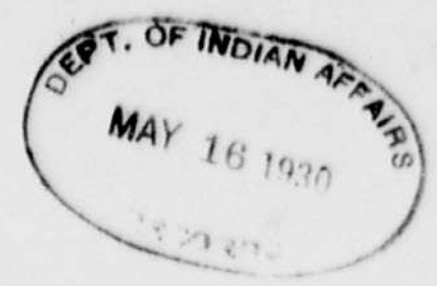

Beg to let you know that we had a bad accident in the school yesterday afternoon. About three in the afternoon Briget Moloney was cleaning the Dough mixer and Annie Pennall was working in the kitchen, In some ,at the present time unexplainable way, the two of them were caught in the dough mixer. The power switch was turned off one of them must have set the machine going, how it stopped I don't know. When I got there certainly the power was not on. After things cool down we might be able to get the true explanation. Each girl will probably loose two fingers of the right hand. Needless to say these girls are not youngsters, and they have been warned many times about tinkering with the machines. Today we will put padlocks on every hand-switch in the School.

Of course we took them to the Victoria General Hospital as soon as we could, and they were attended to immediately.

With regard to Ellen Bernard, brought here with four others of the family, by Rev. D.J. Rankin, agent for Victoria County. We find that this child is subject to fits. A series of four fits between 3 p.m. and 9 p.m. on Saturday May 17th. inst. three more early Sunday morning. Had the Doctor over on Saturday night and it is his opinion that nothing really effective can be done.

From what I can learn from other members of the family the Doctor who examined these children was told about this matter, and yet he passed her along. I don't think that it is your intention to have children so afflicted in this school. When these fits take place in the dormitory there is no need of telling you the effect on the other children.

The whole family are by far the worst we have in the school.

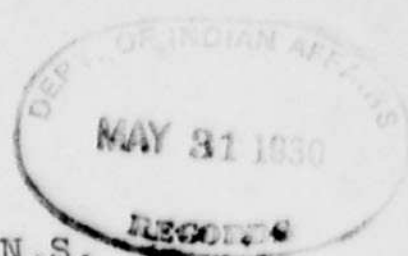

If so it would mean that we could have the tonsils, teeth, and the two hernia, which were included in Dr. Campbell's report, attended to during the summer months, and at the same time save making a break in the school term. I feel certain that we will have at least a few cases of tonsils and from general observation the teeth will require considerable attention.

We have ninety-five in the school now and when we reach the century mark I think it would be advisable to have Dr. Campbell spend another day here.

All Sanatoriums seem to be filled to capacity, but we are hoping to find a place for the five soon.


Sir,-

If you find any pupils requiring operations, you should report their names and the operation necessary for the Department's authority for proceeding further.


As you were informed in the letter mentioned above, a special fee of \$50.00 will be allowed for this examination of the pupils in the Shubenacadie School.

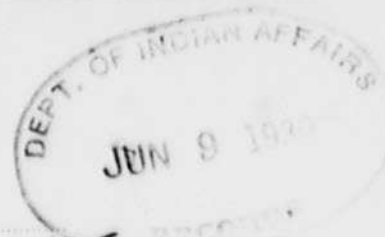



Reverend Sir:

I wish to refer to dental work that may be necessary for pupils at the Shubenacadie Indian Residential School. At a later date, I will write to you, authorizing the engagement of a dentist who will examine all pupils, with a view to taking the remedial measures that are really necessary. At the present time, however, the Department does not wish to have all children examined. Those pupils who are suffering because of the condition of their teeth may be taken to Dr. G. M. Stultz who, I understand, is a Halifax dentist who visits Shubenacadie every Friday. You may arrange with Dr. Stultz to either do the work in the school or he may take the children to his temporary office in Shubenacadie, whichever is the more convenient. Please explain to him that the Department does not pay the usual office fees in the case of pupils at Indian residential schools. It is expected that very reasonable charges will be secured, as there will no doubt be considerable work necessary from time to time. The Department suggests that only extractions and amalgam fillings be done by Dr. Stultz. Other treatment cannot be authorized. In the case of temporary teeth, extractions only are allowed. The fees suggested for Dr. Stultz' consideration are \$1 for amalgam fillings and 50¢ for extractions.
