir:

The Department is in receipt of your letter of the 10th instant, with reference to the new sink requested for the Kootenay Indian Residential School.

As requested in the estimates submitted from your agency last Fall, provision was made in the current year's appropriation for certain funds for the purchase of laundry equipment and a grain binder at the Kootenay Residential School. If the Department now provides a new sink, it will mean that some of the articles referred to above cannot be supplied this year. You should discuss this phase of the situation with the Principal, and, if he prefers the sink, arrangements will be made for its purchase.

You may expend \$35.00 for material and labour in repairing the kitchen floor.

KOOTENAY AGENCY INSPECTION REPORT NO. 12, MAY 1937.

St Eugene Mission Indian Residential School.

At the date of my visit, the 21st of April, there were 89 children in the school. Only a few being still on the T.B. list and kept segregated. This is from the health point of view, a great improvement over a number of years ago, and the main credit for this must be given to the late principal and Dr. Green,

I found the fire fighting apparatus in good order, extinguishers filled, fire escapes easy of access. Fire axes need to be placed at partitions. The dormitories were clean and in good order, as were the class rooms.

The children had had for breakfast Cereal, bread, honey, coffee.
Dinner: Beef stew, spinach, potatoes.
Supper: Macaroni-cheese, bread and jam.
With milk three times a day.

Since my last visit, a number of Sisters had been placed in the school, and everything was much cleaner, and tidier than for many years. They have certainly pulled things together, though for various reasons, working under a great handicap, as will be shown later in this report. It is time, therefore, and only fair to them that these matters be given consideration.

Firstly: The floors throughout the dormitories are a disgrace, worn out through age, and impossible, with the best will in the world to keep clean and sanitary. The floor in the kitchen, laid in small ceramic tiles, is constantly coming to pieces. It should be relaid in cemented linoleum tile, or crushed or polished marble terrazine, I think it is called. In addition, this is a small and dark kitchen, with unsanitary walls. They should be white tiled anyway half way up for cleanliness and light. Sinks for washing up dishes, etc are totally inadequate. Two more sinks for this purpose should be placed in the dining room (no room elsewhere). This is important too, in that there are still some T.B. cases. A wheeled serving table should also be supplied as at other schools. The kitchen stove wants repairs. The hot water supply is quite inadequate, both for washing up and the laundry. A steam boiler for this purpose should be installed. Further, as regards the laundry, the clothes drying closet is out of order and not in use for want of steam to heat same. New steam pipes should be installed at the same time as the boiler. Further, there is no form of refrigeration in this school and in the summer, or winter for that matter, food is apt to go bad. An electric refrigerator should be installed. However, this is impossible, as the present electrical power is inadequate for the needs right now. The engine is old, worn out, and costly to run. I should suggest a 12 H.P. Deisel engine.

In fact the whole school wants repairs, replacements, and improvements if it is to be continued as a Residential school. A thorough survey by an architect or competent person should be undertaken. Personally, I think, four day schools would be more satisfactory, except perhaps for the prevalence of T.B. in this agency.

Lavatories on the Girls' side of the school were clean and well looked after. On the boys' side they were a disgrace. Excreta caked hard on many of the seats. I must say in most of the schools I find the boys' toilets more or less unsatisfactory. It would seem as though the class of men placed in charge were insufficiently trained in cleanliness, or careless in the matter.


The following amounts were provided in our current year's appropriation for the Kootenay Residential School:-

Laundry equipment	-	\$ 870.00
Grain binder	-	230.00
General repairs	-	<u>300.00</u>
T o t a l	-	<u>\$1,400.00</u>

We have already authorized expenditures during the current fiscal year of \$100.00, and this leaves a balance of \$1,300.00.

The Department does not require the balance spent in the exact way it has been provided, if there are other repairs or improvements that the Principal and yourself consider more necessary. You should consult him at once and advise the Department at the earliest possible date regarding the repairs and replacements which you consider advisable, giving an estimate of the cost in each case. It should be kept in mind that the total amount must not exceed \$1,300.00.


Reverend Sir,-

I am in receipt of Mr. Pratt's memorandum of June 28th, regarding the purchase of agricultural equipment for the St. Eugene Mission.

The Kootenay Indian Residential School, Cranbrook, British Columbia, (Electoral District of Kootenay East) is sometimes referred to as the St. Eugene Mission.

In our Appropriation for the current fiscal year, provision was made for purchase of the following:-

Laundry equipment	-	\$ 870.
Grain binder	-	230.
General repairs	-	<u>300.</u>
Total	-	\$ 1,400.

We have already authorized expenditures at this school during the current fiscal year amounting to \$100., and therefore there is a balance of \$1,300 available.

Recently, we received a report from Inspector Pragnell, stating that certain repairs at the school were urgently required, and, on June 18th, a letter was directed to Indian Agent Irwin, requesting him to report fully regarding the best manner of expending the \$1,300 available in the current year's appropriation. His reply has not yet been received, but, if he recommends the purchase of any agricultural equipment, the matter will be brought to your attention before any authority for purchase is given.

Dear Sir:

I wish to acknowledge and thank you for your letter of June 18 File No. 15505, with reference to extracts from Inspector Pragnell's report concerning conditions in the Kootenay Indian Residential School. The Inspector's report is entirely accurate, so much so that in my opinion, substantial appropriations for general repairs will be required for several years if the school and school premises are to be kept in a reasonably fair state of preservation.

With reference to the second page of your letter which states that official letters of April 1 and April 27 respectively, authorizes repairs to the stove at a cost of \$65, and \$35 for material and labor. In repairing the kitchen floor, as you surmised these repairs were not carried out at the time of the Inspector's visit in deference to a request from the dietitian that the work be delayed until the holiday season. The Sister in charge of this work explained that it would be most difficult for her to carry on with her task of preparing meals for so many people if the workmen were busy over-hauling the floor and making repairs to the stove. The holiday season, however, has now arrived and the repairs referred to have been completed.

The principal and the dietician in charge are particularly anxious to have a new sink, as referred to in my previous letter, installed during the month of July, price quoted as submitted to the Department recently is \$475. Kindly advise if this purchase may be made very soon in order that the new sink, so urgently needed, may be installed during the present month. It is understood that laundry equipment will not be purchased this year. *The principal will advise shortly how he wishes the balance of the money to be used.*




