

Reverend Sir,-

The Department is in receipt of your letter of the 28th ultimo, enclosing account for \$64.80, covering the cost of books secured for the four Indian boys attending Technical School.

No authority was given for this purchase and it is noted from the account that the Encyclopediae cost \$5.50 each. Would it not have been possible for the boys to get along with only one copy of each book? These could be used jointly. Our appropriation is so limited that every possible effort must be made to reduce expenditures.

I am doubtful if payment of the account can be made but further consideration will be given to the matter when your reply is received.

I might, also, point out that you should have forwarded a requisition in order that the books could have been ordered from the Government Stationery Office if the Department wished to supply them.



Dear Sir:

I have your letter of December 4th., No. 133-0-5, and I have noted carefully its contents and regret that I did not send in for permission to purchase the books for the technical boys but simply followed the precedent of both last year and 1931. I find in looking over the correspondence, that under date of September 30, 1931, I made requisition for books at that time required for first year students in the Technical School and under date of October 6th., 1931, fial 133-0-1, I received your reply authorizing me to arrange for the purchase of these books and forward the account to the Department. Taking this as a precedent I did the same thing the next year and again this year.

Two years ago I approached the Principal, Mr. Austin, of the Technical School, in regard to having one copy of Dykes Encyclopedia for the three boys but he stated then, and repeated the same thing in conversation today, that it is a regulation of the School that each student must have one of these books. It is in constant use in their class room work and each boy is required to have one in front of him in connection with some of their classes. The one book of course will last for the three years and then should be well enough preserved to be of service when the boy goes into practical garge or machine shop work.

Trusting that the above explanation is satisfactory and that you can see fit to pay this account as financing with us is becoming increasingly difficult.

Dear Sir:

Serious trouble has developed with the high pressure boiler which heats the water for the laundry. We had an expert out two days ago and he finds that the tubes are all in a very serious condition and will have to be replaced. The cost, he estimates, will be ninety-two dollars. The tubes are leaking so badly that it is almost impossible to get the water heated for washing. I would appreciate it very much if you could send an immediate answer giving us authority to have this work done.

The expert tells us that in his judgment it is the hardness of the water that has caused these tubes to be in a condition requiring replacing so soon.







Paint, etc.:

The barns especially and all the out-buildings require painting, for which about 65 gallons of red and white paint will be necessary.

The boys' and girls' study rooms and the girls' playroom, bath and toilet rooms are badly in need of paint. It is also very desirable that the assembly hall, which also has to be used for group games, should be painted with a brown or other suitable color about seven feet high on the three walls. This will require about 6 gallons of brown and 3 gallons of cream.

The bungalow just east of the school is badly in need of decorating and should have the following colors in Muresco following Benjamin Moore's color chart:-

No. 5,	5 lbs.
12,	15 lbs.
8,	5 lbs.
20,	10 lbs.

This house and the one at the gate will require 2 gallons of inside gloss white paint and 3/4 gallon first coat paint. The bungalow veranda should be screened in as Mr. Wood has two small children which they desire to be kept outside as much as possible. This would require 1 roll, 40" wide, 14 x 14 mesh, screen wire cloth, black. The front room of the house at the gate is badly in need of wall paper.

We have deferred making any request for re-decorating in the Principal's home as the building of a new house has been under consideration and if there is some prospect of this going forward within a year or two it will no doubt inadvisable to undertake decorating. In some of the rooms the plaster itself is only held by the paper and just how long it will last is quite doubtful.

In two other letters I wish to refer to fencing and other matters.





Garage: There has been no change in this building since last fall but the late spring is when we have noticed the widening of the cracks the most seriously. I do not think there is any immediate danger of the roof falling in.

Residence: It is most difficult to know what to suggest and I will be guided entirely by the prospects of having a new house within a reasonable time. When I came here five years ago, Mr. Russell Ferrier was very definite in his statement that a new house would be built inside of two years. Altered conditions, of course, have made this impossible.

Cement Courts: With the spring thaw the freshet is on now and the earth from the hills is washing down and covering up a good deal of the cinders around the outside of these courts that we put in last year. It certainly would relieve us greatly if the necessary walls could be built and the courts put in. When Inspector Hamilton visited us last we observed that the front part of the root house on the west side was continuing to move away from the rest of the building, i.e., the crack is decidedly increased and he thinks it will also be necessary to put a wall about ten feet nearer the root house than the one already proposed.

Assembly Hall: In another letter I have included paint to cover the space of a wide wainscoting for three sides of this building. We, of course, would very much like to have a pulpit, suitable curtains for the platform and drapes for the windows. These, not only for appearance, but we believe they would also improve the acoustics of this auditorium.

Water Softener: The water, as you know, is extremely hard and I find we are paying out a good deal of money for the necessary material to soften the water in order to have the washing done satisfactorily and I sincerely hope that we can soon have a water softener installed.

Hen House: On account of the serious infection of T.B. in the old hen houses we have not deemed it advisable to use them since we deserted them nearly three years ago. We have been improvising accommodation for a few hens around the other buildings but this is not satisfactory and we cannot keep a sufficient number

Reverend Sir:

I beg to acknowledge receipt of your letters of the 12th and 13th ultimo, with reference to certain repairs which you consider are required at the Brandon Indian Residential School.

As you have been previously informed, provision has been made in our Appropriation for the current year for rebuilding the retaining wall and also for repairs to the Principal's residence. Our total Appropriation has not been increased and, consequently, the Department has not sufficient funds to enable us to authorize all the expenditures mentioned in your letters.

It is expected that arrangements will be made at an early date for rebuilding the retaining wall and repairing the Principal's residence. In addition, the sum of \$200 is available in our Appropriation for minor repairs at the Brandon Residential School. During the current fiscal year, you may forward accounts to an amount not exceeding \$200. Any expenditure over and above this amount, for replacements or repairs of a minor nature at the Brandon School, will have to be paid from the per capita allowance or other receipts.
