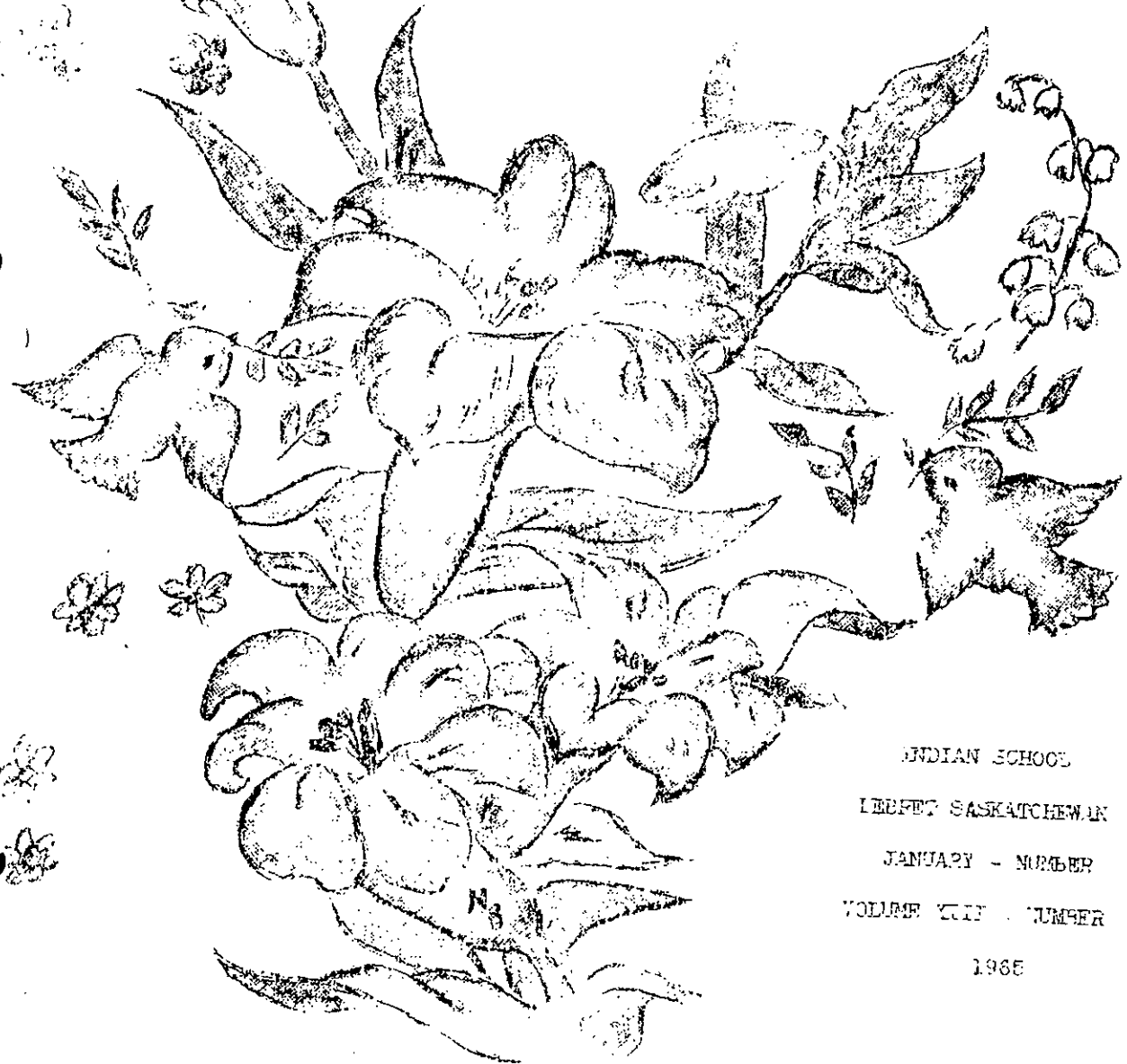
