

Sir:

I wish to acknowledge your 1-3-4 of recent date, concerning leasing the property of Chief Eli Larue. Before the former lease on this parcel is cancelled, the Department believes that the circumstances concerning it should be placed before you and the Rev. Principal of the Kamloops Indian Residential School for consideration.

In 1925, it was believed that the school - 250 persons and considerable live stock - should have more land under cultivation. Several schemes were considered and the leasing of Chief Eli Larue's property was decided upon. At the time it was recommended that the permanent acquisition of this parcel for school purposes be considered in 1935, when the lease expired. In 1926, approximately \$4,000 was expended increasing the capacity and efficiency of the irrigation system. I understand that there is in the vicinity of the school little arable land that can be irrigated, and very careful consideration should be given before this parcel is lost to the school for even a period of five years. Please discuss this carefully with Rev. Father Duplanil and let me have a further recommendation.

Sir:

I have the honour to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 14th instant in reference to the leasing of the portion of land of Chief Eli Larue formerly leased by the Kamloopd Industrial School.

I have carefully noted your remarks, also discussed the matter over again with the Rev. Principal of the School. He is of the same opinion as he was before that he does not need this land for the school at any rate for some years to come as the school has more land of their own than they are now using, he further claims that he has lost money on the Chief's leased land the last two years and from the appearance of the crops, I noticed on the place I fully agree with the Rev. Principal that he must have lost money on the land. I carefully looked into the whole affair before I recommended to the Department that the lease should be abandoned by the school and granted to Ah King.

There are several reasons for this I know that the former principal's idea was to keep a lot of range cattle and get hay where ever he could, he, on many occasions, I am informed, used the boys, pupils of the school, at various distances away from the school to put up the hay. The Indian parents strongly objected to this and it is possible that if the practice had been continued to this date that we would have most of our school buildings empty. The present Principal's idea is to run a good school where the pupils are getting as much education as possible under the circumstances and have the pupils in the class rooms as much as possible instead of running about the country chasing cattle and putting up hay. Then again the present principal informs me that he has more land now belonging to the school than he has under cultivation he has no range for cattle and he feels that if and as long as he has land enough to raise hay enough for his milking cows and to grow enough vegetables that he has enough, both the principal and myself ~~are~~ also agreed that Chief Eli Larue is much better off getting the present offered rental than the \$240.00 per annum which he was getting from the school.

I think that covers the situation fully at this time, if it is ~~favored~~ after five years that the lease should not be renewed the matter could then be dealt with.

THE PARTY OF THE FIRST PART:

AND:

REVEREND JAMES MCGUIRE, O.M.I., of  
the City of Kamloops, County of Yale,  
Province of British Columbia,  
Principal of the Kamloops Residential  
School, hereinafter called

THE PARTY OF THE SECOND PART:

WITNESSETH: that the Party of the First Part, in consideration of the rents, covenants and agreements hereinafter reserved and contained, on the part of the Party of the Second Part, his heirs, executors, administrators and assigns, to be paid, done and performed, hath demised and leased and by these presents doth demise and lease unto the said Party of the Second Part, his heirs, executors, administrators and assigns, the surface rights on all that parcel of land generally known as Chief Elie Larue's place, situated on the Kamloops Indian Reserve No. 1, and lying west of Anthony Larue's place, the northern boundary being along the main road to Chase, westerly from a point marked "A", twenty-six (26) chains, until it reaches a point marked "B" on the rail fence dividing the property from the land of Loo Leonard, thence southwesterly twelve (12) chains, along the line fence to a point marked "C", thence southeasterly eleven (11) chains to a point marked "D", thence easterly nineteen (19) chains to a point marked "E", thence northerly sixteen (16) chains to the point of commencement, containing Seventy (70) acres, more or less, as shown on the

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attached plan.

TO HAVE AND TO HOLD the said premises unto the said Party of the Second Part, his heirs, executors, administrators and assigns, for and during the full end and term of ten years and three months, to be computed from the First day of August, A.D. 1925, and renewable for a further period of ten years, upon such terms and conditions as may be agreed upon. The date of the expiration of this lease to be the First day of November, A.D. 1935.

SUBJECT NEVERTHELESS to a determination or cession of the said term before the expiration thereof, under the provisions and conditions herein mentioned.

