
The other lady that was at the school broke down about three months ago and had to go east.

You know probably better than I do, because I am not a teacher, that children do not get much of an education unless they go to school more or less regularly. Therefore you might say that the way the school is going at the present time, with only 50% attendance, it is more or less of a joke.

I had an opportunity of speaking to one of the Councillors before I left there, John Pelly, who has a fairly good education and speaks good English and I asked him to speak to the band and tell them that unless these Indians sent their children more regularly to school it would probably be necessary for our Department to close up the Institution, and John realized this. Whether my advice to him will be followed by the other Indians or not I do not know. He was the only one I had an opportunity of speaking to as I left in the afternoon.

I realize that teachers are very hard to get, but whoever is there it takes a man to fire the furnace.

The repairs that are necessary will be taken up later.

Re: Cote School

I visited this institution on Saturday morning, the 26th instant and naturally there were no children there at that time, but I went over the place and had a long talk with the Rev. Miss Corner, who is the teacher there.

Repairs

The school is in fair shape but there are a certain number of repairs that will have to be made - for instance; a new cistern in the basement. I was informed, and I saw the cistern, that it has gotten full of little holes. This was caused by the zinc gradually rusting. The furnace is also in bad shape. This was a misfit in the first place and 28 years ago I wrote reams of letters regarding this furnace and I finally got it changed so that it would heat the school. Mr. Bryant is going to get Mr. Barrie from Pelly, who is a tinsmith, to look at the furnace and the cistern, also some eave-troughing that has fallen off the school, and find out what it will cost to effect the repairs.

The fence around the school also needs repairing. Probably all new posts will have to be put in. Mr. Bryant will also attend to this in due course.

The attendance at the school is what caught my attention. There are 29 on the register and I suppose a lot more of school age that are not registered, but the attendance would I do not suppose average 15 during the year. However, the Department have that information. I talked very seriously on the matter of attendance with Miss Corner and she admitted frankly that she had done her best to get the Indians to attend but just simply could not awaken them to the fact that their children had to come to school to get an education. For instance; she informed me that the two that were her star pupils in attendance had lost 17½ days during the year. Others stayed away for days and days at a time. In fact these are her exact words " if the children want to stay at home the Mothers will let them do so" and you know the result. I talked to Mr. Bryant, the Agent, on this matter and he made the statement that he did not try to encourage the older boys to attend school as Miss Corner could not handle them. The Rev. Miss Corner seemed to be quite a fine woman but she may not have the necessary qualifications for making a good teacher. No doubt she has the education, but whether she has the qualities to pass this on to the children is more than I know. However, to start with the management of the school is not what it should be. As you know this is what they call an Improved Day School. Five bedrooms upstairs and several rooms downstairs. It has a large furnace where cordwood sticks are used. In fact I think the furnace box is 48" long. Miss Corner



Adverting to your report in this connection, dated the 13th instant, please be advised that all members of this Force are truant officers for the purposes of Section 10 of this Act, it is not understood why you recommend that a truant officer be appointed for the Cote Reserve, particularly as this is apparently the first occasion that you have been required to give any attention to the matter of truancy.

2. Under these circumstances it is not considered necessary to recommend the appointment of a truant officer for this Reserve. However, if in the future you find that this matter requires more attention than you can provide, you may discuss same with the Indian Agent, who, if necessary, would no doubt make suitable recommendation, regarding the appointment of a truant officer, to his Department.

1. In the above connection, please be advised that on the 12th instant, J.L. BRYANT, Indian Agent, contacted the writer and complained that Miss Elisabeth ROBERTSON, Cote Day School teacher was having difficulty maintaining regular attendance of her pupils at school. Mr. BRYANT advised that no Attendance officer had ever been appointed on the reserve in question and he requested that Police action be taken under section 10 of the Indian Act. At 9.00 AM this date the writer patrolled via Pol/Car Code 8260 to the Cote Reserve, where I went over the subject with J.L. BRYANT. I suggested that it might be advisable to have a truant officer appointed, if the matter was likely to need much attention. The principle offenders appeared to be the children of Campbell SHINGOOSE, John PELLY, George Bell COTE, Victor SHINGOOSE, James SHINGOOSE, Roy WHITEHAWK and Allan FIDDLER, all treaty Indians.

Heavy rains on this date made it impossible to travel the reserve trails by car, and it was decided that it would probably suffice at the moment, if I contacted the teacher in question, and warned what students that happened to be in attendance this date as to their future behaviour. I found only six students in attendance at the school, and Miss ROBERTSON the teacher, advised that the attendance of all had been very poor, in the past. She considered however that the extremely wet day would no doubt account for the absence of many of the children. I warned the children, present, as to the consequences of truancy, and that police action would result if the truancy continued. The teacher intimated that she believed that the warning so given, would probably have the desired effect for a time at least, and that she would again take the matter up with the Indian Agent, if the truancy continued.

I advised Mr. BRYANT of the action, taken and it was decided to take no further action this date. Should further complaints of this nature arise, warnings in writing will be given the various parents. The writer would respectfully request that this subject be taken up with the Superintendent General of Indian Affairs, with a view to having a truant officer appointed for the Cote reserve district. This file is being considered closed at this time to be reopened in the event that further action by the Police is requested.

Schools

Due to the man power shortage it has been necessary to get along as best we could with available teachers in our day schools, staffed by one of the church missions as they are. The first concern of the church mission is to supply a missionary, generally some one is chosen who is not much success in a parish and little thought is given to his or her ability as a teacher, and in most cases they have had no teacher experience and are anything but a success at the job. Under the present set up I doubt if we can ever hope to get the results that we should normally expect, and it is unfortunate for the children that spend several years at these schools seeking an education.

I beg to submit herewith a report on the affairs of this Agency, for the quarter ending June 30th, 1946. 75-17

EDUCATION:-

Miss Robertson of Cot Day School has returned to her home and I understand will not return. She is a very fine woman and certainly did not spare herself trying to manage a very heavy school. However she has been in poor health and latterly the children became very difficult for her to handle, in fact they were almost out of hand entirely. In the appointment of a successor I think we should insist on a male teacher. As I do not think there would be a bit of use sending another woman teacher for this difficult school. There is also to be a change at Key Day school, and here again I hope we can have someone appointed that really knows something about teaching and the handling of Indian children. Nothing definite has been done about starting day school at Valley River. We may have to use some of the new ~~catholic~~ catholic church for this purpose until we can build a school at a rental of \$40.00 per month, but here again I would not recommend starting a day school there unless we can be assured that a male teacher that has some experience can be supplied for that point.

St Philips Residential school has built an addition to the present school and will be able to accommodate more pupils this coming term. This school is well managed, children are happy and on the whole parents are satisfied with the results.
