



Re the sale of one only Pneumatic
Tank at Kamloops Residential School,
Your file 154-0-5.

In connection with the above, I beg to advise that I am having salvaged all the fittings, such as pipes, valves, dynamo, pump, and will have them stored in the Agency store room here for use when required here or elsewhere.

When I have them stored, I will take an inventory of the equipment and forward a copy to the Department and one also to Mr. Webb, of the Dominion Water Power Bureau, Vancouver.

The building which covers this is of no further use and I have instructed the Rev. Principal to salvage any lumber from the building which can be used at the school. The walls have rotted, but the lumber in the roof is in fairly good shape.

I trust that the Department will approve of my action in regards to the salvage of this material.

I was out to the school today with Mr. Gale, the party who purchased the tank from Government Contract Supervision Committee, some time ago, arranging for delivery of tank to him. Before the tank can be removed intact, it is necessary that the roof of the building must also be removed, and Mr. Gale has agreed to wait a week or so for his tank, to give the Reverend Principal time to salvage the lumber as referred to above.

Since receipt of your letter of the 31st October, in connection with ~~this~~ tank, there has been some delay in taking action. This was due to the fact that the Dominion Water Power Bureau had locked the building and had the key in their possession.

We have the following -

"On July 15 tenders were called for the purchase from the Salvage Dept. of one pneumatic tank. On Aug. 19 the tender of Mr. F.A. Gale was accepted.

It is stated that Mr. Gale wished to take everything in the building, including a pump and dynamo, but it apparently was decided that he should take only the tank. The point at issue is not the pump and dynamo but Mr. Gale thinks the valves and fittings attached to the tank should go with it."



Memorandum:

The Deputy Minister of Mines and Resources.

Referring to memorandum dated the 15th December from Mr. Pratt regarding the tank sold by the Dominion Salvage Officer to Mr. F.A. Gale, I would say that in May, 1935, the department was advised by the Dominion Water Power Branch that a pneumatic tank at the Kamloops Indian Residential School was of no further use and that an offer for same had been received from Fernie Bros. They asked that the tank be sold to this firm. As it is contrary to government practice to sell property or articles of this nature, the tank was turned over to the Dominion Salvage Officer for disposal.

In August of same year a Minute was received from the Dominion Salvage Officer advising that the tank had been sold to Mr. Gale, Box 425, Kamloops, for the sum of \$15.00, the purchaser to pay all expenses in connection with the removal.

A letter was received here dated October 6th, 1936, from Mr. Gale advising that the pneumatic tank had not been turned over to him. The Indian Agent was instructed on October 13th to communicate with Mr. Gale and arrange with the school authorities to allow him to take possession and remove the tank. On October 17th the Indian Agent wrote to the department stating that Mr. Gale claimed that all the equipment, including dynamo, piping and other fittings should be turned over to him with the tank. The Agent did not agree with this as the tender definitely stated the old pneumatic tank. The Indian Agent was advised on October 31st that the tank only was sold to Mr. Gale.


EXTRACT from Letter of Doctor P. S. Tennant,
Medical Officer, Kamloops, B. C., dated March 31st,
1937.

Original on File 300 C-3.

The school is still troubled with offensive sewage odors. I trust it will be possible to have repairs done this year. In case you have forgotten our troubles in this connection, I will give you a few details.

The tank is too small for the amount of sewage handled. Consequently, it passes through partly digested and clogs the beds. The disposal bed is placed in very fine silt which readily filters into the pipes helping to block them. The drains are also laid with too much fall. I suggest an extra tank be placed between the building and the automatic flush tank. Also that drains be lifted and placed in fresh soil with some fine gravel around the pipes to prevent silt getting in them.

In our Appropriation for the fiscal year 1937-38, the following items were included for the Kamloops Indian Residential School:-

Installation septic tank - \$2,000.

Miscellaneous repairs - 200.

You will note, on this file, a copy of a recent letter from Dr. P. S. Tennant, Medical Officer, Kamloops, B. C.

The reports received from the Indian Agent and the Medical Officer during the past two or three years indicate that the present sewage disposal system at the Kamloops Residential School is not sufficiently large to do the work required.

I feel that it is most important that something should be done to improve the sewage disposal system at this school and I recommend that the necessary action be taken in this regard at the earliest possible date.

In addition to the current file, I am sending you the previous file with a letter turned out showing that the sewage disposal system has been unsatisfactory for some time.

As the National Health Branch of this Department is interested in matters of water supply and sewage disposal we would deem it a favour if you would let us have a copy of any information and blue-prints that may be available respecting methods used for the disposal of sewage at the Indian Industrial School at Kamloops, British Columbia. In connection with certain matters that are under the supervision of the National Health Branch it has been stated to this office that the sewer outfall at the Indian Industrial School at Kamloops is situated about one mile and a quarter upstream from the water supply intake of the Canadian National Railways for the Kamloops Junction coachyard.

Regarding your inquiry of May 5th the sewage disposal system at the Indian Industrial School at Kamloops, B. C. is comprised briefly as follows,-

The system is what is known as Septic Tank Sub-surface Irrigation System, and consists of a reinforced concrete septic tank connected with two disposal beds composed of 4 inch open jointed land tile laid 3'6" below the surface of the ground.

The sewage is carried from the school by means of 4 inch sewer pipes to a main inspection chamber from whence it is transferred by means of an 8 inch sewer pipe to the septic tank.

The septic tank is divided into two compartments,-

1. Settling chamber or septic tank which is 15' x 7' x 9'6" deep and is connected by a 3 foot overflow weir with the siphon chamber.
2. The siphon chamber which is 15' x 7' x 6'6" deep and is equipped with automatic siphon discharging four times a day under normal loads.

The discharge pipe from the septic tank to the disposal bed is a 6" sewer pipe 210' in length.

The disposal beds are two in number consisting of 4" land tile laid to conform with the contours of the ground on a grade of .003. The east bed consists of 2000 linear feet of land tile, and the west bed comprises 1500 linear feet. This gives a total disposal bed of 3500 linear feet.

The construction of this plant was carried out by contract under the supervision of the Dominion Water Power and Reclamation Service, Vancouver, in 1924. Detailed specifications and plans for this system are not available at hand, but if you