YIELDING AND PAYING yearly during the said term, unto the Party of the First part, a rental of Two Hundred and Forty dollars, payable monthly in advance, at the rate of Twenty Dollars. The receipt of the first payment of Twenty dollars is hereby acknowledged.

The said Party of the Second Part, his heirs, executors, administrators and assigns agree to fence the said plot of land, containing seventy- (70) acres, more or less, and shall provide irrigation for the same.

The said Party of the Second Part, his heirs, executors, administrators and assigns shall have the right to use the land hereby leased for all and any purposes necessary to the carrying out of agricultural operations. And doth covenant with the said Party of the First Part that he will well and truly pay the said monthly rent on the days and times the same shall respectively become due as aforesaid, and shall well and truly pay all taxes and charges, dues and duties whatsoever which now are or hereafter shall become payable in respect of the said premises.

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And also that the said Party of the Second Part shall not at any time during the said term grant, assign or set over the said lands hereby demised or any part thereof, or any estate or interest therein to any person or persons whomsoever, without the consent in writing of the said Party of the First Part first had and obtained.

And also that the said Party of the Second Part shall not at any time during the said term, lop, top, cut down, or destroy any timber or trees growing on the said land further than may be necessary in connection with the use of the surface rights hereby granted, and shall not nor will sell, or permit or suffer to be sold or used on the said premises any spirituous liquors, ale, beer, or any intoxicating beverage whatever.

PROVIDED that if the rent or any part thereof, shall be unpaid for thirty days after becoming payable, whether formally demanded or not, or if any covenant or condition herein contained shall not be performed or observed, it shall be lawful for the Superintendent General, by notice in writing to cancel these presents and terminate the estate or term hereby demised, and thereupon these presents and everything therein contained shall from the time of giving such notice, absolutely cease and be null and void,

PROVIDED FURTHER that His Majesty shall nevertheless be entitled to recover from the lessee the rent or royalty then accrued or accruing, and provided further that any right of action of His Majesty against the lessee, in respect of any antecedent breach of any of the said covenants, provisoes, stipulations or conditions shall not thereby be prejudiced.

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IT IS FURTHER AGREED by the Party of the Second Part, his heirs, executors, administrators and assigns, that active agricultural operations shall be started within a period of One month from the date of the issuance of this lease.

