period of years since the power line first crossed the reserve. I would earnestly ask the Department's consideration of this project in the near future on the grounds both of good economy and efficiency.

Unsuspected talent was discovered in the pupils of both sexes by the Principal when he initiated their training for concerts to be given on special occasions. In the first, at Christmas, the performers were somewhat self-conscious, but this was completely absent when on St. Patrick's Day an excellent program was enjoyed by a large crowd.

There are further improvements to be seen on every visit to the school not only in the building and furnishings, but, in and out of school. The Principal, Father G. F. Kelly, has worked untiringly toward a more attractive life for his charges. Under his direction the Kootenay Indian school promises to rank beside any in British Columbia.

Welfare & Training:

At the Kootenay Indina school continued progress is being made both in and out of the class room. The children are well cared for and have an excellent record of health. A number of replacements have been procured for worn out beds in both the boys' and girls' dormitories. A program of cleaning and painting in the lavatories and several changes in plumbing have made for better hygiene, but a continued project for redecoration of the basement passage ways is urgently needed. Because it was found impossible to procure replacement parts, the toilets on both sides of the school are still awaiting repairs to seats and flush actions.

The school is carrying several pupils above its dormitory quota, but more pupils could be accommodated comfortably if some small low-cost changes were effected. This would make possible acceptance of a number of school age children from Columbia Lake and Shuswap Reserves upon whose parents pressure is being applied to have them send their children to school.

Note
Much trouble has been experienced in recent weeks with lighting and pumping equipment at the school. A series of breakdowns has necessitated repairs to all three power units, overhaul of the emergency 4 k. w. ~~three~~ generator, replacement of water pump and batteries, at considerable cost to the Department and to the discomfort and inconvenience to the residents of the school. The Principal and many of the staff laboured for days with some outside help to restore services to normal. From time to time representations have been made to the Department to have an installation made, connecting the school to the East Kootenay Power Line some two miles distant. Though the initial cost is large, so too has been the cost of upkeep of the school's present, inadequate power, electrical and water equipment over the

Enclosed herewith please find two copies of a letter from Reverend Father Kelly, Principal, Kootenay Indian Residential School, enclosing estimates of cost of making structural alterations at the school to two balconies, with a view to taking them into use as preventoriums. At present this space is quite useless since it is not heated, and open to the weather. With its enclosure by fitting of windows and with installation of radiators these two light, well ventilated balconies would make ideal preventorium space. On the upper floor in the front of the building, they face East, catching the morning sunshine, and protected from the prevailing South West winds. Utilization of this space would release two good sized rooms for junior dormitories and make possible enrollment of several school-age children from reserves in this area who cannot at present be accommodated. I enclose a rough sketch of the rooms affected (not to scale). In this connection I may say that I have been unable to find any plans of the school building in the files of this office and I would ask that a set of floor plans be made available to me in order to facilitate discussion of such matters as this in future.

Dear Mr. Boys:

You will remember since your recent visitation of the school my calling to your attention the matter of utilizing the two balconies on the second floor of the school for extra dormitory or preventorium space with certain alterations being made. I believe this matter was desired by the former Principal and during the visit of Major MacKay last autumn I pointed out the possibilities of using this space which at present is practically useless.

I have procured the attached quotations on the necessary work and considering the asset that this space would be to us I think the estimates very reasonable. The fitting of the windows and the laying of the floor will be done by the manual training class under their director.


To the attached quotations should be added an allowance for painting or rather for the purchase of paint for these two rooms, the work in this case also being done by the class. It will take about fifteen dollars worth of paint for the ceiling, walls and floor of each room, that is, thirty dollars worth in all. It would be well if this could be allowed for on the same quotation.

If further information on this or a sketch of the plan is needed I will gladly furnish the same.

Trusting this will be found satisfactory.



Further to my letter of May 23rd concerning the leakage in the water pressure tank at the Kootenay Residential School, I wish to advise that temporary repairs have been attempted with only partial success.

Mr. Draper of Pioneer Motors, experienced in pressure tanks, and formerly engaged in the construction of submarines, informs me that a replacement is absolutely necessary, in which opinion Mr. Hayden, of Patmore Bros., concurs.

The old tank is rusted around its seams and around the rivet holes. Some welding has been done, making it possible, with frequent spells of pumping, to maintain a supply of water. But, for safety's sake, it has been deemed prudent to send for a safety valve to be installed in the pumping system to obviate danger of explosion in the tank, which remains uncovered.

A new tank will have to be built to specifications with tappings as shown in the attached sketch. The present tank 5' x 36' is of approximately 2830 gallons capacity. Mr. Draper is of the opinion that a new tank of 5' diameter of 2000 gallons capacity would be quite large enough. It is proposed to leave the old tank in the ground, fill it with earth and set the new tank on top of it, bringing it endwise so that its end is flush with the inside of the concrete wall of the engine room. In this manner the manhole and water gauge would be available from within the engine room itself and a complicated piping system would be eliminated. It would


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still be covered by a sufficient depth of soil that there would be no danger of freezing.



The trouble, located after extensive excavation, proves to be a major leakage of the pressure tank. This tank 5' x 36', and lying horizontally, is buried to a depth of 15' behind the boiler room. At present only one end is fully uncovered, but this shows severe rusting around the rivet holes. On examination, several welding experts express their opinions that possibility of making a permanent repair is unlikely.

I shall report further when the full extent of the trouble is known, but it seems not improbable that we shall be faced with the expense of a replacement.

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

I am enclosing Mr. Indian Agent Boys' letter of June 12th and enclosures referred to therein in connection with the proposed remodelling of the cow barn at the Kootenay Indian Residential School at an estimated cost of \$1065.56.

In view of the large expenditures already incurred by the Department at the Kootenay Indian Residential School this year for repairs to the lighting plants and the anticipated expenditures in connection with the water pressure tank, it is not thought that funds for remodelling the barn will be available. Until we have information regarding this point there would appear to be no object in investigating this matter further with a view to determining whether this proposal would rate priority over other requirements such as adequate fire protection at the school. Possibly Mr. Phelan may wish to discuss this matter with the Indian Commissioner who is at present in Ottawa.


Re: Kootenay Indian School,

Also enclosed is a quotation from McLennan McFeely & Prior Limited, Vancouver, on cost of remodelling the cow barn referred to in Father Kelly's letter. I have prepared a rough sketch of the barn as it would be when completed. I fully endorse Father Kelly's remarks as to the inadequacy of the present arrangements and recommend the changes as submitted.

You will note that in their quotation Mc & Mc have submitted a total figure for all the required equipment of \$1065.56 FOB Vancouver. I have written the Company asking them to break this figure down, itemizing their quotation and I shall forward a copy of their letter when received.

I trust that this project may have the Department's favourable consideration.

Mr. Coleman's report of last year found our dairy barn here in very poor condition and he urged that something be done to improve it. During Major McKay's visit last autumn he directed me to do some necessary work to bring our barn up to modern standards in equipment and layout. Due to shortage of material it has taken sometime to get the Beatty Bros. even to give me an estimate on these alterations but I was pleased to receive recently the enclosed quotation .

The installation of this equipment would give us the opportunity to attend to our dairy cattle as they should be attended to and at the same time teach our boys modern , sanitary ,and efficient care of stock . As you know from your own inspection the present state of the barn leaves much to be desired and an agricultural program of any worth must have as a foundation the proper care of stock .With a properly equipped barn we can give our boys a good grounding in this but in its present state we are greatly handicapped.




