

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REPORT ON INSPECTION OF INDIAN SCHOOL
AT FORT ALBERNI, B. C.

Mr. Henion has followed up by visits to the building a report received at Head Office that the heating system at the above building was not giving satisfaction.

Mr. Henion found that the local authorities called in Messrs R. Herbertson & Sons, Heating Contractors at Port Alberni, to go over the system, in an endeavour to locate the trouble, and correct same.

The Contractors were not familiar with this work or type of system, and did not do the original installation. They wrote to the C.A. Dunham Co., asking for full particulars regarding the job. Upon receipt of this arrangements were made to have Mr. Henion make an inspection.

It was found three or four radiators would at times fail to heat up, and also a part of system farthest removed from the boiler room appeared somewhat sluggish. In order to overcome this condition the Boiler pressure was raised to 5 to 8 lbs.

Some of the connections will need to be changed to give proper grading to the spring piece to the radiators. This matter was taken up by Mr. Henion with Mr. Herbertson, and instructions given how to accomplish the necessary change.

The reason that the system farthest removed from the boiler room does not heat is due to carrying excessive pressure on the type of system installed. The system as installed is a gravity system of steam heating with the air relieved from the return piping through a Dunham Air Eliminator. When pressures over and above 8 lbs. are carried on the system the Eliminator seals the system, due to the water rising in the stand pipe and causing the float to close the valve on the Eliminator and thus preventing air from leaving the system. The continued carrying of high pressure above 8 lbs. makes the system practically a sealed system, and steam cannot find its way out of the radiation due to the fact that air cannot find its way out of the return piping.

This condition noted above is due to the manner of firing and the fuel used, which is wood, which causes the steam pressure on the boiler to build up before the radiation throughout the system is filled with steam, therefore the radiators at the end of the system or mains, are the ones that suffer by lack of steam.

We would recommend that a No. 10 Dunham Return Trap be installed which will permit the pressure on the boiler to be carried at any time from 1 to 10 lbs. and the air would be vented out of the return mains through an eliminator, and the water returned to the boiler by the Return trap.

It is almost impossible to maintain a steady condition of pressure on the boiler when burning wood as fuel, and a gravity steam heating system using only an air eliminator for venting the air from system will from time to time

time to time give trouble as is being experienced on this system, but with the installation of a Dunham Return trap air will have a free vent from the return piping regardless of pressure carried on the boiler.

We would further recommend that all of the traps be gone over and cleaned. That is the covers and discs taken off, and any foreign matter within the trap bodies removed.

There appears to be evidence of having carried too high a water line on the boiler, and we believe that the manufacturers of the boiler should be communicated with and the height of the water line for the boiler ascertained, and the operator instructed to carry the water line at the level stipulated by the manufacturer.

The Damper Regulator which is now connected to the boiler, should be connected to the Balanced Check Damper on the smoke pipe, and to the draft damper on front of the boiler, so that these can work together with the damper regulator, and assist in maintaining a steady pressure on the boiler.

We would recommend that a compound gauge be installed on the boiler, since the gauge now on the boiler has been found defective and causing trouble in the past.

The Air Line Valves now installed on the end of steam mains to be replaced with No. 1 Dunham Radiator traps to give a freer venting of air from the steam pipes into the return piping.

Some of the return piping in the boiler room is badly pocketed, and this will need to be straightened up.

All of the matters covered in this report were discussed with the Contractors called in on the job, and with the above recommendations followed out this system should operate satisfactorily

Sir;-

I have the honour to submit herewith a report from the manual training Instructor to the classes at the Alberni Indian Residential School for your information.

The report covers the period from commencement of instruction, in January to the closing of the school for the summer holidays, on June 30th 1927, 6 months.

The boys have proved themselves apt and willing pupils, and their ability to grasp the lessons presented to them is very marked, and I feel confident that the drawing of plans and constructing of models to scale will prove of great benefit to the boys of this Agency as the most important and almost sole means of livelihood for the Indians of the West Coast is fishing and the repairing of the craft and plant buildings in which they are employed, and I hope in due time it will lead to the construction of a better type of dwelling on Indian Reserves.

In conclusion I beg to state that the estimated cost of manual training at the Alberni school for the current school year, to end of June 1928, will be approximately, \$ 300.00. which will include Instructor's salary, tools if any are needed and material for the class to work with.

Sir,—

I beg to submit the following report on manual training at the Indian Residential School, Alberni, B.C. for the year ending June 30th, 1927.

During the year, 85 classes were held, showing a total instruction period of 209½ hours. This total was divided among 3 classes. The number of boys receiving instruction was 25, of which 17 are expected to return after the holidays.

The type of instruction given has been almost identical with that given in the public schools of this Province, each model being accompanied by a working drawing, the models have been small combining utility with exercises requiring simple tool operation. The course so far has been fairly rigid—few alternative problems being allowed, thus each class has faced the same projects and has tackled the same problems. Friendly competition and discussion have been encouraged.


For the future I feel that for the bigger boys a different course should be arranged, one more suited to the needs of an Indian boy who will soon be earning his living on a fishing boat. Household utensils or simple furniture will be undertaken as individual projects, while for those boys more apt or more willing, special instruction in boat building will be given, in this way the training will provide the boy with a working knowledge of the tools and methods used in the construction of wooden articles used every day.

While the various metals offer splendid mediums for manual training I think that too much should not be attempted at this stage. Therefore I propose to adhere closely to wood, paying special attention to lumber which is produced locally. When the time is ripe for the introduction of more technical education in Indian schools the boys will prove themselves to be apt and will find students of all branches of handicraft.

In conclusion I wish to acknowledge with thanks the valuable advice, blueprints and books given by Mr. John Kyle, Organizer of Technical Education, I also wish to thank you, Sir, for your kindly consideration, assistance and hearty co-operation, without which manual training could not have been so successfully commenced at this school.