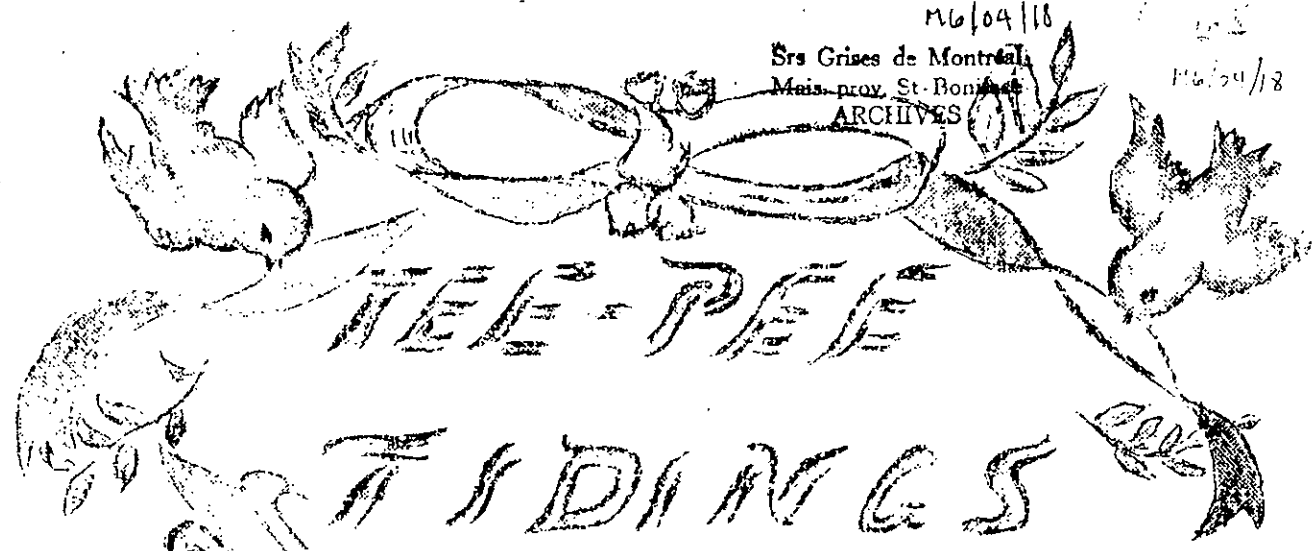

