



Dear Sir:

We are just finishing putting on the last of the paint supplied to us in the fall. We have covered the halls on the main floor throughout four feet high, the assembly hall walls seven feet, platform walls to the ceiling, the two reading rooms, two bedrooms and phone office on the main floor, halls complete in basement, the engineer's room, basement bath room, and the dining room five feet high, also the dispensary on second floor. There is now such a contrast with what we have done and what is not done we feel we should go ahead with about as much more painting. Both recreation rooms and the adjoining bath rooms and toilet rooms need it badly, also all the halls on the two other flats, both small dormitories, and a number of the bedrooms. It will take at least another fifty dollars worth of paint to cover all this work, and we are hereby making application for same.

Some of our boys are becoming quite proficient at painting.

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

When we took over this School twelve years ago the late Rev. Thompson Ferrier took with him furniture valued at \$300.00 which was the amount of furniture he supplied of his own when he became Principal about 30 years previous. This left the house considerably depleted, and as we had a good deal of furniture of our own we used this and purchased from our own funds what additional furniture we required.

My successor, Rev. R. T. Chapin, is here at the present time and we have gone over the furniture situation together, and as the School residence at Norway House has been furnished they have no furniture of their own; and after looking carefully into the matter the following is the furniture required to meet the situation at present:

Chesterfield and two chairs (probable cost)	\$125.00
Living room table	15.00
Two occasional chairs	30.00
Bedroom suite - 3 piece	80.00
Mattress	20.00
Total	270.00

Reverend Sir:

I have your letter of the 30th ultimo with reference to furniture which you state is required in view of the change of Principal at the Brandon Residential School.

Our appropriations this year have been reduced and as a result it was only found possible to include an amount of \$500.00 for repairs, improvements and purchase of new equipment at the Brandon School. Our estimates were prepared several months ago and have now been submitted to Parliament. My understanding is that supplementary estimates will not be considered. Under these circumstances you can understand how difficult it is to consider expending the amount you mention for furniture when no provision was made in our current year's appropriation. If the furniture mentioned in your letter were bought it would mean that only the difference between its price and the \$500.00 in the appropriation would be available for repairs and improvements at the Brandon School during the current fiscal year.

It would be appreciated if you would give the whole matter further consideration and let me hear from you again.

ACTING DEPARTMENTAL PURCHASING AGENT

Attached is a requisition for a chesterfield set costing not more than \$125.00 for the Principal's residence at the Brandon Indian Residential School.

It has always been our practice to provide furniture in the Principal's residence at a residential school and in the case of the Brandon School the Principal's residence is in a separate building. This school is conducted under the auspices of the United Church of Canada and the Principal states that when he took charge of the school 12 years ago there was very little furniture in the building and, although the Department purchased some, a considerable amount of the furniture was owned by Dr. Doyle.

Dr. Doyle is retiring as Principal of the school on June 30 and is being succeeded by Rev. R.T. Chapin, who has been Principal of the Norway House Indian Residential School. Rev. Mr. Chapin has no furniture of his own as the school residence at Norway House was furnished by the Department.

There are some pieces of furniture around the Brandon School which can be used in Mr. Chapin's residence but a chesterfield set is required to furnish the living room.

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The cost of the chesterfield set will be taken from the amount provided in the current year's appropriation for repairs, improvements and purchase of new equipment at the Brandon School. I recommend the purchase of this furniture.