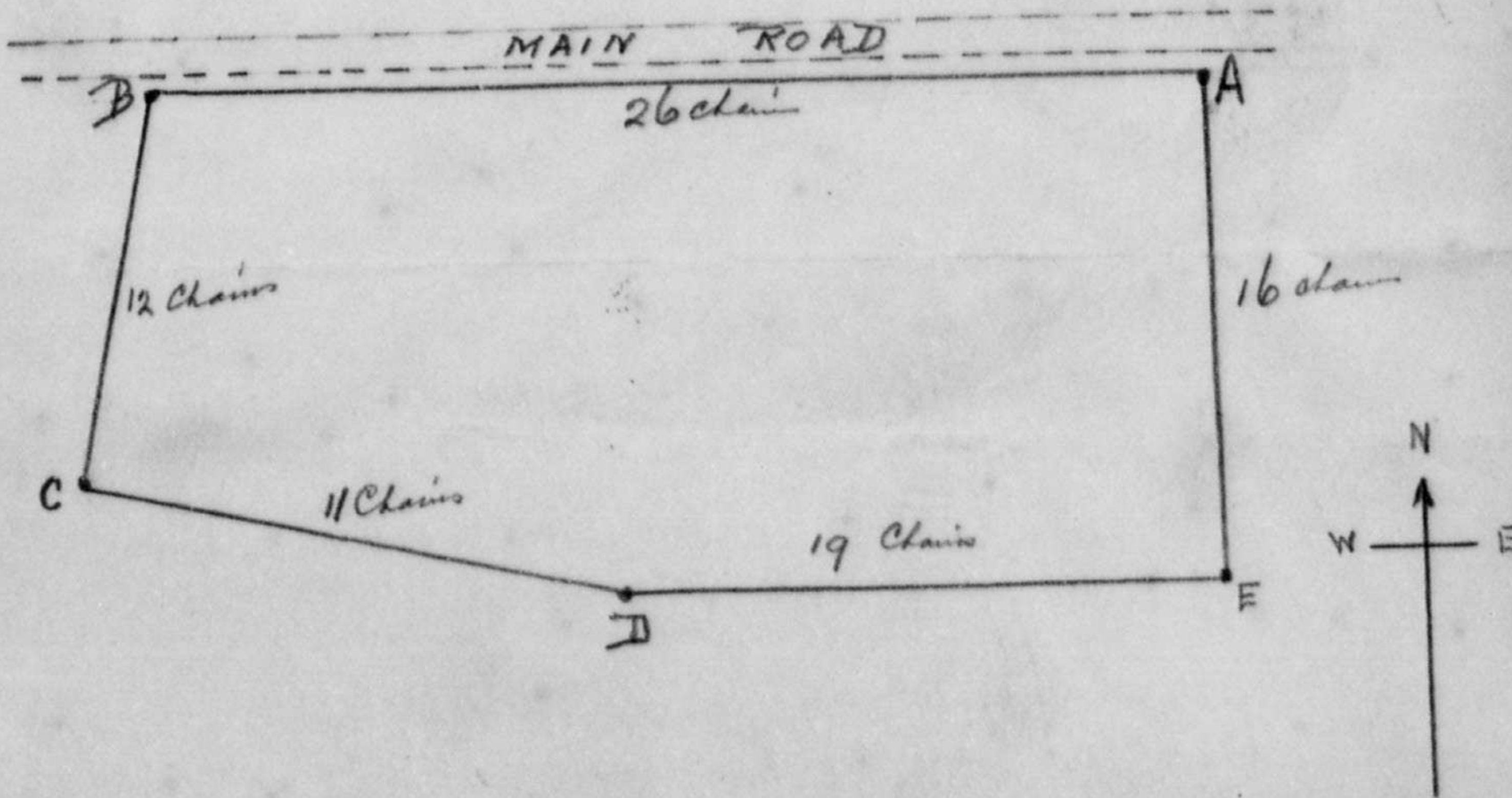

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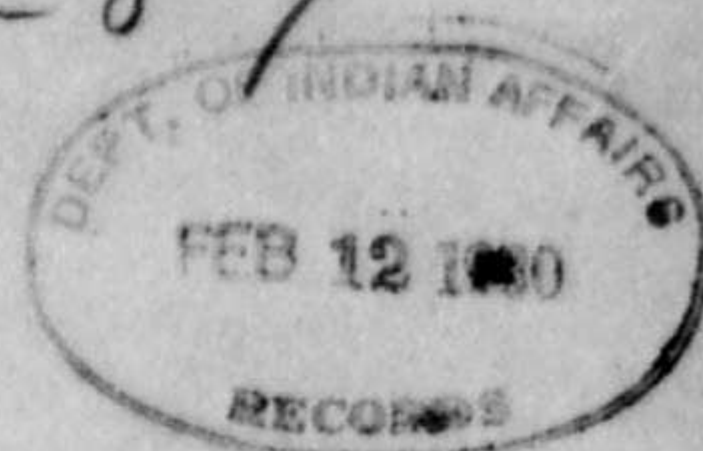

Dear Mr. MacLeod,

Will you be kind enough to bring to the attention of the Dept. the work which has been done here at the Kamloops Indian Residential School to improve and beautify the grounds. I do not speak of the grading. It did cost me a great deal more than I expected. It's my own mistake, it is my own loss. I am speaking of other improvements, viz. the tearing down of old buildings, the levelling of a hill back of the school for play ground, the building of an implement shed and of a garage, the building of storage room for storm windows, etc. You remember the old approach to the school buildings. Most unsightly. Compare with the present appearance. The City of Kamloops and the Provincial Govt. were kind enough to help us and to lend us wheel scrapers and other tools. To finish to work properly I needed a grader which I bought at a cost of \$175.00. In buying this grader, I had in mind not only the ground but the children. We must keep the road between Kamloops and the School open Winter and Summer. We never know when the Doctor will be needed, we never know when a child will need the Doctor, the Clinic and the Hospital. The grader will help us in keeping the road clear no matter how much wind comes. The grader will also help us to put under proper cultivation some ten or twelve acres of land. At present we cannot irrigate some portion of the school property. By grading the land it will be easily irrigated and therefore properly cultivated.