Yesterday afternoon, a young Indian girl, 17 years old, (let's call her Maureen) came to my office, asking to be re-admitted in School next September. "What in the world would she want to come back to school for", I thought to myself!

In five minutes, she had given me the answer. She had taken her grade 9 here at St. Paul's, but had left school just at exam time. She had it then all pretty well figured out; she would get a nice job and enjoy life.

So, she had gone out to apply for work: Regina, Broadview and other towns. To her great surprise she had been answered time after time: "Sorry but you need more education".

These refusals had finally convinced her that work is no longer available to the illiterate. She decided to go back to school.

What Maureen has experienced, many others have. Many, while sitting in the classroom, have pictured the world full of promising advantages, easy to reach. Reality, in most cases, has disappointed them, and left them with no ambition, discouraged.

Education is continually taking greater importance. Maureen found this out for herself, the hard way. You also may experience the same temptations. Rules, discipline, work, classroom-routine may get you down and make you lose sight of your goal. Always look further ahead. Remember that school years are not meant to last forever: they are but a training period, a preparation to a career. This career of yours will be of benefit to yourself and to the society in which you live. This is when Education will pay off.

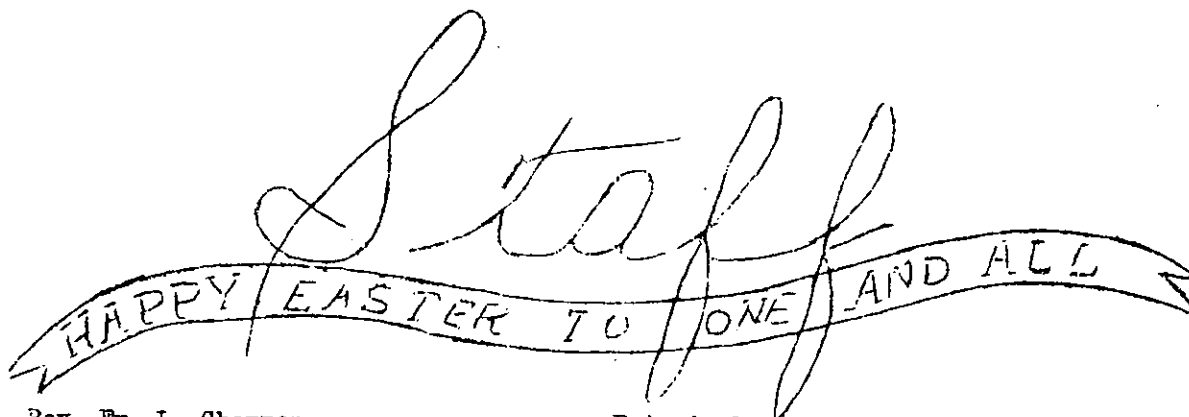

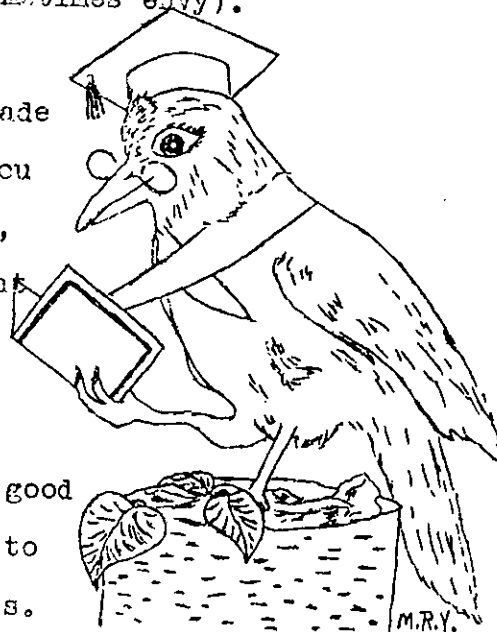
We ask you, then, to carry on!



We wish every one a very Happy Easter.

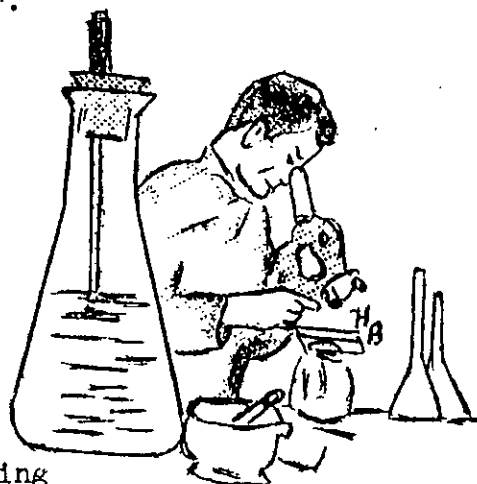

She conveyed to us the means by which marriage is a success - the pitfalls of this union, the ups and downs and the many sacrifices required by both partners to make a sound happy life. She warned us about the breach alcohol could make in life, especially that of a family. In concluding her topic she gave us a key to successful and happy days. Plan "just for today" and not tomorrow, next week or next month.

"The Responsibility of the Husband & Wife" was the topic chosen by Mrs. Jean Bellegarde. Her sincerity in placing before our eyes the duties of the husband and wife, plus the responsibility both had towards the upbringing and guidance of their children.

After supper, a film called "The Transition" was shown by Mr. Edward Pinay. It showed the truth to life downfalls of every Indian upon leaving school. The film was commented by Mr. George Poitras a graduate student of St. Paul's. The film plus Mr. Poitras' words showed us the many problems the Indian encounters when leaving the reserve. Some informative suggestions were brought from the floor and by the reporters. Each talk was followed by work shops, reports, and group discussions. The reports brought back by the reporters, and the comments given by our Staff members during the afternoon and evening were greatly appreciated by all.

