



# Father Principal's Message

Dear Parents and Friends,  
I have gladly accepted the invitation to write a few words in the Tee-Pee Tidings because it gives you the opportunity to get acquainted with me.

On September 13, 1964, I arrived at St. Paul's, Lebret, to replace Rev. Fr. Victor Bilodeau O.M.I. whom you all have known so well during the six years he was Principal here. Father Bilodeau certainly used his numerous talents to the best of his ability to guide and help the students of Lebret. He served here from September 1958 to August of this year. His absence is now deeply felt in this school.

Although I had been Principal at St. Philip's Indian Residential School for six years, my first weeks at Lebret were rather stunning. When I arrived at Lebret the school was still undergoing major repairs. Every single room was in complete disorder and buried under dust. It was most discouraging indeed. However, Father Dion, Father D. Ruest and Brother Aubry along with the teachers, the domestic staff and the Sisters worked like slaves for a full week and on Sunday September 20, the school reopened as planned.

Over 300 students, distributed over grades 1 to 12, flocked in from all over Saskatchewan, including places like Canoe Lake, Big River, etc. As they kept coming, I was wondering where they would all sleep..... On Monday morning, work started in 13 classrooms, with each student sitting at his own workdesk anxious to begin another year of learning. This was enough to prove, dear parents, that St. Paul's has the best of people on its staff.

During the last two months, I have been getting to know all the students who come from 41 different Indian Reserves in Saskatchewan. As I meet them in class or in the playgrounds I greatly admire their joyful spirit, their ambition to work to the best of their ability and their well-mannered deportment. They certainly succeed in keeping busy with their numerous study periods, various sports, social evenings, outings, music, praying, etc. etc..

I still wonder at times how they can keep up with so many activities and yet find more time for free study periods, for writing Tee-Pee Tidings and all their other activities. Amazing indeed!

Nevertheless, I am extremely concerned at present with the future of these fine High School boys and girls who show so much interest in their education. Like many others in the past and many more in the future, they hope to leave St. Paul's prepared to face the many problems of life. Unfortunately, the lack of facilities does not always permit this. Our students do not find sufficient space to hang all their clothes properly or to store their sports equipment conveniently. Furthermore, they should have a library where they could develop the habits of personal reading and research; a decent laboratory for Physics and Chemistry; enough classrooms for all grades; a room for band practice; more playrooms and more playgrounds. Those who cannot reach Grade 12 and University (and this is no disgrace) should find, at least, a minimum of facilities to prepare themselves for some technical school.

This school has made a great contribution to the Indian people in the past. Times are changing and more and greater demands are being made on our young people. A group of Indian parents visited the school last week. They openly expressed their firm desire to see, in the near future, their Alma Mater equipped to answer the present needs of the Saskatchewan Indian students who still rely on Lebret for their education.


May this dream, with the assistance of Indian Affairs, soon become a reality.




We have noticed that all are of the finest quality, especially designed to blend into the social conditioning portion of our daily student training program.







We are writing for our school newspaper, "Tee Pee Tidings". Our class president is Philip Anaquod and our secretary is Joyce White Bear.



Here is a poem put together by the Grade III pupils (and their teacher) about us.





16-Boys go to Melville...Rugby tonight. Results? Game tie.

So far in the 1964-65 season this is our first page. We have formed a Basketball Intramural League made up of six teams:



But my main ambition is to acquire the "know how" that makes the men of tomorrow.




Due to the late start of school, the Corps is somewhat behind in the training programme. However, we hope we can make up for the loss of time during the remainder of the training period.





