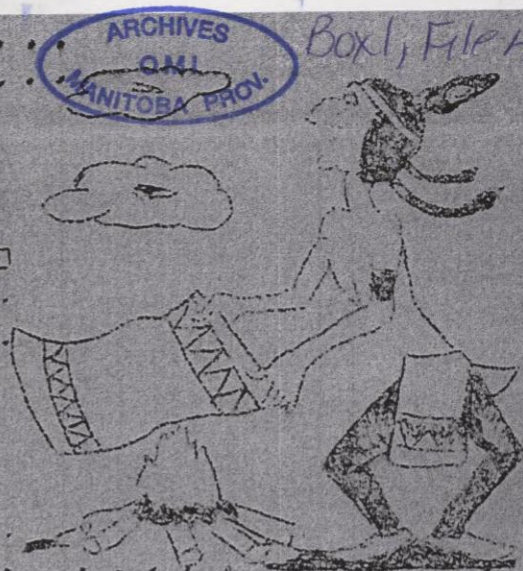
On closing this message; I would like to add that each of us, your children, must have a goal in mind because if we do not foresee, we will fail to realize what our elders are expecting of us.

GRADUATION - OFFICIAL OPENING OF GYM AND CHAPEL

On Saturday October 22nd at 5 p.m., the official opening and blessing of the Gym and Chapel began. The ribbon was cut by Mr. R.M. Connelly, Regional Superintendent of Indian Affairs for Manitoba and by the Honourable J.B. Carroll, Minister of Welfare for Manitoba. The key to the gym and chapel was presented to Father Chaput, our new principal and to Mr. J.B. Taubensee, the contractor. The gym and chapel were blessed by the Most Reverend G.B. Flahiff, Archbishop of Winnipeg.

After the lunch, the guests and visitors were guided around the school by the students.

The graduation exercises began at 7:30 with our national anthem. An invocation was said by Father Chaput. He was also asked to address the graduates. The graduates, Agnes Nanowin, Rita Nanowin, Edwin Bruyere, Richard Couchene, and Billy Flett, were introduced by the grade XII students. The parents message was given by Wilfred Housseau, a former student of Assiniboia. Agnes Nanowin who was believed to have the highest average gave the Valedictory. During the exercises, songs were sung by the choir of Sandy Bay School and Assiniboia; certificates, rings, awards of merit, and school pins were presented to the graduates and other students by the guests. His Excellency, Archbishop Flahiff, who was the guest speaker, gave a very excellent speech.

There were other guests present, such as Bud Sherman, Member of Parliament for Winnipeg South; Verna Kirkness; Mr. Slabodzin and our former principal, Father Robidoux.

The theme of Mr. Connelly's address may be summed up by the words, "The school is here to help you become what you want to be."

"We want you (Indians) to let us share your culture," said Mr. Carroll, "because it is so much better than the white man's."

NEW PRINCIPAL

This year we have a new principal, Father Roland Chaput. He has replaced Father Robidoux, who was principal since the school opened

in 1958. Father Robidoux worked very hard during the eight years he was principal of this school. "It was the greatest task of my life" he commented. He is now working at St. Norbert. There was a farewell party for him on September 16, with some members of his family and members of the staff present.

Father Chaput said he did not intend to make changes in the school because, as he said, "the best way to run a school that is running smoothly is to let it run the way it is."

I WAS A PRISONER IN RED CHINA

Father Arden McGratt came to this school to talk to the students. He was accompanied by Mary Kennedy of the Legion of Mary. Father McGratt was once a prisoner of the Red Chinese. "The cell I was in wasn't any wider than my out stretched arms and about seven feet long. At no time could I close my eyes unless I was given explicit permission," he recalled. This is only one example of the atrocities committed by the communists that he related to us.

LONG WEEKENDS

To start the school year off, we had a long weekend which included Labour day, on that day we went to the Assiniboia Park to have some beans at the picnic.

Nearing the middle of October we had two long weekends with only two days of classes separating them. The first weekend was from Sat. Oct. 8 to Monday Oct. 10, because Monday was Thanksgiving. The second long weekend, from Thursday Oct. 13 to Sunday Oct. 16, resulted from the Teacher's Conventions which started on Thursday. During this weekend the boys went camping to the west, six miles east of Portage La Prairie. It was sponsored by the Army. Army equipment such as tents, a truck, a bus, uniforms and frying pans, were used. The activities were organized by the boys themselves and everyone had a jolly good time.

"When you deserve to be praised, you are praised," Mr. Cardinal said while talking to the boys at the end of camp, "and during this camp you certainly showed me that you deserve praise."

The girls went on a picnic to St. Malo

SCHOOL PROJECTS

On September 27, this school held for the first time a "Pep Rally". The school football team players were introduced one at a time by William Nerasty. Each player ran around the gym, along a row made by the student body, while the students clapped, cheered and encouraged them. It was intended to rouse school spirit in the school. It worked.

On Sunday the boys and girls can eat together. This is a sort of an experiment and if it proves to be good, maybe, the boys and girls will be able to eat together everyday. The boys and girls are also able to mix in the chapel when going to mass. This is another new step for the school.