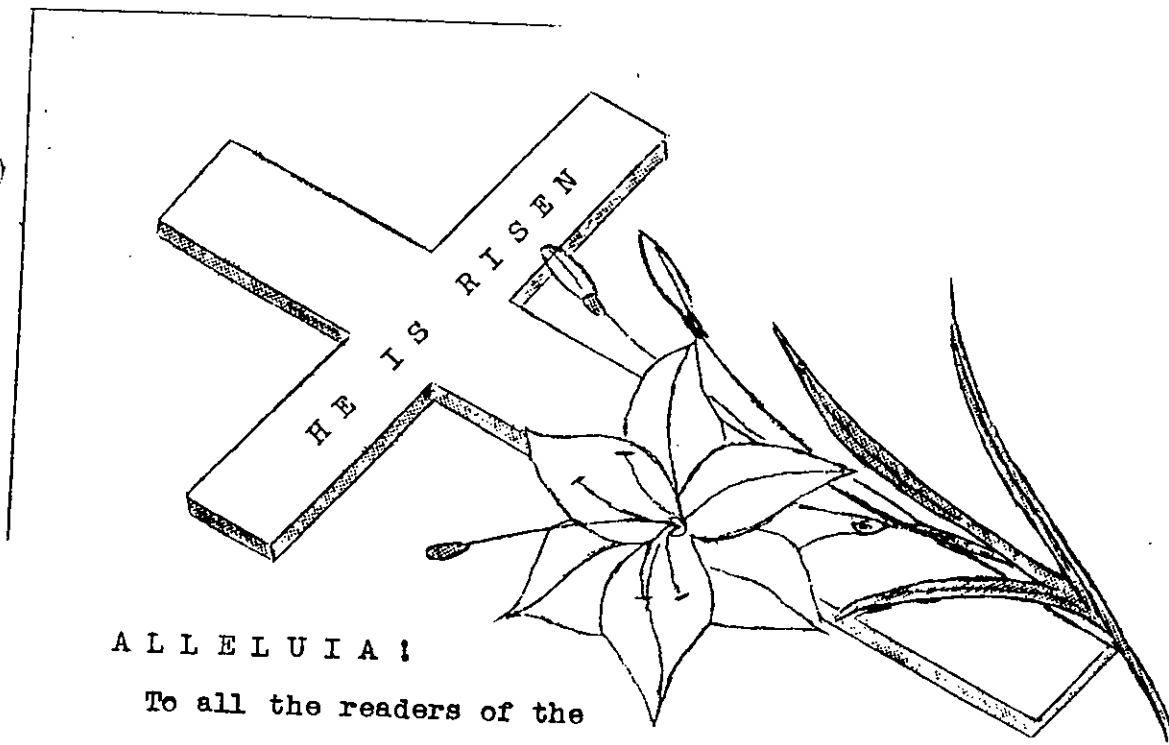

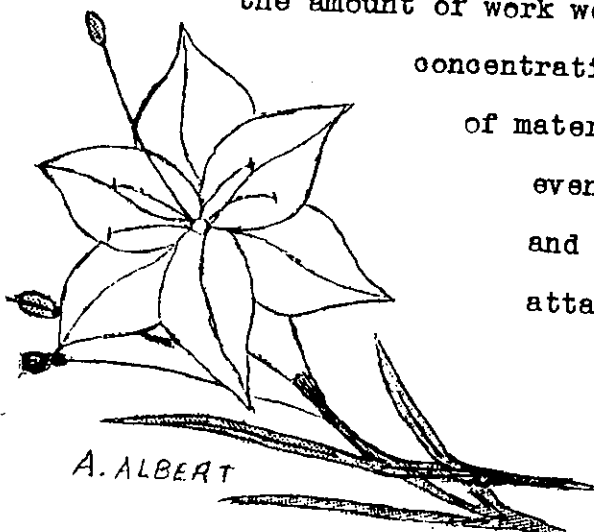

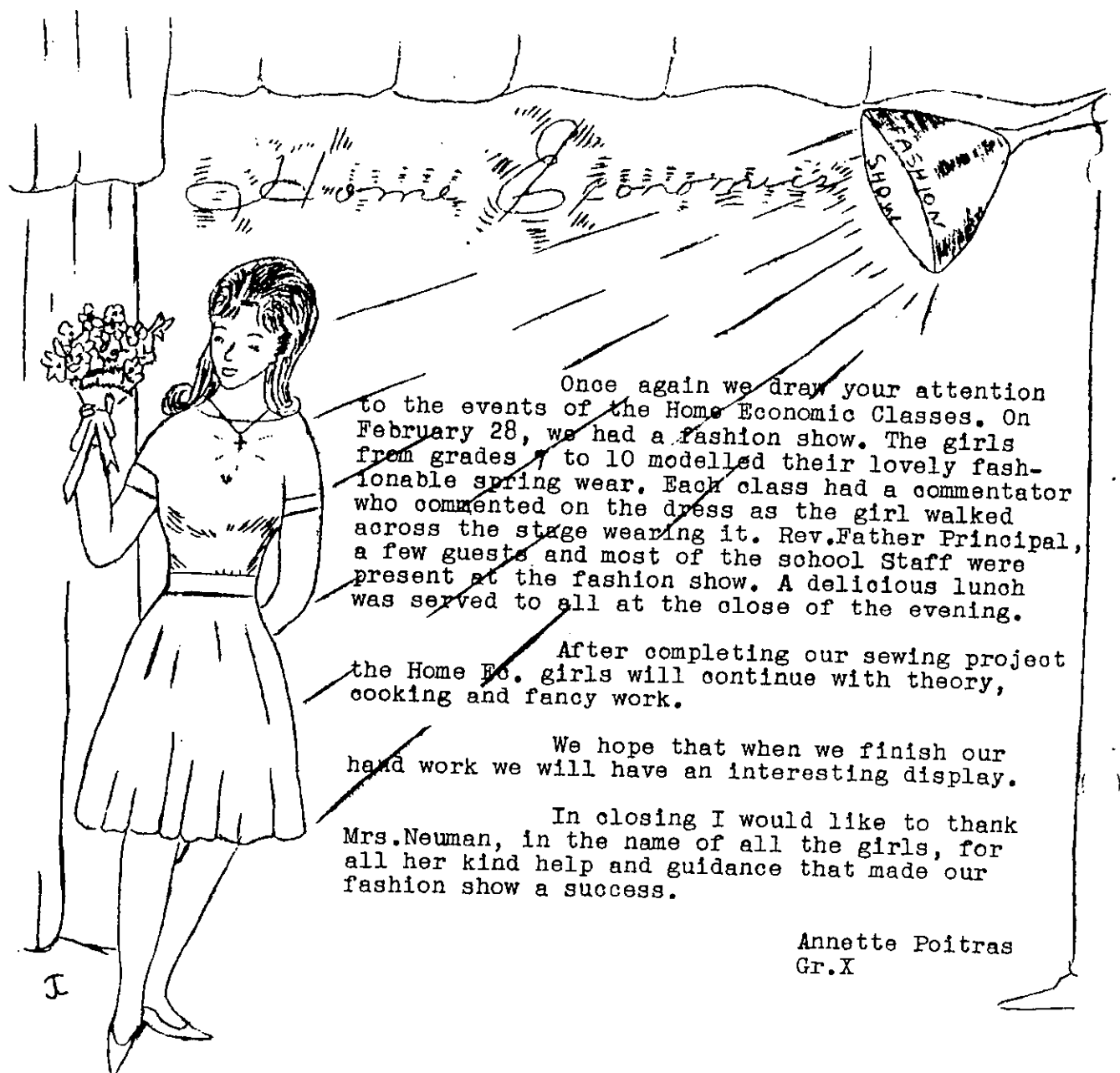
Hello! This is Barry Caldwell to tell you the latest news in the Boys Division Grade VI.

