

I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of Departmental letter dated November 29th, ultimo, No. 156-0-5, in regard to the proposed work and necessary innovations at the Alert Bay Indian Residential School. In reply I beg to say that I am in touch with both the Principal and the Indian Agent in regard to the carrying out of all the instructions contained in the above mentioned letter and the several matters therein will be given careful and detailed attention as expeditiously as may be possible.

Concerning the last paragraph of the Department's letter requesting report as to which of two items is most urgently required at the present time, the items referred to being the provision of an 8 H.P. Petters semi-Diesel engine and a new set of storage batteries for the lighting plant, I beg to transmit herewith copy of a letter received today dated December 10th, instant, with enclosures, from Mr. Principal Anfield in which it is recommended that a Coyle L.P.55 cell battery, 110 Volt, 106 ampere hours, at a delivered price in Alert Bay of \$435.00 is of primary importance and will be urgently required.

Dear Sir:-

Our Executive Secretary, Rev. T.B.R. Westgate, has written informing us that the Department has consented to replace either the present pumping engine, or the lighting plant batteries at this school; but that they were desirous of knowing which of the two items is more urgently required.

We wish to report the almost immediate urgency of a new set of batteries for the lighting plant. Those at present in operation can hardly last out the present month, and we are removing fused cells almost every day. Of the 55 cells originally installed, seven have now been removed, leaving us hardly enough current to turn the engines over, and further requiring that we should run the engines twice as often as usual for charging purposes. The cells remaining on the battery stand are going fast, and we most strongly urge that the Department's choice of replacement should be the batteries rather than the engine.

We received quotations from the John Reden Co. Ltd., Vancr., and from Coyle Batteries Ltd., Vancouver, B.C., and these are before the Department now. We recommended the Coyle L.P.55 cell battery, 110 Volt, 106 ampere hours, at a delivered price in Alert Bay of \$435.00

Sir:

I wish to refer to the last paragraph of official letter of the 29th ultimo, regarding the request of the Principal of the Alert Bay Indian Residential School, that an 8 H. P. Engine be supplied for the domestic pumping plant and also a new set of storage batteries for the lighting plant.

In this connection I have to say that a communication has been received from the Reverend Dr. Westgate, Field Secretary, M. S. C. C., enclosing copy of a letter which he received from the Principal, together with quotations for the supplying of batteries. It would appear that the batteries are more urgently required than the engine for the pumping plant. I am enclosing, for your information, copy of letter from the Principal, as well as the quotations which he received. From the correspondence, it appears that a larger battery than the one now in use should be supplied. The Principal requests a battery of 106 ampere hour capacity.

Funds are available for the purpose of providing this equipment. Therefore, I would request that you take the matter up with the Principal, ascertain definitely what is required and place the order for the batteries necessary with a firm on the list to receive consideration in either Victoria or Vancouver. It is noted, from the quotation enclosed, that the cost for the supplying of a 106 ampere hour battery, f. o. b. Alert Bay, will be approximately \$435.

Please obtain an account, in triplicate, covering the cost, together with receipt for the freight charges. You should ascertain from the Principal that the shipment has been received in good order and then attach the account to proper voucher forms, certify in the usual manner and send it to the Department for payment. The Rev. Dr. Westgate is being informed that you have received instructions to purchase and forward the new batteries. This matter should receive your prompt attention. The enclosed correspondence should be returned with the voucher in payment for the batteries.

Sir:-

In regard to the project of raising chimneys an extra fifteen feet for the Kitchen, laundry and Principal's residence at the Alert Bay Residential School, for which an approximate appropriation of \$425.00 has been granted, less the payment of labour and fare of a foreman-carpenter to and from Vancouver who is now employed supervising the demolition of old sawmill buildings and who was also to have been employed in supervising the erection and demolition of scaffolding around the said chimneys, I beg to state that Mr. F.E. Anfield, the Principal, has now raised the question as to the safety of erecting brick chimneys, and has suggested as an alternative that steel metal jacks be used instead. A copy of an estimate for this latter work is attached.

