Dear Clarence:

I called over to the Indian School yesterday to see Mr. Chapin, whom I had met for only a minute a year ago. He seems most anxious to give good service along all lines.

I was glad to find that the added water supply is fairly satisfactory. Without that, they could not have carried on.

Discussing the property, there are of course several major improvements necessary, those to the residence, or a new residence, being just about imperative. Mr. Chapin realizes the present war difficulties, and no one could be more willing to co-operate than he. There are, however, some minor repairs which should be made without any delay so as to avoid further depreciation. No doubt the department has a list of those on file. The roof of the school, for instance, can be repaired now for a much smaller outlay than would soon be necessary. It is steadily deteriorating. There are several other minor matters which a capable man should be able to correct within a reasonable time, and undoubtedly the residence calls for attention before winter sets in.

Capable men are difficult to secure here, at present, but I imagine if you were to take the matter up with Ed. Fulcher, 403-22nd Street, he could locate a suitable man.



Mr. J.E. Matthews, M.P., recently visited the Brandon Residential School and, in a letter to the Department, states that the roof of the school requires repairs, also that there are other minor repairs required. It would, therefore, be appreciated if you would visit the school at an early date and let me know exactly what is needed. We have already expended approximately \$600.00 for repairs and new equipment at this school this year. We do not appear to have any correspondence on file regarding the roof. It might be advisable, when you are visiting the school, to suggest to the Principal that such matters should be brought to your attention.

In his letter Mr. Matthews also refers to the Principal's residence. I am aware that this is in bad condition but unfortunately no heavy expenditure can be made at the present time. However, if there are minor repairs that would improve this building, the Department is prepared to consider them. I should appreciate hearing from you as soon as you have an opportunity of visiting the school.

Dear Sir,-

As requested in your letter 133-0-5, dated October 27th, I investigated into the repairs required at the Brandon Indian School and would report as follows.

The roof does not leak at present and the repair work required should be left until the coming spring. Mr. Chapin submitted a request for this work in August 23, 1941, a copy of which was forwarded to Ottawa under cover of my letter of August 26th. Mr. Chapin gave a quotation on the work as submitted by McDowall and Duke, for the amount of \$400.00. This figure covered certain repair work to the roofing, re-tarring and re-gravelling. This work as stated above should be done in the spring, otherwise if left, it may be necessary to renew the roofing and this would entail heavy expense.

The barn needs reshingling on the south side. It will require approximately forty thousand shingles. It is too late to do this work; but Mr. Chapin stated he would arrange to have the shingles put on early in the spring if the shingles and nails were supplied. He suggested the purchase be made at once, otherwise the material might not be available in the early spring. I would recommend the purchase of the shingles and nails on the distinct understanding that the labour required be provided by the Principal.

The Principal's residence is in poor condition; but the building does not justify the outlay of heavy expense. Mr. Chapin felt he could carry on for the present but pointed out that next spring new screens would be urgently needed. The old screen frames are so badly rotted they are past repairing.

I would recommend that a plumber be sent to the school to do the necessary repairs to the flush tanks - the working parts in connection with the floats are badly worn and in many cases new parts are needed. At the same time he should check all water taps and those past repairing should be replaced with spring taps, if they can be obtained. I make this recommendation because the water supply is limited and the spring taps would always be closed when not in use.

Steam radiator valves are needed on some of the radiators and this could also receive attention by the plumber and steamfitter.

The seat covers were all missing on the boys' toilets. I would recommend six new lids be provided and that these be made secure with bolts.

A number of beds are broken and past repairing. Ten new beds should be provided. The standard institutional bed in white is desired. I would also recommend that Mr. Chapin be instructed to send to Winnipeg for repair twenty bed springs. These springs belong to the children's beds and are so badly stretched that they form a hammock. No doubt Parkhills or some other bedding company could re-stretch the cables.

One other matter should receive attention and Mr. Chapin again offered to do the work if the required material was provided. Neither the boys or girls have any suitable place to hang their winter coats and garments. A proper place could be fixed in the basement if the following materials were provided:-

- 10 pieces 2 x 4 - 12 ft. long.
- 12 doz. heavy metal hooks

(with the required screws)

I hope funds can be made available to carry out the repairs suggested, all of which are much needed.

Dear Sir:

I am in receipt of your letter of the 9th instant, with reference to your recent inspection of the Brandon Residential School.

The following expenditures are approved:

1. Plumber to repair the tanks, check water taps and replace taps that cannot be repaired, also supply steam radiator valves. It is understood that only the necessary work will be done and the cost kept as low as possible.
2. Purchase 6 new seat covers for boys' toilets.
3. You may arrange for having the bed springs repaired.
4. You may purchase the following material:
  - 10 pieces 2 x 4 - 12 ft. long
  - 12 Doz. heavy metal hooks with screws

I have noted your recommendation that the roof of the building and the south side of the barn should be reshingled next year. I am including the amount that will be required in the appropriation for the fiscal year 1943-44. We have recently been advised that it is impossible to secure shingles at the present time in the vicinity of Winnipeg. You should write to me again in connection with the shingling about April 1 at which time I will know if the amount requested in the estimates has been allowed. At that time you should give me an estimate of the cost of the new screens for the Principal's residence.
