The last report from Mr. McKenna, Inspector of Roman Catholic Indian Schools, on the Qu'Appelle Industrial School shows that there were 75 pupils in attendance in the Junior Girls' Class-room under the charge of Sister McGurk.

Mr. McKenna states that it is almost impossible for a teacher to do justice to such a large class and the Department quite agrees with him. I would ask you, therefore, to take the necessary steps to have a second teacher

appointed to take charge of a portion of this class. *In selecting a teacher for this position kindly be careful to obtain one who speaks with a good English accent and who will be able to teach the scholars to converse in that language.*

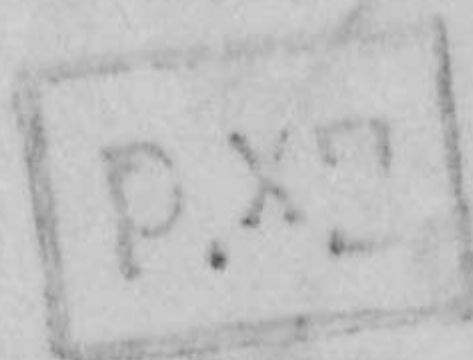

ing of certain half breed farm
hands who used liquor and

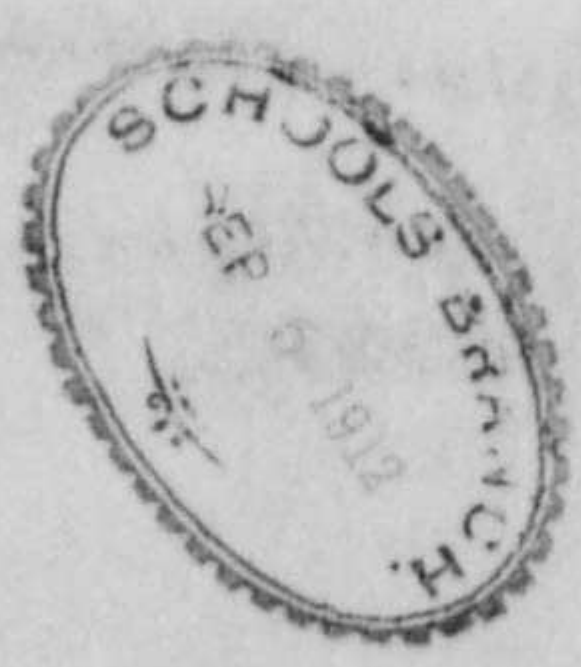

Sir;-

I beg to inform you of the result of a trip I have made in order to recruit Indian children to replace half-breed children as per your instructions.

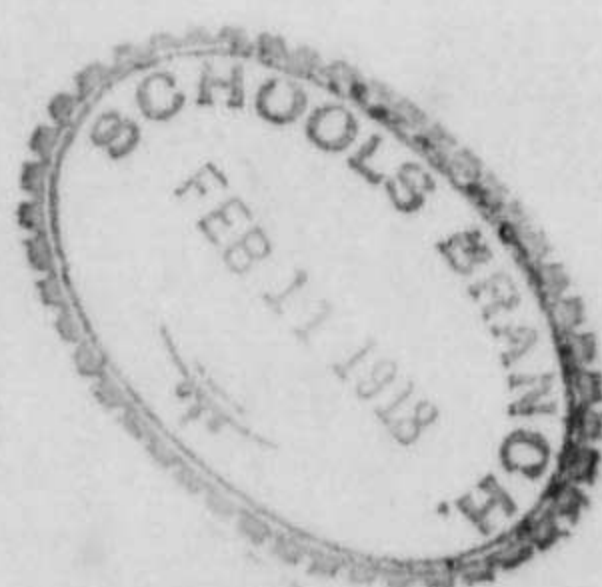
I visited the neighboring reserves also the Assiniboine, Moose Mountain and the Sioux reserves at Pipestone and Oak Lake and have been able to replace only six half-breed pupils by Indian ones.

Having noticed the condition of the reserves for our ex-pupils I have considered it my duty to inform the Agent of the Qu, Appelle Agency the condition of affairs as regards dancing giving him information I easily obtained owing to my knowledge of the Indian language, and I herewith inclose a copy of my letter.

We have had two cases of Scarlet Fever which have been isolated outside of the Institution. The quarantine has been raised on the 15th inst.

The management of the school is as usual.

Dear Mr Campbell.

I am directed to call your attention to a state of affairs which existed at Lebret, under the auspices of the Indian Industrial School last year, and which we look to you and the Dept to put a stop to, and give some others a chance. The people of Lebret aided and backed by those in authority of the Industrial ^{school} went out of there way to cater for picnics from Regina and Melville, and got them. They were entertained in the school grounds, had in fact the full use of them, were fed in the School itself, at whose expense, or who got the money for the meals we are not in a position to say, but what we are in a position to say is, that we do not think it is right, that Government Institutions should be allowed to run counter to towns which have no Government Institutions. Now take for example Fort Qu'Appelle. We purchased 30 acres of land last year for a public park. This cost us \$2500 for the land alone and we are spending another \$1000 or \$1500 fixing the grounds up this spring. Now seeing we pay taxes for the upkeep of the country we do not think it is quite the thing to see places like Lebret who do not pay a cent for their grounds, butting in and taking legitimate trade away from us. We bought those grounds for the express purpose of getting the Regina and Melville people, and we cannot stand idly aside and let the Indian Industrial School get business which by rights belongs to us. I trust you will look into this state of affairs, and put a stop to it so that we can have a fair show.