Another new activity we have this year is the selling of school sweat-shirts. These are all in one color, green. The front of these shirts have an Indian chief's head on it with "Assiniboia High" written around the head. They are sold at \$2.50 per shirt.

NEW MEMBERS OF THE STAFF

Mr. Luc Marchildon, the former boys' supervisor is not with us this year. He is now the sports director at St. Pauls college. Mr. Toupin is taking his place and from the looks of things Mr. Toupin is capable of helping the boys.

Father Leroux, our former senior teacher is not with us this year. Mr. Leon Joubert is our new senior teacher. Father Chatelain is our new teacher who takes Father Leroux's place in teaching mathematics.

Another new figure is Mr. Joubert's nephew. He is taking Roger Robidoux's place in supervising the boys' study period during the evenings. He also acts as supervisor at times, especially on Friday nights.

OTHER ARTICLES

This year we have a school bus. This is the first time this school had a school bus. In the previous years we used to take taxis or a chartered bus to go places. The bus was first used on Dec. first when it took our Juvenile hockey team to St. Boniface College where we defeated them 3-0. Our new bus holds forty seats and is very capacious, our bus driver is Mr. Fillion.

Although this is a boarding school, this school keeps some day-scholars. These students go to the other schools of Tec-Voc, Daniel MacIntyre, and Gordon Bell. They sleep and do most of their activities, here, at the school and they go to classes to the other schools.

Christmas exams began on Tuesday, Nov. 29 for the grade ten's and eleven's. The grade twelve's began theirs the following Wednesday. All grades finished all their exams on Friday, Dec. 2nd.

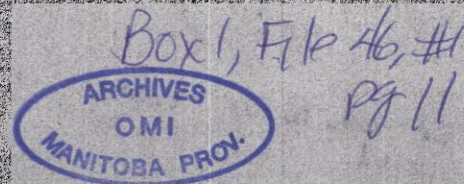

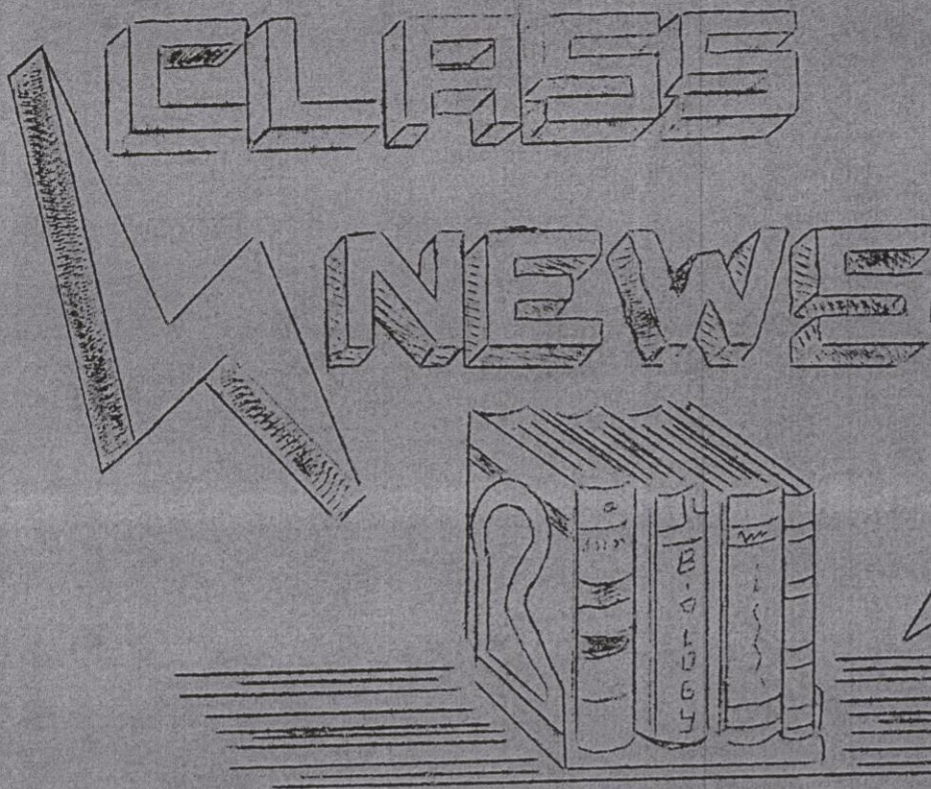

GRADE 12

Once again another year is well on its way for the grade 12 class which consists of twenty-three students. Out of these twenty-three, twelve are taking the complete course. In our course we take five subjects; Chemistry, Biology, Maths, English, and French.

Our chemistry teacher Mr. Tartarzyn has introduced us to the many divisions of chemistry. Up to now we have encountered such topics as "The Nature of Matter, Atoms, Chemical Bonds, Stoichiometry and Gases." Although at times the lesson is difficult to grasp, it proves to be interesting and beneficial.

Mr. Joubert is our Biology teacher. So far we have taken "Diversity among animals", a belief that all the animals in a single phylum have evolved from a common ancestor. We have also covered digestion, transportation, respiration, excretion coordination in multicellular animals, animal support and locomotion.