It is obvious that our instructor wanted to impress on our minds the necessity of learning mechanical drawing and this was indeed a good moment to bring it into light.

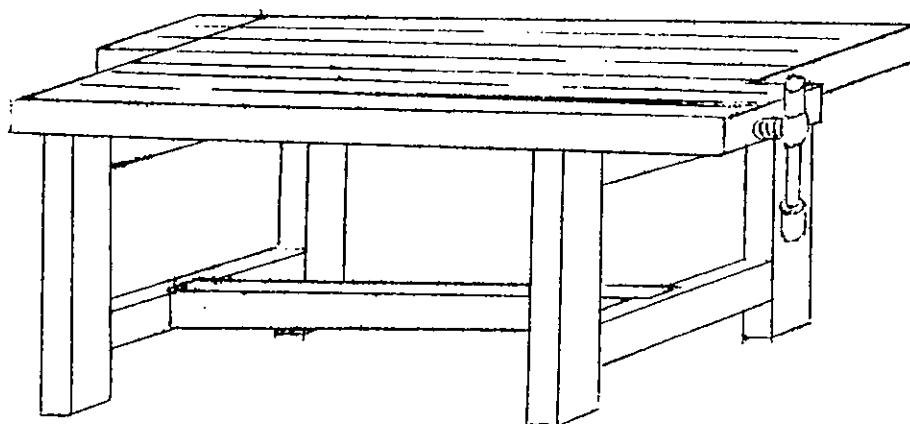
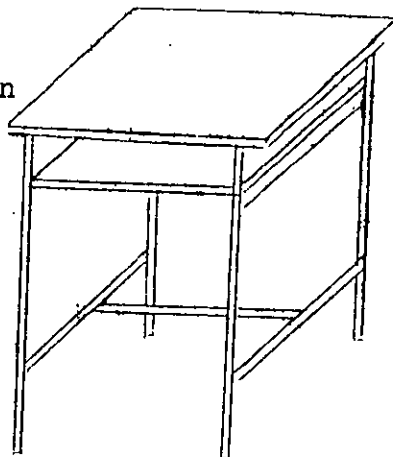
