



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# Practical Formulas for Chopped Meats

The following pages introduce a variety of tried and proven chopped meat formulas that will provide additional profit to the meat retailer, and which can be prepared from various meat cuts and ends, and trimmings. It is not suggested that the retail meat dealer merchandise at one time all the different chopped meat items in this book. It would be more satisfactory to select a few formulas in line with the meats that are moving slowly and from accumulated trimmings on hand.

Every formula should be tried out from time to time and the retailer can then concentrate on the ones that prove the most popular with the trade served.

It is important to keep in mind that a profitable volume of business cannot be built up permanently, unless the buying public receives fresh, wholesome meat. Trimmings should be used only when fresh, and should not be allowed to accumulate or they may become tainted or discolored. An excellent idea to follow is every morning, or at least once each day, check the refrigerator and then plan chopped meat sales according to the cuts on hand that are available for that purpose.

The cost price of chopped meat, ready for sale, depends upon the quality of meat used, the amount of fat, and whether or not binders, seasoning, ice and water are used. The cost price should be determined at the time of making, taking into consideration the value or replacement cost of all materials used.

The formulas in this book are generally given in amounts up to 100 pounds of meat. These can be increased or decreased accord-

ing to sales volume. Seasoning and binders should, of course, be used in proportion.

Where the less tender cuts, or combinations of different kinds of meat are used, best results and a more uniformly blended product will usually be obtained by chopping through the coarse plate first, then mixing thoroughly, and rechopping through the fine plate.

## BINDERS


Binders (cereals or fillers) are used to bind or hold chopped meats together, and when used, enough cold water should be added to make mixing easy. They also hold the natural juices of the meat and absorb moisture. The addition of a binder improves the texture of chopped meat, making it compact yet smooth.

The principal binders in use are soya bean flour, corn flour, rice flour, potato flour, dry skim milk, crackers, dry bread, and blends of these and similar materials.

The amount of binder per 100 pounds of meat averages about 3% and is governed by state regulations.

In certain localities the use of binders is prohibited unless there is a poster displayed which reads, "sausage with cereal added." There are also weights and measures laws which govern the sale of food. In some localities, for example, it is not permissible to sell any meat by the piece; it must be sold by the pound.

Every merchant should be familiar with all such laws and regulations and operate strictly in conformance with them.




## FORMULAS FOR SPECIALTIES

*In addition to display in bulk, chopped meats today are in increasing demand in "specialty" forms, such as loaves, rosettes, and patties.*

### CHOPPED BEEF ROSETTES

Chopped beef rosettes are made from lean chopped beef with the aid of a transparent tumbler or tea cup of a size that will hold about ¼ pound of meat. The meat is first chopped through the coarse plate. The fine plate is used for the second run to make the rosettes.

Re: Shubenacadie Indian Residential School

With reference to your notation on a memorandum dated April 27th from the Director Indian Affairs Branch, it is noted an amount of \$17,500 has been included in the Main 1948-49 Estimates for the water-proofing of the above building, and that Mr. Hoey would like to have the work carried out during the summer holidays.


During the fall of 1946 this office contacted the firm of Creaghan and Archibald Limited, Engineers and Contractors, Montreal, who have an office in Halifax, N.S., and after an inspection of the above building, submitted a report with a proposal and lump sum prices for carrying out the work.

Upon receipt of Mr. Hoey's memorandum, Creaghan and Archibald Limited were again written to and we are now in receipt of advice that their original proposal holds with the exception of the following:

1. Due to advanced costs their price at this time would be \$15,065.00 instead of \$13,100.00.
2. If the base coat of cement and sand is to be applied under pressure by the use of a gunite machine, the extra price at this time would be \$1610.00 instead of an extra of \$1400.00 previously quoted.

It is recommended that we be authorized to engage the firm of Creaghan and Archibald Limited to carry out the work of water-proofing of the exterior walls of the school, exclusive of stuccoed passageway, having the material applied under pressure. Adding the above figures their quoted price for doing this work by this method is now \$16,675.00.

We are of the opinion that no purpose would be served by advertising this work as the firm mentioned above specialize in water-proofing buildings and other similar work and as far as we are aware, are the only firm in a position to do the required work at Shubenacadie.





The Committee of the Privy Council have had before them a report dated 21st June, 1948, from the Minister of Mines and Resources, representing:

That in the 1948-49 estimates of the Indian Affairs Branch, Department of Mines and Resources, funds have been provided to carry out extensive waterproofing repairs to the existing Indian Residential School at Shubenacadie, Nova Scotia, where, due to the effect of driving Atlantic storms, moisture is penetrating the exterior masonry walls of the building;

That the serious damage resulting from the said moisture penetration is cumulative, requiring immediate remedial action which could be taken to greatest advantage during the summer vacation period;

That the lands and Development services Branch of the Department of Mines and Resources have carried out investigations through which it has been established that the firm of Grogan and Archibald Limited, 1440 St. Catherine St. W., Montreal, is a reputable firm of building waterproofing specialists, who have carried out a large amount of similar work in the Maritime Provinces with success;

That the said firm:-

- (a) is equipped and staffed to carry out the work required without delay;
- (b) have examined the building and have submitted a proposal to carry out complete exterior waterproofing and guarantee their work for a total cost of Sixteen Thousand Six Hundred and Seventy-five Dollars (\$16,675.00);



That the cost quoted in the said proposal is fair and just; that in view of the urgency of the work, it is considered to be in the public interest to avoid the delay that would be occasioned by the invitation of competitive tenders;

That the acceptance of the said proposal after making provision for contingencies and supervision would involve an expenditure of approximately seventeen Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$17,500.00).

The Committee, therefore, on the recommendation of the Minister of Mines and Resources, advise that authority be granted to accept the proposal of Grogan and Archibald Limited, and to enter into an arrangement with the said firm to carry out complete



- (1) Complete renewal of roof shingles.
- (2) Building of new flue.

It will also be necessary to replace some rough boards and rafters in this house. It is estimated that the total cost will amount to \$500.00. The lumber in connection with this repair can be supplied from the Agency Saw Mill, the account being credited to the 1948-49 Welfare Vote.

Rev. J. W. Brown, Principal, also advises that the Root Cellar is in need of a new roof. It was suggested by him that a metal roof would be most satisfactory. However, Sheet Metal Roofing is still in short supply, although there is an aluminium roofing on the market at the present time that is highly recommended. The Galvenised Sheet Metal Roofing if obtainable is listed slightly under \$8.00 per square and the aluminium is listed at \$12.00 per square.