Will you be kind enough to recommend to the Dept. that the purchase of the grader be approved and that compensation be given me. A new grader costs \$300.00 plus freight. I paid \$175.00

Dear Sir:-

I have the honour to enclose herewith original letter received from Rev. John Duplanil, O.M.I., Principal of Kamloops Indian Residential School, with reference to certain work being carried out at that Institution.

As you are aware, some time ago the Department had an estimate of the cost of levelling and filling in the grounds at the School, and the Reverend Principal agreed that upon receipt of a truck and scraper and a few other articles, that he would endeavour to do the work. His estimate for the same was less by \$1000.00 than the other estimates submitted.

He has found out since that the work entailed a great deal more expense than he had anticipated, and the tearing down of the old school buildings, levelling a hill back of the school for a playground, the building of a large implement shed and a garage.

As you will note in perusing his letter, it has meant a great deal of work, and it is not completed yet. He had to purchase a grader in order to assist the work, as stated in his letter. I have examined this grader personally and have seen it at work. He is doing splendid work with it, and it is very reasonable at \$175.00, and I can conscientiously recommend that the Department consider payment of same.

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


Dear Sir:-

I have the honour to acknowledge receipt of your 154-0-9 of the 8th April, with reference to the pipes which are needed for beautifying the grounds at Kamloops Indian Residential School, and would like to say that upon request, Rev. Father Duplanil has stated that 1500 feet of  $\frac{1}{2}$ " pipe and 100 feet of hose pipe will be needed. He states that he thinks that this can be bought at a cost of \$105.00, and is anxious to know how much the Department is willing to give him to assist in the purchase of this pipe and hose.

In this connection, I might state that it is certainly necessary that something be done regarding the school grounds, as when the winds blow, as they do in and around Kamloops, the sand in front of the building is very frequently raised, and a great deal of the said sand goes into the building and it is impossible to keep it out under present conditions. If grass can be made to grow, which it can be with the use of a great deal of water, this nuisance will be obviated.




I have your letter of the 28th ultimo, relative to the piping, etc., required for the watering of the grounds around the Kamloops Indian Residential School.

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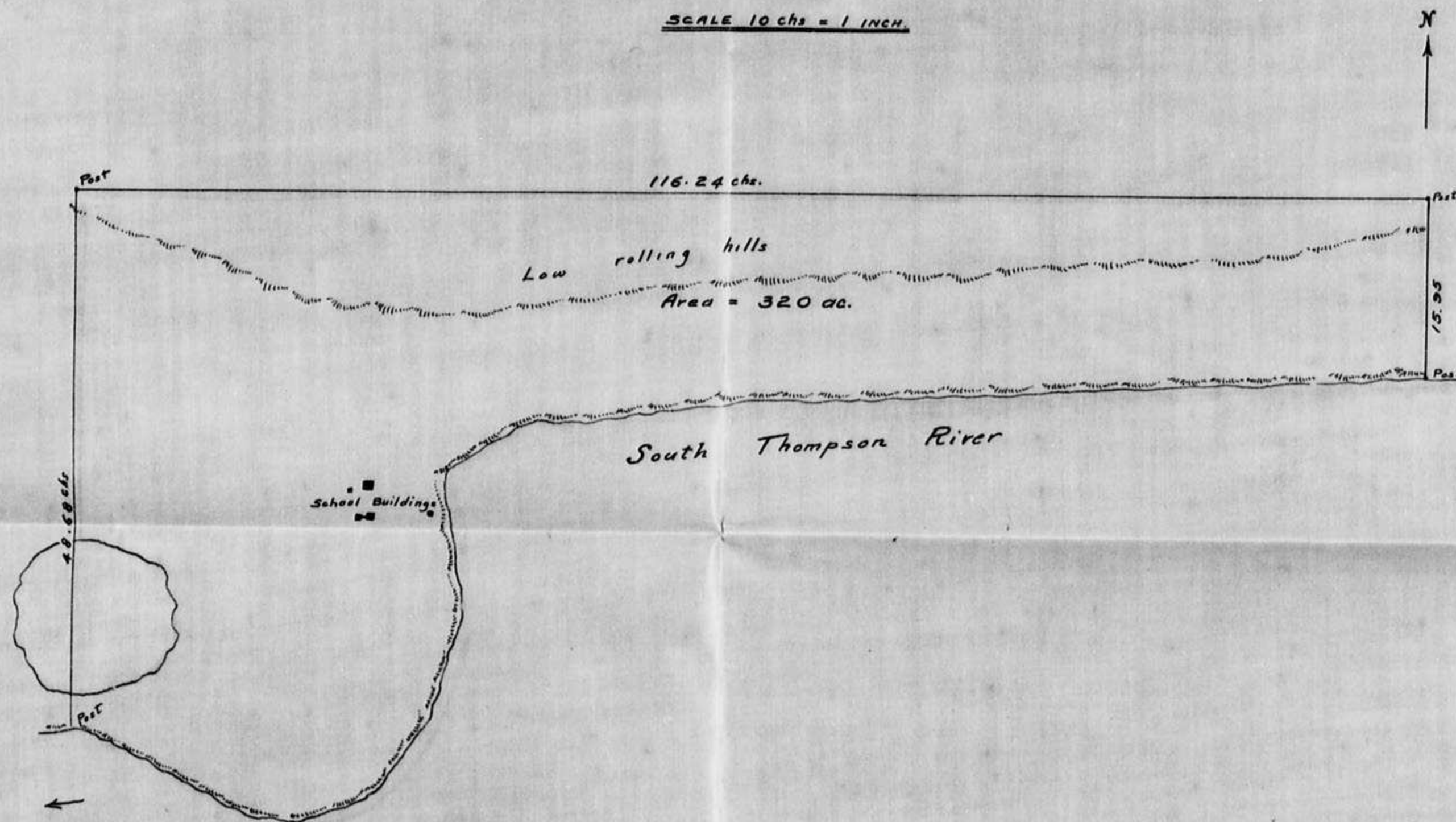


