Sir: I beg to enclose herewith six requisitions for material and labour for the Morley Indian Residential School, prepared by Rev. E.J. Staley, the Principal, and forwarded here by Mr. J.N.R. Iredale, the Acting Indian Agent. I am changing the order of preference as follows:

Requisition No. 4 is for a shed to be built on what is referred to as the Orphanage Ranch; Viz., lands taken over by the School (Church) for stock grazing purposes. (See Dept. No. 119-1-9 dated Dec. 17th, 1936; also No. 119-1-14 dated May 14th, 1937, and Jan. 29th, 1938). The School grow a few acres of green feed and keep their main herd of cattle on this place, both in Summer and Winter. Owing to War conditions, I am not prepared to recommend this, and I am wondering whether the Department should be asked to pay for improvements on this farm.


You will recall that in the estimates for this year provision was made for the purchase of a binder if the quality of our crop made it advisable.

A more or less permanent arrangement of this kind might be necessary in some cases. The Department is prepared to pay a reasonable fee for this duty, on the Agent's recommendation. - Did they follow out your professional instructions? Yes
- If in either respect, you consider them to have been at fault, it is required that you express your carefully considered views as follows: Not at fault. Patient was removed from hospital against my advice on Jan. 26, 1938 taken home and given Indian medicine. Died Feb. 13, 1938. Her condition was hopeless when she left hospital.