Sir:-

Your Letter No 116575/1 of the 18th inst received. In reply I would say that the Secretary's version of the matter in question is not correct. Picnics from Regina and Melville were not catered for and secured to the disadvantage of the Board of Trade of Fort Qu, Appelle.

The facts are these;- Deputations from Sunday Schools and other Societies came here and asked if they might be allowed to use the School grounds for their sports and, as was customary, permission was granted.

The Qu, Appelle Industrial School has always been an attraction for visitors and last year a greater number came on account of the favorable railway facilities.

Owing to the scanty accomodation for the feeding of visitors, the School served a number of meals at the urgent request of those who were unable to get food otherwise.

It was explained that any meales served here was a special privilege and only because few meals could be obtained at other places that any were served at all.

The School cannot be blamed for the Regina and Melville people choosing Lebret as a picnic point. If the Board of Trade of Fort Qu, Appelle wish to come here and cater to the crowds that intend coming this summer, the school has not the slightest objection and in fact would be glad if they undertook this, but it is certain that the School cannot compel the G.T.P. Railway from advertising excursions to this point.

Lebret being the most picturesque spot on the Qu, Appelle

Lakes, it is quite natural that the general public would select it for a days sport or rest as the case may be.

Lebret is distant some miles from Fort Qu, Appelle and it is beyond us to understand how the School can interfere with the Public Park there.

It is not our intention to serve meals this year as there is better accommodation now but far from sufficient and therefore we are urging some society to take this matter in hand.

We understand that the G.T.P. has already booked seven excursions to Lebret and we feel certain that the Department would not ask us to exclude visitors from the School, either the grounds or the buildings.

We emphatically state that we have not taken any legitimate trade from the Board of Trade of Fort Qu, Appelle nor is it our intention to do so at any future time. It would be more reasonable that objections would come from our local people and as none have been made it would seem that the School acted wisely considering circumstances.

In conclusion we would ask the Department to allow us to feed the hungry if circumstances calls for it.

Dear Sir

I called at Interior Dept. today and paid my respects to the Minister. My mission is in connection with the Lebrat (L. Appelle) Industrial School. As you are the acting and real head of the Indian Dept. it is only proper I should come to you. and I know the Minister would not do anything without consulting you. I was told you were out of town so leave you a few lines.

According to Instructions the Halfbreed children on the List of L. Appelle Ind. School should have been removed at the end of June Quarter. The Principal, J. Hugonard undertook a recruiting campaign last winter but was obliged to interrupt on account of illness and has been disabled ever since. The result is that the Admissions during the last 12 months were only 37 (Treaty child). and about 20 Treaty children were discharged during same period (deaths, marriages & other causes).

The net result is that there are still 51 non-treaty children on a list of 225 - In the interest of the school I feel obliged to plead the case of those

51 Children - and submit the following:

- 1 Because of illness of Principal recruiting could not be attended to effectively
- 2 with the no. of Discharges yearly it is almost too much to expect to eliminate 50 Children and make up for ordinary discharges besides.
- 3 It seems a very drastic measure to turn away children when their course of training is already begun but only half completed.
- 4 The school cannot afford such a loss of revenue when expenditure will practically continue the same. It is well to bear in mind that cost of living has greatly increased during last years.
- 5 The Halfbreed problem is at present under consideration by the Ind. Dept. and intimation has already been made that it was not the intention of the Dept. to apply cash-ion rules to the halfbreed children - (whatever the ultimate rulings may be).

My suggestion in regard to the problem facing us at Qu Appelle School - would be simply to admit those already on the list (halfbreeds) - there have been no new admissions in the last two years - Or if there is no formal admission to allow those names to remain on the list until elimination takes place by ordinary discharges.

This course will permit the School to go ahead and keep up its attendance although no other half-breeds should be accepted in future. In the mean time a different ^{policy} ruling may prevail in regard to Halfbreed children in their relation to Ind. Schools. I think the above remarks will appeal to you as carrying some weight. Knowing your interest in our Indian work and your familiarity with its problems I confidently trust that a solution will be found to bridge us over the present difficulty at the Du. Appelle Indust. School. I am leaving the City today but will be back about Tuesday or latest Wedn. of next week.

Sir;-

I wish to inform the Department that a Hotel has been erected in the village of Lebret within a few hundred yards from the Indian School.

Last Spring I was successful in preventing a License being granted but there is a strong feeling now in favor of a license on the ground that a hotel cannot be operated successfully without one.

A licensed hotel is not a good thing to have so close to the Indian School on account of so many Indians and halfbreeds coming here to see their children.

I could successfully oppose the granting of a license only with the assistance of the Department and would request that your Department could obtain from the Department of Justice a ruling that no license be granted in the village of Lebret for the reasons above stated.
