

Dear Sir,

Mr. Campbell of the Campbell Heating Company came to see me on Friday the 12th instant and informed me that the pump installed at the Kenora (R.C.) School, would not supply water to the school owing to the extremely low level of the lake. I asked what he would suggest and he informed me he had a representative from the Fairbanks-Morse Company, who supplied the motor, and had also had Bro. Eugene Gauthier down, and it was not the fault of the pump, but was on account of the high lift. He suggested a new pump house be built near the lake, and the pump placed there so that the water could be pushed up instead of drawn up. In that case the pump would have ample capacity.

I do not like authorizing any further expenditure and got in touch with Mr. Gow of the Dominion Water Power Branch Winnipeg. He came down on Saturday morning and went to the school with Mr. Campbell and myself. He returned to Winnipeg and will make a report, and I trust you will receive this shortly, as the weather is commencing to get cold and something must be done before the ice forms. The old pump is at present operating, but is liable to stop at any time.

It was also suggested that some material, either straw or gravel would do, be placed over the intake to prevent it freezing. As soon as you receive this report I shall be glad if you will send me instructions as it is important that this be done without delay otherwise the school will probably be without water during the Winter, in which case it would have to be closed down.



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

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access to the check valve. I would set the motor and pump as low as possible but resting on a concrete platform, say 4" or 6" above the concrete floor.

The 4" pipe line should have been laid at least 3' below the lowest anticipated water level of the lake. It has been laid only about 1' below the water level prevailing in April and May, and at the present time, for a considerable distance from the shore. The fact that the old pipe line never froze, is no reason to assume that the new one won't, especially since the old pipe is set nearly 9" lower and appears to be encased within an outer pipe. The only safe measure for ensuring that this new pipe line will not freeze, is to lower it so that there is five feet of solid earth covering out to the point where the water is now 4' deep. I would not care to recommend any other course. It might be possible to so cover up the pipe line as it now rests, in shallow water, so as to prevent freezing, but I have no suggestions to make along these lines. You know what the consequences would be should this pipe line freeze up, so no expense should be considered too great to ensure interrupted water service.

I expect that Mr. J. T. Rose of this staff will be proceeding to Senora this week to carry out some investigations in connection with the proposed new sewerage disposal system for the R. C. School, and I have instructed him to accurately measure the suction lift, as the pump is now located, also in the recommended new location, also to determine the profile of the pipe line as laid. Mr. Rose's services will be available to you for any further investigations you wish made and for consultation.

Dear Captain:

Following our examination of the new pump and pipe line installed at the R. C. Indian School at Kenora, I have studied the Campbell Heating Company's proposals, made in writing to you, under date of April 30, 1930. This firm reported that the lake level was about 22 feet below the pump, and recommended their "First Proposal" as "the proper and thorough way to install this job", and "For the reason that this pump motor and suction line are of the proper capacity to do this job thoroughly". Acting upon their report and recommendations, I understand you advised that the work be proceeded with. Later, this Company demanded and secured, an additional \$600.00, above their original offer for doing the work. Mr. Campbell now states that the lake level is 24' 8" below the pump. I would here like to point out that on September 13th, the lake level was 1055.90, and on no day during the month of April, 1930, did the lake level reach this elevation; it was always lower. Had the suction lift been only 22 feet and had the 4" pipe line been properly laid below the frost line, and otherwise properly laid, in all probability the system would have worked, but however, with little margin of safety. I am now assuming that the suction lift has been found to be nearly 25 feet. The Campbell Heating Company, acting in the capacity of Advisory Engineers, as well as Contractors, have therefore, the responsibility of seeing that the system is made to work in a "thorough way".

Assuming the suction lift to be 25 feet, I am of the opinion that taking into consideration friction losses in the pipe line, and the possibility of still lower water in the lake, that the new pump, as installed, cannot be made to serve satisfactorily, and that no time should be wasted in attempting to make it do so.. The pump and motor are efficient, but not dependable against a suction lift in excess of 22 feet, when there are several friction losses. The remedy, therefore, is to decrease the suction lift by lowering the pump. Being as it is necessary to move the pump, it would be advisable to lower it sufficiently to ensure efficient operation. I would suggest that a new pump house be erected immediately over the check valve now installed below the old pump house. This pump house should be 8' x 10', with an 8" wall, with an 8" concrete floor slab resting on gravel with wooden trap door giving

Dear Sir,

On Friday the 12th instant, Mr. Campbell informed me the new pump installed at the Kenora (R.C.) School would not work. I got Mr. Gow, Acting District Engineer of the Dominion Water Power Branch to come to Kenora and go to the school with me. I enclose a letter received from him to-day.

His suggestion is that we build a new pump house at a cost roughly of \$250⁰⁰ and also that the only safe measure for ensuring that the new pump line will not freeze is to lower it so that there is at least five feet of solid earth covering out to the point where the water is four feet deep. He says it might be possible to so cover up the pipe line in shallow water so as to prevent freezing, but he has no suggestions to make along these lines, and no expense should be too great to ensure uninterrupted water service.

I have seen Mr. Campbell to-day and he informs me that the old pipe is only cased from the pump house to the check valve, and not in the lake. The new pipe when it strikes the water and from there on, is lower than the old one. He believes that if we were to cover the pipes which lay alongside each other until they strike deep water there will be no chance of their freezing. I would recommend the pump house be built and the pipe either covered or lowered and I should like to get instructions along these lines and in view of Mr. Gow's letter, should like to know who is to pay for the pump house and the work on the pump line. The water is lower in the lake than it has been for many years and the old pump is liable to give out at any time. I shall be glad, therefore, to receive instructions as soon as possible as cold weather will soon be setting in.

Reference my letter of the 18th., which was held back until today, awaiting estimate from Kelly and Kimberly.

This firm now write me it would cost \$249.00 to erect a pump house, and \$650.00 to extend present crib over pipe line twenty five feet, filling same and existing sixty feet of old crib to depth of six feet over pipe line.

This is a large expenditure, but I think it should be done if possible, as I am afraid of everything freezing up this winter, owing to the excessively low level of the lake.

Kind Sir:-

May I inform the Department that our heating system is far from giving satisfaction; some parts of the school are overheated, while in others the radiators give no heat whatever; in fact, although a sufficient fire is made for the season of the year we are suffering from the cold.

Would be very thankful if you would please have this affair looked after before the cold weather sets in for good.

Until this is done I respectfully ask that seven Electric Heaters be granted us for our private rooms; they are really needed, and will likely be every winter, spring and autumn. The cost of each radiator would be approximately \$14.00

May I note that one room has not even one radiator; the Sister who lived in it last winter had no heat at all. There is surely no other school where such a thing can be found.