To my mind Mr. Anfield's idea is quite logical; to erect chimneys single-ply an additional fifteen feet undoubtedly would be dangerous, but the whole proposition needs to be viewed from many different angles. The price quoted on the attached copy of estimate would make this extremely difficult to cover within the appropriation of \$425.00 and pay the foreman-carpenter also. There is also the disadvantage of giving the school building a most unsightly appearance; this would also be the case if the original idea was proceeded with and they were raised another fifteen feet with brick, but not so much so as by the use of metal jacks.

However if it is possible to use brick the necessary safeguards will have to be provided to ensure that the three chimneys will not collapse in the course of another three years or so. I would therefore ask if you would be good enough to forward if possible the plans of the Residential School at Lytton, where I understand similar alterations were carried out some years ago. These will enable us to arrive at some decision in a more satisfactory way. So far it has not been possible to carry out Mr. C.C. Perry's suggestion that the bricklayer who has already been selected should examine the work before writing to the Department for authority, owing to this man being sick.

To my mind this work is a totally distinct project to the work at present being undertaken in connection with the demolition of old sawmill buildings in accordance with the Department's agreement with the Columbia Anglican Synod. Some saving could be effected if the services of a foreman-carpenter had been dispensed with. Mr. Dodson, although probably a good carpenter has not proved to be a good foreman, and in any case in the demolition of these old buildings rough carpentry was all that was needed, and many of the Indians are adept at this. What was needed was an experienced foreman who would conscientiously push the work forward and who knew how to handle men. However I have instructed that this work is to be completed in another two days in order to keep somewhere within the bounds of the appropriation of \$500.00 which was allowed for this.

Referring again to the matter of erecting chimneys, I would state that if it is decided to use brick, the bricklayer already referred to, who has been previously employed in similar work at this Residential School, would erect and demolish the necessary scaffolding himself with the aid of his son and two Indians. Therefore this work could be delayed until authority is furnished to proceed with it, but at present I am handicapped in not being able to immediately furnish you with the cost of raising these chimneys with brick and having the work done thoroughly with the necessary safeguards provided.

Mr. C.C. Perry also suggests that the Department architect who designed the building would probably advise as to the advantage of either one or the other, either metal work or brick, and also as to the possibility of the appearance of the building itself not being unduly spoiled.

This pump has been placed in good working order, and, upon test, satisfactory pressure was obtained.

It is recommended, however, that the pipe line and intake be extended about 40 feet into deeper water, at an estimated cost of \$265, and that this work be carried out in June or July, next, when low tides prevail. I am unable at the present time to give definite assurance whether funds for this purpose can be provided. You might draw this matter to the attention of the Department early in May, next, at which time we will be in a position to state if the necessary funds are available.

I have to acknowledge, with thanks, receipt of your letter of the 21st instant, enclosing copy of a report on the fire pumping plant at the Alert Bay Indian Residential School. The recommendation that the pipe line and intake be extended - the work to be carried out early next summer - together with an estimate of the cost, has been noted. I can give no definite assurance at the present time that funds will be available for this purpose.

It is also noted that the pump is now functioning perfectly and that a satisfactory supply of water could be obtained, if required, for fire purposes. Mr. C. C. Perry, Assistant Indian Commissioner, Victoria, is being communicated with in the matter.



At the request of Mr. C.C. Perry, an inspection has recently been made of the fire pumping plant at the Alert Bay Indian Residential School by Mr. Warren. A copy of Mr. Warren's report dated the 12th instant is enclosed from which it will be noted that the pump was out of order due to the fact that several pieces of wood and some small stones had become lodged in the working parts. This has been rectified and the plant is now working satisfactorily.

It is recommended in the report that the pipeline and intake should be extended about 40 feet into deeper water at an estimated cost of \$265.00.

This recommendation is concurred in by Mr. Webb and the suggestion is made that this work if authorized, could best be carried out in June or July when extremely low tides prevail.


