Sir

I have the honor to report :- In accordance with instructions received, I left Barracks on Thursday last the 24<sup>th</sup> ult at 9 am. with Const Beaumont team 2115-1556 and saddle horse 2236 with ration for five days and full camping outfit to patrol to Col Wynndham on the Bow River and to visit all settlers en route.

On the 24<sup>th</sup> ult I went as far as the Indian Industrial School at Dunbow where we stayed the night, visiting settlers Mrs Sandymore, R. M. Fitz Gerald, A. J. Wollay-Dod and C. E. Denehy en route, distance 30 miles.

Friday 25<sup>th</sup>

I left the Industrial School 9 am. arriving at Col. Wynndham 5.30 pm. visiting settlers W. W. McDonald, Mrs McKinnon, A. Tucker, Wm Allen, W. W. Chancell and A Wynndham; distance 30 miles.

Saturday 26<sup>th</sup>

I left Col Wynndham 9 am. and returned to the Industrial School

no settlers visited; distance 30 miles.

Sunday 27<sup>th</sup>

Stayed four at the Industrial School, as I considered the horses required a rest.

Monday 28<sup>th</sup>

Left the Industrial School for Barrader where we arrived 4 pm. visited settlers W. Stewart W. Newbolt, H. Nash, W. Stewart G. Stevenson, and W. Bannister; distance 27 miles.

Remarks.

Weather fine. Trails very heavy; to and from the school and Col Wyndham's. Snow very deep, from 1 ft to 3 ft with a crust, and an excellent trail. Cattle looking well, all being wintered in consequence of the great quantity of snow that has fallen this winter. Calf prospect good; horses looking well; Coyotes numerous; Wolves scarce.

Settlers appear to be again of the opinion to oppose them to the Court. The Court statement at the time John's trial. In fact, in fact, two John's were made by the Glendon statement and not by the other two. This makes the record then more - J.W.

The only complaints the settlers had to make was the infrequency of Police patrol and an annoyance caused by the Blackfoot Indians begging for tea etc when passing to and from their

Reservation, which the settlers
