





Your Agency here called for tenders for certain supplies of rugs, linoleums, window shades, curtains & etc., on July 17th with certain numbers following the items. It states "descriptive or reference numbers given are taken from T. Eaton Co's Catalogue, Fall 1924 & Winter 1925. I have a copy in my office for reference." Perusal of such Catalogue, of course, gives no idea of the quality or design of the goods called for. We certainly would not buy from the T. Eaton Co., one of each of the articles in order to submit quotations. We doubt whether the Eaton Co., could furnish us with all the articles, for the Catalogue is now a year old. We issue a catalogue ourselves and supply more goods to Western Trade than any two Wholesale Houses in Canada put together. Why not quote our Catalogue?

We think you will agree that no Catalogue should be quoted and that if you buy by sample these should be in your hands for inspection by prospective tenderers. That is the only way in which fair competition can be had. And an expert is necessary to see that the article supplied is up to the quality specified.

You will understand that we feel most strongly upon the impropriety of the course followed in the above instance.

Cheap tapestry rugs were called for. These we do not carry. They are not worth the price. Axminster rugs cost little more and wear four times as long.







MACHINERY

The end frames are solid iron castings bolted together carrying the whole load of the tumbler. The main bearings, which are Beaver Roller type, are supported on these frames but separated from the heat of the machine by an air space and a stuffing box.

The shell is of galvanized steel plates with lift-up door. The cylinder is of galvanized wire mesh. The cylinder heads are strongly bolted to steel T beams, making an exceptionally rigid wheel.

The reversing header is our Beaver ball bearing reverse movement, firmly bolted to the end frame. All gears are machine cut from solid blanks and are properly guarded. A simple and efficient hand turning device and gear lock is provided.

The fan is of the multi-blade type, has extra long ring-oiling bearings with oil reservoirs. While a speed of 1000 to 1100 R.P.M. will in most cases provide sufficient air, the fan is designed so that it can be operated at high speeds if desired.

Convenient clean-out doors are provided for removing the lint from the screens and the exhaust is so arranged that it can be either piped to the outside or a canvas bag can be placed over it, which makes a simple and convenient method of taking care of the lint.

The coils, of ample capacity, are housed at the rear of the machine, and the back of the housing is readily removable for inspection or cleaning if necessary.

Replying to your kind enquiry of the 14th instant, we have pleasure in quoting you on one Beaver Junior Drying Tumbler, size 30 x 42, as illustrated and described on the enclosed sheet except that in place of the multiblade fan specified there we are now using the Vorclone fan, which is very efficient. 

The Canadian Junior Drying Tumbler

BELT DRIVE

Size and Style

The inside cylinder shall measure 30 inches in diameter by 42 inches in length, constructed of galvanized woven wire, and shall be of type.
(Reversing or Non-Reversing)

Frames

Shall be of heavy cast iron, bolted together and connected by heavy stiffening angles, and shall support housing cylinder, fans, coils and driving mechanism.

Housing

Shall be of No. 16-gauge galvanized sheet iron. Shall be riveted to iron frames and made tight to prevent the escape of heat and air. The door shall be constructed of No. 16 galvanized sheet iron, hung on heavy wrought-iron strap hinges and securely latched by malleable-iron clamps, making it close fitting and preventing the leakage of air and heat.

Shall be equipped with clean-out door at bottom between fans.

Two upright castings shall be bolted to top of frames for tub door to rest against when open.

Cylinder

Shall be constructed of No. 2½-mesh, .110-inch diameter, galvanized woven wire, rolled after being woven, so that the intersections shall be interlocked. Shall be riveted to inwardly projecting cast-iron trunnions and re-enforced by wide hoops. Shall be further strengthened by four channels, riveted to trunnions. Shall be constructed with 3 galvanized cast-iron ribs projecting 4 inches into cylinder, securely riveted to the woven wire and bolted to the trunnions. Door shall be of No. 16 galvanized sheet iron, perforated, hung on heavy hinges, and fitted with heavy door latches.

Coils

Shall be located within the housing at rear and consists of 202 lineal feet of one-inch iron pipe connected at each end with right and left return bends.

Fans

Shall be equipped with 2 single fans of the multi-blade type 7½ inches in diameter, mounted on fan shaft beneath cylinder, for circulating air through the coils, and thence through the cylinder and out through an 8-inch duct leading to rear of machine. Shall be fitted with screened air intake. Fan shaft shall be equipped with renewable bearings.

BELT DRIVE

Gearing

Gears shall be machine cut from solid blanks of sufficient width and diameter, and provided with suitable cast-iron gear guards. Shall be equipped with hand-worm gear lock for bringing cylinder door into position and locking same.

Driving Mechanism

Reversing type shall consist of one tight and two loose pulleys, each 10 inches in diameter, requiring 1-inch and 1½-inch belts, operating in connection with a worm and cam movement, producing a fixed number of reverse revolutions of the cylinder.

Non-reversing type shall consist of one tight and one loose pulley, each 10 inches in diameter, taking a 1-inch belt to operate cylinder. Cylinder shall revolve in one direction only.

Driving mechanism shall be mounted on cast-iron adjustable swivelling arm, bolted to machine, and embody strength, simplicity and reliability. Shall be 3-inch diameter tight and loose pulleys on fan shaft, taking 2-inch belt to operate fans. Fan belt shall be equipped with foot treadle shifter.



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


