The reason for the omission is that both Mr. Lett and the Indian Agent were absent from Lytton when I left. I feel sure the Department will accept my Statement as rendered.

I note in the Department's letter advising me of my appointment as Inspector of Construction for the Old Suns School, I am to receive \$6.00 per day, and Indian Agent Gooderham will certify my Time a/c. I shall have future Vouchers certified as directed.

In the Wage Scale set for the various trades, in keeping with the prevailing rates, the tendency is generally upward, but the remuneration set for the man capable of supervising all the work is even less than before, in which inglorious distinction he stands alone! Without in any way reflecting on the good intentions of the Department which I have the honour of serving, may I ask if it is not possible to do somewhat better for the Department's representative on the job? My best services, and my full loyalty to the Department, are assured in any case, and it is with all due respect that I am venturing to allude to what seems to me to be an inconsistency in the scale of wages as affecting myself.

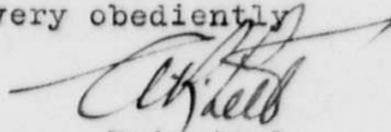
Dear Mr. Graham-

Kindly take the matter up with the Dept. with a view of immediate increase in the Class Room Seating Capacity.

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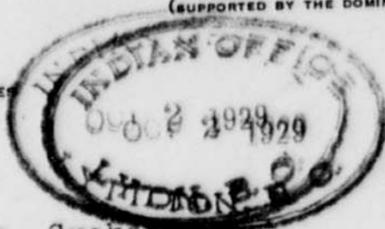

Dear Mr. Graham

With our present numbers of 147--- 2 in the hospital who will be back to school shortly, 5 still absent which absence I am unable to account for, I have been diligent<sup>ly</sup> enquiries and reports of their being yet out, and also an expected increase of perhaps some 20 whom you contemplate sending in, it will be necessary to increase the number of desks in the class rooms by 35.

As the quarterly report shows there are now grades 1 & 1A and the contemplated increase will increase this number to approximately 95. These children are mainly under 10 years of age and of no use in manual training of any sort as by virtue of their age they are not able for much only play.

With the present system of half day class room work 50 % of these children are running around without supervision and would like permission to rearrange the Jr. Work so that these children would receive teachers supervision from 9 o'clock until 4 o'clock. Play ground supervision for two hrs. and from 10 to 12 in the Class room in the A.M. and 1,30 to 3 in the P.M.

This arrangement would mean an additional teacher and a salary of \$607.00 per month which I think I could stand with the proposed increase of numbers.

It might also relieve a feeling now existing among the Parents wherein they

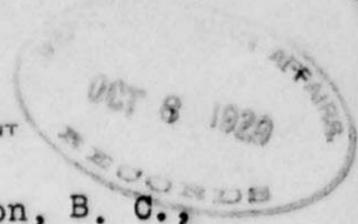

I herewith beg to enclose a requisition for school material from St. George's Residential School.

You will note that on it they have asked for a set of scales. In regard to this I beg to state that the children are weighed regularly, and the scales that they have now are very inaccurate, and it is most essential that these children's weights should be kept properly, and I would like to recommend that a good new set be supplied.

You will also note that they have applied for a number of desks. The Rev. Principal has just discussed this question with me, and he states that he is trying to add more pupils to the school, and as the majority of these children who are now being taken in are all very young, being seven and eight years of age, and are quite useless to do anything in the line of work around the school, he has decided that it would be very much better for them to be under supervision, and to have them in school a certain time both morning and afternoon. This will necessitate another teacher, and also mean more desks, thus the requisition.

Dear Mr Graham-

Re our Lighting Plant I beg to make the following report-

This plant has never given the service that it should have given for the type of engine installed. When first occupying the school the engines would not switch off and as a result continued to run on the batteries. I have been obliged many times to get up in the night to switch them off otherwise the strain on the batteries would be enormous. The batteries also had a leaky cell which caused rapid discharge, and I reported to the company shortly after moving into the school. We have been obliged to replace three sets of valves in the large unit. This the company claims due to overheating on account of poor circulation the pipes, having become blocked with alkali in the water. We have detached the pipes, and cleaned out the water system three times since installation, I also had to replace one head on the large unit due to a crack.

The repairs on the plant to date has cost the school \$133.36 with a bill now outstanding of \$40.00 and a list of repairs just submitted by the engineer which will run into another \$50.00. These repairs have all been put onto the large unit, the 3 K. W. engine has not given us any trouble at all, and is now working perfectly, while we are unable at present to get any more than 35 amps out of the 6 K.W. unit, which is only about half of its generating power.

The batteries at the present time are in very bad shape so much so that extra charging has to be done to keep any charge in them. This condition of the batteries is not due to over load in lighting, or to neglect in any way, but due to defective engines and also to the leaky cell.

I have been constantly reporting the grief we have had to the company principally through Commissioner Ditchburn. My engineer has been constantly complaining, and has been obliged to be on duty night and day in order to give light at all.

Last Nov. and Dec. we burned approximately \$ 250.00 worth of gas and oil due to valve trouble, and extra running in recharging batteries. The plant has during the year run us into an enormous overhead expense, all of which seems due to a defective plant. The Lister Co. will not hear of this yet I have seen that the plant has had the very best care, and personally cannot account for the grief we have been having, ~~with~~ Since the little unit has given good service I cannot see why the Large should not have done the same, were it not that something is wrong.

In conclusion I might say that I cannot see that the school or the Dept. should have to stand the expense of a New set of batteries

which is now evident. The last visit made to the school by a representative I approached him concerning the condition of the batteries, and he had the company replace the cracked cell, and also stated that he would see what could be done with the battery people regarding the installation of a new set. I have not had any more from him re his suggestion and am therefore submitting the condition to you, with a view of having the Dept. take the matter with the company ~~direct~~.

