Sir,

I have the honour to report, for the information of the Department, the following matters which received my attention in the course of a visit which, leaving here on the 10th. inst., I proceeded to make to St. Joseph's Industrial School, the Sarcee and the Blackfoot Agencies.

At the St. Joseph's School, as Department is aware, there has been an outbreak of typhoid fever, and I found, although a number had recovered, there were five children still suffering. However no fears are entertained as to the recovery of these, with the exception of one case, in which complications render the issue doubtful.

The patients were being comfortably tended in a little detached hospital, Owing to the strain on the accommodation, caused, as Department is aware, by the admission of pupils, in the expectation of funds being provided for more building, - in greater numbers than would otherwise have been the case, some healthy boys had to sleep in the hospital, but they were not in the patients' room, and none of them caught the fever.

In consequence of this lack of accommodation, the uncomfortable condition of the wash-house, the absolute dearth of

any place wherein to dry clothes during the winter, and the fact that the school room is the only one in which the boys can assemble for recreation, or any other purpose, I authorized the erection of a new building, (the plan and specifications for which will be duly transmitted to the Department), not to exceed a cost of \$1000.00, for which there is provision in the current year's appropriation.

✓ The ground floor of this building is intended to serve as a play room for the boys this winter, and the upper story for drying clothes.

✓ The lower flat of this building I would propose should be used next year as a carpenter's shop, (because a larger one than that now existing is urgently required), and the upper flat for the shoemaker's shop.

✓ The present work shop would then be utilized for the stores now kept in the main building, and occupying room which can very ill be spared for the purpose. In the interim it might be well to use part of the new building for a store house, and, by doing this, I think the urgent need of more sleeping accommodation would be sufficiently met for the present.

✓ I had intended to have the employees' house, which was too cold for winter as it was, brick veneered, for part of which there are bricks on hand. Finding however, the season so far advanced as to render it inadvisable to proceed with such work, I decided to defer it until next summer, and meanwhile gave instructions to have the house well banked up, and authorized the purchase of some lumber to ceil it, which measures, I anticipate, will make it fairly comfortable for the

the

the winter.

I feel confident that, could more accommodation be authorized, which however I am quite aware is not possible at present, no difficulty would be experienced with regard to increasing the number of pupils.

Some few matters I required to direct the Principal's attention to, such as the necessity for keeping the boys, the school room and other parts of the premises more tidy.

The Department is aware of the correspondence which has taken place relative to the need of securing hay lands, and I may here point out that, unless such lands be secured, it will not only be impossible for the school to raise beef for its own supply, but even to keep enough of cows to provide the quantity of milk required. Unless these Institutions can be made self maintaining in such respects, there is no apparent prospect of the expenditure on them ever being materially reduced.

Perhaps something may be done by the growth of corn ^{for} ~~and~~ ensilage, and this will be tried, but, as this will be the first experiment in that direction, in the Western country, it remains to be seen what, if any, success may attend it.

After leaving the school, I visited the Sarcee Agency, and found most of the Indians absent on hunting expeditions, or making visits.

As some of the hunters of the Stonies were coming in, I instructed that the Pay Sheets be kept open until the end of the current month, to allow of their being paid their annuities.

I saw

I saw some of the Stonies' cattle, but not all, as I could not get across the river.

I found that, in pursuance of instructions, the system of close herding, which has proved so successful at the Piegan Agency, had been adopted, and am glad to say that there is excellent prospect of equally good results. I gave instructions that, in addition to the close herding by Indians, the Farmer should visit and inspect the herd once or if possible twice each week.

For the encouragement of the Indians, and to show them the value of stock raising, I authorized the sale of a few steers, stipulating that either the whole or part of the proceeds, as the Indians might themselves decide, should be expended in the purchase of young heifers, so that the herd would eventually gain numerically by the transaction.

I trust that I succeeded in making arrangements which will result in getting these Indians to work more, in such directions as sawing wood and improving their houses and so forth, when on their Reserve, and I have told the Farmer that as with the Crees, some work must be extracted in return for assistance given them.

I was pleased to find that these Indians are much interested in the sheep given to them, and promptly destroy any of their dogs which attempt to worry them, and it has frequently occurred to me that could other Indians in the Treaty be got to take a similar interest in sheep, it would provide the much needed method of getting rid of the packs of dogs, whose existence constitutes a nuisance, if not a positive

I proceed from Calgary to the Blackfoot Agency, and found the Indians clamorous in their requests for implements and harness to enable them to farm. This desire to work is very laudable and deserving of all encouragement, but I hardly see that, beyond the raising of roots and a few oats, much success is likely to attend agricultural operations on their part.

In what direction to find the solution of the problem regarding finding useful and profitable employment for these Indians, instead of demoralizing them by continuing to treat them as paupers, has exercised me greatly, but, so far, I have not been able to think of anything, excepting, as I have already recommended to the Department, the furnishing of cattle, with a view to stock raising and its kindred industries.

I have instructed the Agent to hire a white man to accompany a small party to the timber limits, for the purpose of getting out logs and rails. This party, if all works well, to be largely augmented later on, and provisions to be drawn from the farm at Morley.

I propose to make these Indians, as well as the Stonies, supply themselves with fence rails, instead of using wire.

A new seam of coal has been opened, and the coal seems to me equal to that turned out from the Galt mine.

As Department is aware they have supplied the St. Joseph's Industrial School and we have had some of their coal here, which has given satisfaction. I have ordered another car load, and, in fact, the mining may be said to be turning out a success.

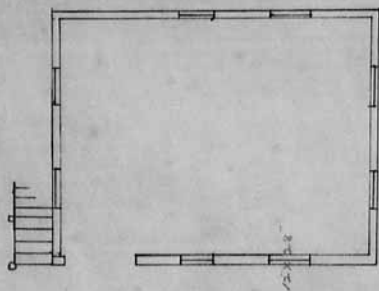
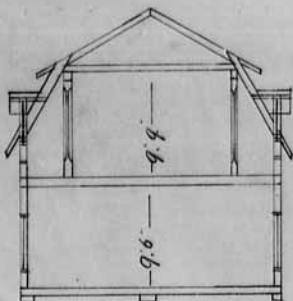

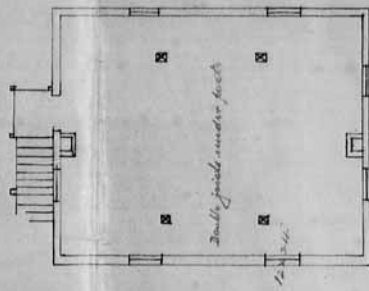

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 5th instant, No. 84,813, returning voucher No. 5,010; and in reply to the last paragraph, would state that no arrangement was made beforehand, as to the price to be charged for the sashes and doors supplied.

When the account was first rendered, the prices were looked upon as particularly reasonable; but there was nothing to point out that an error had been committed by a new clerk, and it was passed. Upon the subsequent account being presented, enquiries were made; and it was found that the increased prices were not an overcharge, but those of the market.