In Maths this term we have looked into several sections which deal with algebra, trigonometry and logarithms.

In our English course we have already taken Pride and Prejudice, Jane and the Aycock, several essays and short stories and a few poems.

Sister Brisobois helps us in our French language which is extremely capricious. We have trained to conjugate such verbs as "apprendre, vivre and pouvoir" in different tenses and moods.

Several interesting events have occurred in our class this term. One of these events was the election of class president, when Delores Nanie was elected. Two days later we went to the Winnipeg Civic Auditorium to attend a solemn Mass commemorating the Fiftieth Anniversary of the Archdiocese of Winnipeg. On October 7, we were asked to be ushers and usherettes for the social that was held at the gymnasium, by the Indian Eskimo Association. Sunday evening Dec. 10 we had our

banquet with Mr. Carlson Flett as guest speaker. Mr. Flett, a former student of Assiniboia is from Island Lake. He is presently working on Community Development.

A most unfortunate incident occurred on November 23. Our home-room teacher Sister Tougas fell and fractured her wrist while teaching in the Grade Eleven Girls classroom. Her accident caused the suspension of her classes for a week.

There is also a change in our religion class procedure. Last year the teacher used the lecture method. Now we have groups that are assigned certain subjects on which they research. Then they bring their findings to the whole class and we discuss their reports. One student from each group leads the discussion while our teacher, Father Chatelain listens and makes appropriate comments. There are four groups in all. One group deals with Youth Problems, another with Indian Affairs, still another with Guidance and the last deals with Bible and Liturgy.

I hope that this report has given you an idea of what we have been striving to accomplish during the first term.

On November 13, 1966, the students assembled in the gymnasium for the first M.A.M.I. meeting of the 66/67 school year. The president, Robert Houle, presided over the meeting. The structure of the meeting was the same as previous years. The heads of sections acted as Consultants whenever the opportunity arose.

The topic of the meeting was "Why Am I At Assiniboia?" and was prepared by the M.A.M.I. executive. A story, clearly illustrating the difficulties encountered by Indian students, today served as a handle. One of the questions that appeared in the questionnaire was, "What does Assiniboia mean to you in regard to reserve life and modern society?" The Consensus seemed to be that Assiniboia is a place of preparation, a stepping stone from reserve to modern society which one learns to adapt himself. Naturally, there was some dissention, namely, that Assiniboia does not adapt us to modern society; that we lose contact with the outside world. This, of course, was dismissed as unjustified because of the extracurricular activities and individual outings.

Another question was "Do you prefer Assiniboia or a public school?" The ones who preferred Assiniboia stated that they are at ease with the teachers and feel more free to talk and question. The students who preferred a public school, were those who attended one. And the reasons they gave were that the schools offered better facilities and teaching methods.

The second meeting took place November 29, 1966. The bulletin entitled, "What Do Parents Mean To Us?", was prepared by Pauline Martin, Cameron Wood and their groups. Our former principal, Rev. O. Robidou~~x~~ attended the meeting. His presence certainly revived some old memories.

You are about to read what the sons and daughters think of their parents. They thought that parents are everything. They are God's representatives and best laymen in the service of God. 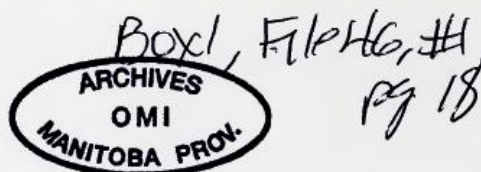
LONG WEEKEND MOVIES

Since the beginning of the year, we have been kept busy by one of our favorite activities, namely sports. As participation in sport is fundamental to our physical health, we have been encouraged to develop an interest in it, although it has been a favorite for most of us.

From the beginning of September to the present, we have had a chance to try our abilities in five different types of sports, soccer, volleyball, skating, basketball, and bowling.

Before the winter weather set in, soccer was our favorite pastime. Under the instructions of the boys' supervisor, Mr. J. Cardinal, we learned that there can be a variety of interesting games that can be played with the soccer ball. 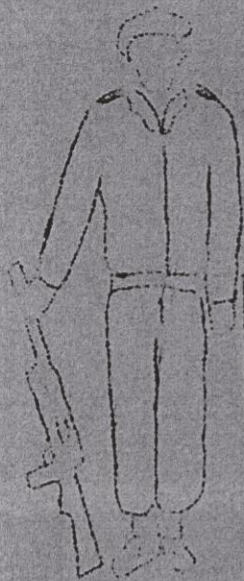

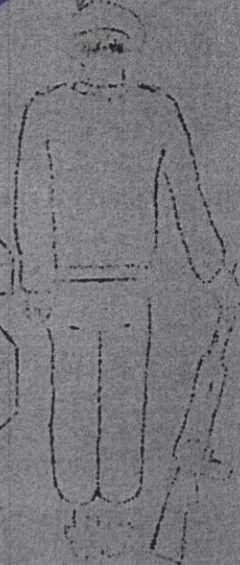