The school is not responsible for the present condition of the batteries especially since we have done our best to keep the engines in good running order, the expense of which as you see has been enormous.

Since the softener was installed we have used the softened water entirely, and in one month after the circulation had been cleaned out and new valves put in we again had the same trouble develop. We cannot go on spending on the plant in such a way without results. The whole trouble is centred in the Large unit and this and the batteries should be replaced by the firm.

You have personally been here and have witnessed the grief we have endured with the plant.

I shall be glad to give you any further information in my power in order that we shall not be obliged to enter upon the long winter evenings with a broken down lighting system.

The Company lately, in reply to correspondence stating the condition of the plant, said, it was impossible for it to become this way even with no care at all - but have taken no step whatever in the matter.

I herewith beg to enclose a letter from the Rev. Principal of St. George's Residential School, fully explaining the unsatisfactory state of the lighting system, in the school.

I might say that the Rev. Principal has called me up there times without number on account of the unsatisfactory state of this, and even today they are having to use candles every little while as the plant goes wrong, and they are left in darkness. I feel sure that this plant was not put in correctly in the first place, or it could not have given the trouble that it has. In fact, a plant of this description should have run several years without any appreciable expense. There are other plants of the same description at some of the other schools, which have given no trouble at all, and I certainly think that the Department should make the Lister Agents either replace this plant, or put it in satisfactory running order.

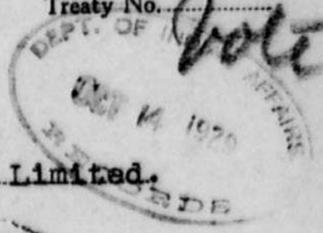

Our Winnipeg Office has forwarded on a copy of your letter to them of Oct. 18th, which we are glad to receive, and which shall receive immediate attention.

For your information, the writer is going to Lytton to make a thorough inspection of this plant. Our electrician called a couple of months ago at this school and gave the plant a thorough inspection. He found on arrival that the plants were being abused, in that the water cooling the engine was not the proper height, thereby naturally causing the engines to run exceptionally hot. This was carelessness on the part of the attendant, and was pointed out to Mr. Lett at the time he was there. Since that time a new operator has been put on the job, but he has been ordering unnecessary repair parts for these engines (that is in our opinion). I think you will admit that we should be in a position to know the parts which are never called for and never need replacing, and since he is ordering these parts and insists on getting them, and when he gets them admits that they do not benefit any, I think that there is something wrong with the operator.

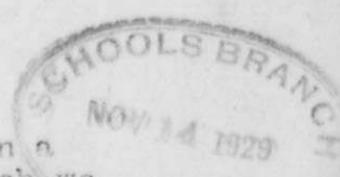
I will go to Lytton this week and would ask you to hold this matter in obedience until you hear from me further, as I will give you full details upon my return to Vancouver.

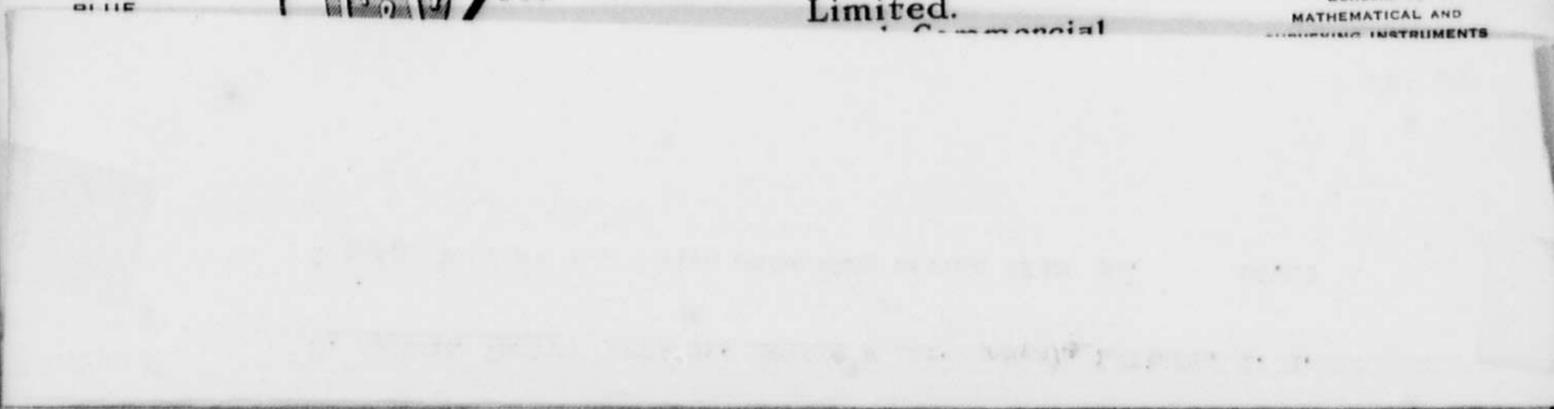

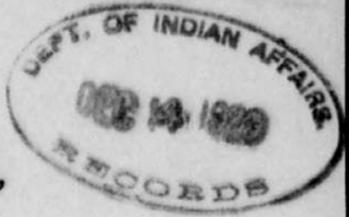

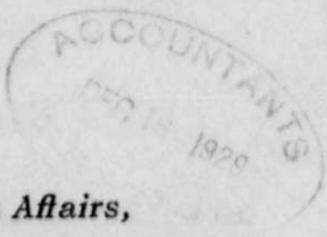
