

Memorandum

Re: Mount Elgin School.

When visiting the Caradoc Agency on the 22nd and 23rd of May, Mr. Arneil, Indian Agent Downs, and myself, discussed what should be done with the present Mount Elgin School, when the new school is completed.

Mr. Downs suggested that we should remove the two top floors, leaving the ground floor of the building and use this partly for a recreational centre for the Indians, the balance for meetings of home makers clubs, etc.

My own opinion is, it would be a very expensive proposition to carry out Mr. Down's suggestion, and when the work is completed, we would only have an old building, very difficult to heat, and likely, almost impossible to keep clean.

Mr. Down has already had inquiries from wrecking firms wishing to quote a price on tearing down the building.

I feel very definitely that when the new school is completed, the old school should be demolished.

No doubt, a recreation centre for the Indians would be very advisable, and possibly it should be located on the site of the present Mount Elgin School, but I believe that a new building erected for this purpose would not cost as much as it would to endeavour to renovate the present building and would be much more satisfactory.

IMPORTANT - *Caution Notice*

PLEASE READ CAREFULLY

ACCEPTANCE OF SHIPMENT AND BREAKAGE

The goods covered by the attached invoice were received for by the Railroad Company or Trucking Company as having been received by them in good condition and properly packed. Before accepting the shipment from the Railroad Company or Trucking Company it is your duty to assure yourself that all articles enumerated on the bill of lading are included in the shipment and in good condition. To protect yourself against loss or damage in transit, check the shipment carefully with your bill of lading, noting the number of crates or packages and their condition. **Any parts broken by the Railroad Company or Trucking Company will be duplicated free of charge by us on the following conditions only:**

1st. The consignee must not give the Railroad Company or Trucking Company a clear receipt for the complete shipment if there is any shortage, breakage or damage of any kind. In the event there is any shortage, or if any part of the shipment is damaged, the consignee can give a receipt for the goods if the Railroad Agent or Trucking Agent will make a notation on the freight bill indicating the amount of the shortage or the extent and the nature of the damage. **The original freight bill must be mailed to us.**

If the breakage or damage is concealed and not discovered until the goods are unpacked, notify the Agent of the Railroad Company or Trucking Company by letter or telephone to call immediately and examine the shipment. The carrier is equally responsible for "**Concealed Damage**" as for visible damage and when notified as suggested it places the burden of proof upon the carrier. When you have given the Railroad Company or Trucking Company notice in the manner suggested, mail us your bill of lading and paid freight receipt.

2nd. When there is shortage, breakage or damage in an express shipment, request your Express Agent to furnish you receipt showing the condition in which the shipment was delivered to you.

3rd. When you report shortage or breakage to us, enumerate fully and describe clearly the parts you desire replaced.

NOTE: In ordering standards for School Desks specify size and whether right or left, which is always determined as you sit in the desk. It is well to supplement your order by mentioning the pattern mark you will find on the piece. If several styles of desks, be sure to specify the style for which the parts are desired, particularly if wooden parts are being ordered. Care in making your order clear and complete will permit us to give immediate service.

4th. All claims for shortage, breakage or damage must be made within **thirty days** and you must provide us with the necessary papers to enable us to file claim against the Railroad, Express or Trucking Company, as explained in paragraphs No. 1 and No. 2. Otherwise claim will not be allowed.

5th. We are not responsible for parts broken through carelessness of drayman hauling the goods or your workmen in assembling and installing.

STORAGE

The furniture manufactured under this contract was constructed from thoroughly air seasoned and properly kiln-dried material and was in perfect condition when shipment left our factory. This does not mean that parts will remain perfect regardless of local atmospheric conditions. Under no condition store this furniture even temporarily in a damp room or basement nor in a partly completed structure where building material, such as plaster, calcimine, paint, etc., may be thrown over the crates. Store in a dry, well ventilated room of normal uniform temperature.




Memorandum

Memorandum:

MR. HOKY.

Inspector Arneil and I visited the Caradoc Agency on May 22 and 23, in connection with the proposed erection of a new four-room day school, to replace the Mount Elgin Indian Residential School.

There are two sites available - one in the village of Muncey and the other on the property formerly occupied by the Mount Elgin Residential School. We favour the latter site because there is an excellent location available and, in addition, we have an opportunity for teaching agricultural subjects to the pupils.

