



Yours of the 22nd (133-0-5) to hand and I wish to thank you for the blue prints enclosed. While these show the position of electric outlets they do not show the detail of wiring, which was what I was desiring when I asked for a copy of the working plans.

I would like to know the position of the wiring to see if it is possible to make any changes. E.G. there is no switch to the lights in the laundry. The laundress has to get a chair and grope for the first drop light. Then she can see to reach the others with a chair. (2) Contrary to the blue prints you sent, the switches for the children's dining room are in cabinet No. 1. which is located on the boys' side. The kitchen matron, to put the lights on in the dining room, has to go through the dark dining room, unlock the door into the boys' basement hall and turn the lights on from the switches there, and the reverse in turning them off. (3) Coming into the building at night, to get a light in the entry or hall you have to grope down to the end of the hall to the switch cabinet.

If it were possible I would like to have these and a few minor features rectified, but without knowing the position of the actual wiring it will be difficult to figure out just what can be done. Hence I hope that a copy of the "working plans" of the wiring may still be available.

Dear Mr. Hamilton:

In reference to the repairs about the School here which we looked over at the time Dr. McGill and yourself were here, I beg to submit the following estimates and suggestions. Contractors have been so busy around here with R.A.F. work that it has taken a little time to get information from them.

Re the roof. The firm of McDowell and Doke examined the roof with me and we found that on many parts of the roof the tar and gravel had completely washed away leaving the roofing paper exposed and already showing signs of weathering. This type of roof I understand should be retarred within ten years, but it is now 12 or 13 years since the roofs were put on. I concur in their recommendation that the entire roof should be cleaned of gravel and re-coated with tar and gravel. The flashings around the edges have in many places worked loose and these will need to be reset and rechinked. At one place on the main roof the roofing paper has split from one side of the building to the other along one of the two ridges. The other ridge needs reinforcing before it likewise splits. Around the hopper on the Chapel roof the paper has become damaged. In these two places the building now leaks.

Their estimate for all of the above work is \$390.00. If funds are not available this fall to do the entire roof I would suggest that the two places be repaired and recoated at once and the balance of the roof finished in the spring. This immediate repair work would take about \$50.00.

Re the barn. The H.D. Spratling Co. looked over the barns with me. He recommended that the rotted portion of the sills and timbers be cut away, a cement wall be built up about two feet on top of the old foundation, the timbers reset in this wall, the side wall be straightened where it had sagged, new floor joists be put in under the driveway and the other lot of joists spliced with new pieces, and the floor renewed where

rotted through. He estimated the cost of all this would not be more than \$175.00.

We examined the shingles and found those on the south side including the extension in very bad condition, beyond repairing. Mr. Spratling thinks that the north side could be repaired to last a few years, but he estimated the shingling would cost about \$400.00.

It is imperative that the wall and floor of the barn be done at once, but I would suggest that if the funds are not available this fall the shingling might be left over until next spring.

Re the chimney on the Principal's residence. This of course is imperative and his estimate was \$25.00 to rebuild the chimney from the roof up.

Re the pig-pen. Mr. Spratling is working on estimates for two different ways to overcome the difficulty. As soon as I receive them I will forward them to you, and I hope something can be done about it this fall.

There are some other things around the place that I would like to have fixed up next summer. How soon should I have these items and the estimates of their cost in to you?

Dear Sir:

The enclosed letter has just been received from Rev. R. T. Chapin, Principal of the Brandon Indian Residential School, in connection with various repairs required at the school.

I recommend that the roof be repaired at a cost of \$50.00, and provision be made for the completion of this work in 1942.

The barn is in poor condition, and unsafe. This is very essential work and I think the figure of \$175.00 is reasonable for the repairs required. If this is left much longer, some boy will be hurt or some valuable stock injured. The barn is well worth repairing.

The shingles should be provided for in next year's estimates. A poor roof makes almost a useless barn.

The chimney on the principal's residence is about to fall down, and should be repaired at once. The estimated cost is \$25.00.

I am enclosing an account, the first half of which, \$28.35, is not exactly in order; but for which I am asking permission to issue a voucher.

The floor drain in the Boys' Washroom has been giving trouble some time. We have worked at it until finally last month it blocked in spite of anything we could do. With water on the floor we had to do something immediately, and called the plumber, Yates & Neale. They could not get it open, but had to take the floor up, open the pipe, clear up the obstruction and repair it putting in a new floor strainer. While they were here we had them clear the drain from the slop sink on the first floor, which had also plugged. This accounts for the work on the 8th. At the same time our water pump ceased to operate. We took it apart to find the trouble and found one of the water pistons had broken loose, the thread completely worn off. Fortunately Yates & Neale were able to get us a new piston the next day. This accounts for the item \$4.75 on the 9th. The copper bucket on the same date was for the steam trap of the laundry dryer which was not operating properly, letting the steam escape as well as the condensed water.

As you will see the above repairs had to be attended to immediately and while I realize we should have had permission to do the work first, I am asking if under the conditions we may be allowed to send a voucher for the above amount.

The amount for the welding repairs on the boiler has already been taken care of.