# PLAN

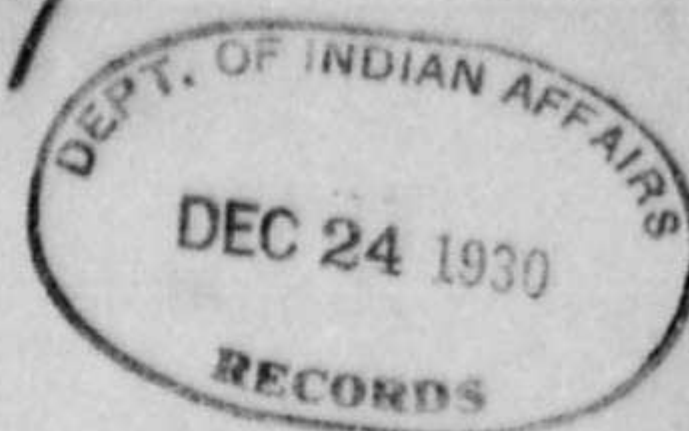

Finally the school acreage should be surveyed and fenced. Apparently, whilst old plans show the school as having an acreage of 320 acres, there are no corner posts to be found showing any previous survey. With the leasing of land around the school, and the claims of various Indians, the exact bearings of the land should be established to prevent dispute. The Reverend Principal has offered to erect the boundary fence with boy labour, as instructional work, provided the necessary wire and posts are supplied by the Department. This offer would save considerable expenditure to the Department.

I have the honor herewith to transmit the report of G. S. Pragnell, Inspector of Indian Agencies for British Columbia, dated December 30th last with respect to his inspection of the Kamloops Agency.

In regard to the survey of the school grounds as referred to, I beg to say that a report dated February 22, 1926, prepared by Mr. Engineer Tredcroft of the Dominion Water Power and Hydrometric Bureau, at Kamloops, in connection with the lands of the Kamloops Industrial School, the area is given by him of 283 acres; while a letter on file received a few years ago from a former Principal of the school, Rev. James McGuire, the area is given as 320 acres, the latter also being furnished by ex-Agent Smith in his sworn evidence before the Royal Commission in 1913. It is noted the Inspector refers to old plans which show 320 acres, but a recent letter from the Indian Agent indicated that there is no information in his office regarding the area about which he wrote the Department and this office for information. I have recently written to the Indian Agent asking him to consult with Mr. Engineer Tredcroft with a view to ascertaining the source of his information as to the area being 283 acres. It is thought that this may be the result of his survey of an area previously believed to stand at the larger figure. The Inspector will be asked further regarding the old plans to which he refers as it is thought that such information should be known to the Agent as well as to himself if their offices are working in harmony in these matters.