The only difficulty with this site is that the road from Muncey to the new site is reported to be in very bad condition at certain periods of the year. The road is one mile long and it may be expensive to put it in condition to be used at all periods of the year. However, this work will be necessary, as we expect to be driving the children to the new school and, consequently, a year around road will be required.

We interviewed Mr. T. S. Caldwell, District Engineer, Ontario Highways Department, London, with a view to obtaining some assistance from the Provincial Government. Mr. Caldwell promised to inspect the road and let us have an estimate of what it would cost to put it into proper condition. When visiting Mr. Caldwell, we also met Mr. Marshall, Chief Engineer of the Highways Department, and the latter instructed Mr. Caldwell to forward a report to him so that a decision might be made regarding what portion of the cost could be met by the Ontario Highways.

With reference to the erection of the new school, Inspector Arneil obtained the following information:

- (a) Foundation - Graham and Graham, London, Ontario, are prepared to shovel out the excavation in three days' time. They will require 2 weeks' notice before we desire to have the work completed.
- (b) Building Foreman - Charles Ludy, Builder, Rodney, Ont., is available. He has an excellent reputation as a builder and his services can be secured within the next two weeks. He has built many houses and one church at Rodney. He can read blue prints and take full charge. Indian helpers, many of whom are competent carpenters, are available, as well as other Indian labour.
- (c) Material - This can likely be secured within two months' time. It may be necessary to apply to the Timber Controller for priority. Arrangements were made with a qualified man to prepare a list of the materials and forward this to the Department by June 1.



I might also mention that both Indian Agent Down and the newly appointed farm instructor have had considerable experience in erecting buildings and will be in a position to supervise the erection of the school and keep the Department fully informed.

With reference to Mr. Phelan's visit to the Caradoc Agency last week, regarding the proposed new school, I wish to confirm the following arrangements:-


1. You can secure the services of a surveyor to properly lay out the site. It is understood that the services of Mr. John Findlay, St. Thomas, Ontario, are available, and that his services will only be required for a very short time.
 2. Arrangements for the cement mixer and a competent man to operate it are in your hands and you will, no doubt, arrange for this when it is required.
 3. Nails and other hardware needed may be secured when and where available. I understand that these are in short supply at present and will have to be purchased wherever available.
 4. I am informed that in company with Mr. Phelan you interviewed Mr. D. D. Crawford, Delaware, Ontario, with reference to carpenters and brick-layers when needed. I am also informed that an endeavour was made to meet Mr. Ed. Bateman, Mount Brydges, but you did not succeed in meeting him. Both these gentlemen should be consulted before white brick-layers or carpenters are employed, but if they are unable to supply competent tradesmen when the work is ready to proceed, either yourself or the Foreman, Mr. Charles Ludy, may make necessary arrangements.
- 5- The gentlemen mentioned in paragraph 4 should also be consulted with a view to having them nominate electrical contractors from whom quotations may be obtained for wiring the new school.

6. As you are aware, Mr. Charles Ludy, Rodney, Ontario, has been appointed as Foreman and you should feel free to use his services in connection with arrangements for the new school so as to relieve your office. Before the actual construction of the school commences, you should let me know if you have been successful in obtaining the extra clerk in your office. If not, we will have to make other arrangements for handling the paylists.
7. Indian labour should be used as far as possible.
8. For your information, I enclose copies of letters that have been forwarded to the firms whom Mr. Phelan and yourself interviewed.

Dear Mr. Fairlie:

I am forwarding you, under separate cover, two sets of basically standard plans and documents covering the erection by contract of a four classroom type day school. Each set includes the following:

- (a) Blueprints comprising 7 sheets of working drawings
- (b) Contract Agreement
- (c) General Conditions
- (d) Labour Conditions
- (e) General Specifications

I think these plans and documents are along the lines of our discussion last week and I hope this information will meet your requirements.

Schedule "A" Forms covering this type of four classroom Indian day school, were forwarded you in January last by the Director of the Indian Affairs Branch. If additional schools of this type are proposed, Form "A" will be submitted covering them. The same standard plans and documents being forwarded you now will, of course, cover all schools of this type.

It is our understanding that with the information now enclosed you will be able to approve this type of building project for the Indian Affairs Branch in the reserve list of public projects.

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
