SIR:-

I beg to forward you herewith, a communication from the Reverend Principal of Coqualeetza Indian Residential School, in which he sets forth the need for a Steam Ironer in their laundry.

Apparently, the cost of such a machine, new, is \$3,000.00, but there is a good used one available at \$1,000.00.

This seems a great deal of money, and I refrain from comment, other than to remark that there would appear to be two sides to the school situation:-

On the one hand we have the fact that undoubtedly the ironing at this Institution is very heavy, and done in the present manner takes up a great deal of the girls' time, besides exposing the present machinery to a heavy steam strain. The proposed installation would do away with both these drawbacks.

On the other hand, having their future welfare in mind, it appears to me that too much machine help in these schools, useful as it is in operating the Institution, is not the best kind of preparation for life in a shack on a Reserve, where the ability to carry on domestic duties with plain everyday appliances will count more than academic proficiency, or a knowledge of steam ironers and electric stoves. That appears to me, to be one place these big schools fail to function.

Under the circumstances and conditions there is no doubt this machine would be very useful, and if the money is available would probably warrant the expenditure.

Dear Mr. Daunt:

I would be grateful if you would bring to the attention of the Department, my request of last August, for a Steam Ironer for our Laundry. I pointed out at that time, the urgent need.

With about three thousand pieces going through, per week, with our present equipment, the girls are kept working from four to five days weekly. It is not only hard on them physically, but it renders it almost impossible to find time, outside the classroom periods, for instruction along Home Economics and Handicraft lines, which is vitally necessary for the practical training of these children. I pointed out also, how wasteful our present system is, by using live steam to bring the water in our washer, up from cold to washing heat. It is also hard on the cylinder itself, and in view of the fact that the Department has just installed a new washer, I would like again, to point out that using steam in this way creates a pressure, which is hard on the cylinder.

A new Ironer, 100", two roll, one pass, belt driven machine, would cost in the neighborhood of \$3,000.00, but I pointed out, that Stanley Brock Limited could supply a used ironer, passed by the Inspector and in good condition, two roll, one pass, 100" machine installed for \$1,000.00. This machine has been discarded, ^{by a city laundry} not because of any deficiency or breakdown in it, but simply because it had become too small and required four attendants, two putting the goods through and two taking them away. The new machines have a return apron, which enables the two workers who feed the machine, to take away also, and thus saves 50% of their labor cost.

By installing a hot water tank, which could be secured second-hand, for two hundred dollars, with heating coil complete, we could use the exhaust steam from the ironer, to create a plentiful supply of hot water, which could be piped direct to the washing cylinder. In view of the fact that the Department will be asked to furnish a high pressure steam boiler this coming year, I would like to emphasize again, the gain that there would be in having this equipment, from the standpoint of decreased fuel consumption.

The main thing, however, is the fact that our present system keeps our girls too long in the laundry. If they could get rid of doing all the heavy flat work, such as sheets, towels pillow cases,

etc., it would speed up the process, as these articles could go direct from our tumbler, or dryer, through the steam mangle and be finished with. The training of the girls in ironing, would not at all be interfered with, because all articles of personal clothing would still be washed and ironed individually.

I have been going through our roll of pupils and beg to point out, as showing that we have fewer and fewer girls available. Six years ago we had three girls from 6 to 8 years; today we have 15. Six years ago we had eighty-six girls from 9 to 16 years of age; today we have only seventy. Six years ago we had 16 girls who were over 16 years of age and today we have three. The proportion of Grade VIII and High School girls is very much the same, so that it does not effect the depletion of available labor. Six years ago there were seven girls in Grade VIII and High School and today we have five.

This will make clear, I am sure, the need for doing something to lessen the time that our girls spend in the laundry. I am most anxious to do even more than we are doing this year, for these girls, in the way of a practical training in house keeping and home making, dress making and handicrafts such as spinning, carding, dyeing and knitting wools into all kinds of articles for clothing. Of course if the Department felt like giving us a new machine, well and good, but I feel that this second hand machine, if passed by the Government Inspector, would be adequate, and in view of the necessity mentioned above, of installing a new High Pressure steam boiler, I feel that the Department might well give the matter consideration.


Rev. Sir:
