The above is for bush construction, the work on poles will require different equipment and may run up the expense to \$500.00

Permission would also have to be obtained from the C.N.Ry. to place the wire alongside the track and on the bridge crossing the Saskatchewan.

The grant for placing poles does not mention who is to supply them, I presume the school authorities would do this, but it would be well to have these matters straightened out before anything is done.

I do not think we would have trouble getting a connection on the town exchange, this would have to be considered also.

Size

Inside basket shall be _____ inches in diameter. Countershaft shall be angle type.

Basket

Shall be constructed with sides perforated with sufficient number of holes to permit free discharge of extracted water, heavily galvanized inside and out, and riveted to top and bottom of basket. Bottom shall be of cast iron, cored to make a double web, truly machined, and inside surface covered with sheet copper, heavily tinned. Top shall be reinforced with a steel ring spun into place. A series of steel bands shall be fitted to basket sides to reinforce same. Basket shall be tested for running balance at rated speed.

Curb and Base

Outside curb shall be an extra heavy one-piece casting and standard or base shall also be cast in one piece. Curb and base shall be securely bolted together, becoming in effect one solid, rigid casting. Curb shall be equipped with drain openings in bottom and fitted with detachable cast-iron top ring.

Safety Cover

Shall be equipped with hinged safety cover.

Safety Bumper and Spindle

Rubber safety ring shall be fitted on bottom of basket and so arranged that when basket is unevenly loaded the rubber shall engage with curb bottom, thus preventing basket from striking outer curb when finding its balance. Basket shall be supported on spindle-steel spindle, equipped with driving pulley. Spindle shall be turned and ground to size and taper fit in basket bottom. Shall be secured by a brass lock nut. Lower end of spindle shall have a syphon arrangement, consisting of a hollow chamber, forming an oil reservoir for circulation of oil around the spindle. See sectional view on reverse side.

Balancing Device

Base casting shall be constructed with a detachable well casting for receiving the balancing device. In said casting shall be located a phosphor-bronze sleeve bearing for receiving spindle,


provided with flange above and below which shall be located rubber spring cushions, engaging flanges on well casting, and held in place by a spanner nut threaded in well casting. Shall be provided with three hardened, double convex, tool-steel buttons at bottom of bearing, on which spindle shall operate. Oil nuts shall be fitted on top of bearing in such a manner as to feed oil to spindle and furnish a tight joint, to prevent oil from coming in contact with rubbers.

Brake


Extractor shall be fitted with a friction foot brake attached to base, working on spindle pulley. Shall be equipped with locking device, to prevent sudden shock and hold brake in position until basket stops revolving.

Countershaft and Idlers

Shall have countershaft bolted to curb and base, forming a self-contained part of the machine. Shall consist of a cast-iron bracket supporting the shaft with its tight and loose pulleys and friction driving pulley, and also guide or idler pulleys. One of the idler pulleys shall be equipped with an adjustable device for taking up slack in belt.




Sectional View Showing General Construction

Cylinder

Shall have heads and staves of Crown Prime Long Leaf Yellow Pine, air dried, with ribs of hard Maple. Staves cut from 1½-inch stock shall be nailed to heads cut from 2-inch stock. There shall be three large lifting ribs each cut from stock 2½-inches thick by 4 inches deep; also a rib cut from 3-inch by 3-inch stock, placed at front and back of door opening rabbetted to receive door. Door shall be 15½-inches wide. Door battons shall be of brass. Hinges shall be wide and heavy, and shall rest on bottom of door opening and on brass plates on front door rib. Latches shall have wide lips. Cylinder shall be banded with wide and heavy hoops, fastened to the staves by means of brass screws.

Tub

Shall be constructed of clear and better Fir, with staves cut from 2-inch stock, tongued and grooved and gained to fit over heads cut from 2-inch stock, to which they shall be nailed. A galvanized-iron sliding door shall operate in grooves provided on adjustable encircling bands or hoops. Brass apron shall be fitted at bottom of door opening to protect the staves.

A gauge glass shall be mounted on left tub head.

Iron Frames

Cast-iron frames of heavy design, rigidly bolted to the tub heads, shall support the weight of the inside cylinder and outside tub and the driving mechanism shall be bolted to these frames. Frames shall be bolted to the tub heads and shall be absolutely rigid.

Inlet and Outlet

Located in the center bottom of the tub shall be a combination cast-iron flange tee through which the steam and water shall enter and waste water be discharged. Steam shall enter washer through an annular steam passage cored in the tee without coming in direct contact with the wood or linen. Connected with the flange tee shall be an outlet pipe, on the end of which a 3-inch quick-opening valve of the hollow taper plug type shall be fitted.

Provision shall be made for 2-inch water and $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch steam connections.

Trunnions and Bearings


Cast-iron trunnions shall be attached to cylinder heads by means of brass covered bolts and inside of cylinder heads shall be fitted with two brass trunnion rings. The journals of trunnions shall operate in babbitted bearings equipped with easily accessible lubricators. Journal bearings shall be supported by the cast-iron frames.

Gearing

Shall be machine cut from solid blanks and provided with solid gear guards for the protection of the operator. The main gear shall be of the split hub type, bolted and keyed to trunnion shaft. A gear lock shall be provided for holding cylinder door in position while loading and unloading.

Automatic Reverse Mechanism

Shall consist of three 16-inch diameter pulleys and a worm and cam movement, producing a fixed number of reverse revolutions of the cylinder. Entire shifting mechanism shall be mounted on heavy cast-iron swiveling arm, adjustable to belt at various angles. Header shall be supported by bracket arm bolted to cast-iron frame and shall embody strength, simplicity and reliability and be arranged for $1\frac{3}{4}$ and 2-inch belts.

Dear Sir;

In reply to your letter of the 2nd inst., NO.128-1-5, requesting an expression of my views, relative to the installation of better laundry facilities at the Mackay School, The Pas, Man., I beg to state that I carefully examined, at the time of my last visit, that part of the basement of the Main Building, which is at present being utilized as a laundry, and came to the conclusion, that it could be very well adapted to accommodate modern laundry equipment.

- In this connection I beg to enclose herewith -
- (1) the ground plan of the rooms in question.
 - (2) illustrated pages from the Stanley Brock Company, showing the kind of washer and extractor desired.

With regard to the installation of these, the above firm in their letter of January 12th make the following statements :-

" We would suggest the following :-

- 1 - Only 36" X 54" Globe Wood Washer (1) door in cylinder, (1) door in tub, end header.
- 1 - Only 26" Angle Attached Solid Curb Extractor.

The list price of the Washer is \$400.00 at the factory, and the list price of the Extractor is \$500.00 at the factory. However, we give the Department of Indian Affairs

" a little better price, and this would possibly amount to 10% off these prices.

We are making a note on your plan how these could be installed, and they can be driven easily by a 5 horse power engine. We supplied the belting for the Indian Schools also, and it takes about \$30.00 or \$35.00 worth of belting for this installation.

The 36" X 54" Washer is possibly the standard size, and we believe that you will find this size O.K. for your School.

We are trying to make up a carload of laundry machinery for Winnipeg, and if successful we can give the head of your department, carload rate of freight from Toronto to Winnipeg, which is a very large saving, in fact we brought the last two orders we received from Mr. Bunn into Winnipeg in a carload of machinery, then we shipped from here "



Sir:

I have your No. 4183-135 of the 16th instant, estimating the cost of enlarging the hogpen and henhouse at the Mackay Indian Residential School. I have been in correspondence with the church authorities concerning the most needed expenditure at this school, and they have requested that laundry machinery and equipment be supplied first. There is an item in the Estimates in this connection, and, if allowed by Parliament, laundry machinery will be purchased in the near future. The enlarging of the two outbuildings mentioned in your letter cannot be undertaken by the Department at the present time, as our funds are extremely limited.

I have also your No. 4187-135 of the 16th instant, with reference to the principal's request for an outboard engine for his freight canoe. As mentioned in the previous paragraph, Indian Education funds are entirely assigned at the present time and I regret that favourable consideration cannot be given to the Rev. Mr. Bird's request.

With further reference to my two letters dated January 23rd and one dated February 5th, respectively (No. 128-1-5) relative to equipment required at the Mackay School, I beg to direct your attention to the very urgent necessity of having a new engine, pump, and air-pump supplied to this institution.

In a letter just received from the Principal and dated April 26th he writes as follows:-

"With regard to the engine, pump, and air-pump, in addition to the workshop, all of which were destroyed by the fire on January 11th, none of these have yet been renewed.

We are using the saw engine at present and as the packing in the old pump is constantly blowing out we are hardly able to pump water to the top floor and consequently have no protection against fire in the main school building. This matter should be attended to at once. The Agent, I think, has done his best to secure these, but so far without success probably because the 1924-25 fiscal year is just closing and the estimates for 1925-26 fiscal year have not yet been passed".

If you will be so good as to give these items early and favourable consideration our Society will be very grateful indeed.


I have your letter of the 8th instant, relative to the request made by the Principal of the Mackay Indian Residential School to supply a mowing machine.
