Dear Inspector Hamilton:

As stated in our conversation we appreciate very much the paint which the Department provided for painting certain rooms in the school building here. By the use of a good deal of oil in the first coat and turpentine in the second coat we were able to extend this paint over a good deal more surface than was planned in our estimate. The contrast now between the walls that have been done and those which have not is seriously noticeable. The two playrooms in the basement and the two hospital wards together with children's bathrooms and toilet rooms, also locker rooms in the basement, are very much in need of paint.

For the painting already done we engaged a painter from town, Mr. Moore, at a cost of over \$60.00, but he gave much instruction and help to the boys that they are now able to go forward and do very good work. If the Department will purchase the paint for the rooms specified we will have it put on and it will certainly make a great improvement to the appearance of the building. It will require approximately 20 gallons of paint, 2 gallons of oil and one of turpentine. The best price I could secure here for good reliable paint is from Johnson Hardware at \$2.95 per gallon.

We will appreciate it very much if the above material can be furnished by the Dept. for this work. We appreciate your kind offices in this connection.



Sir:-

Attached is a copy of a letter received from Rev. Dr. Doyle, Principal of the Brandon Indian Residential School, in which he requests a further supply of paint.

I was at the Brandon School last week and can assure the Department that the paint supplied has greatly improved the condition of the school. The work has indeed been very well done. The contrast between the rooms painted and those left undone is very apparent. The hospital wards certainly should be painted in order that the walls may be washed down and kept clean. I might say that at the time of my visit, there were over thirty children sick with the 'flu and, some days prior to that, over sixty were in bed.

The material to cover the work mentioned in Doctor Doyle's letter will cost approximately \$65.00 and I would appreciate being advised if funds are available to have the necessary work carried out.



- One WG133H Water Cooled Kelvinator Condensing Unit, single phase, 110 volts, 60 cycles.
- One 56 DS Kelvinator Double Section Dry System, Cross Fin Cooling Unit.
- One Thermostatic Expansion Valve.
- One Galvanized Drip Tray complete with copper drain pipe.
- Two Hand Valves.
- One Kerostat Control Valve.
- All tubing, fittings, adaptors, plumbing and electrical work necessary for complete installation.

I would request that you take up the above matters with the Principal and forward a recommendation regarding the carrying out of the work in building the retaining wall. Would you recommend that prices be obtained and the work done by contract, or could it be done by day labour, in charge of a competent foreman - you to purchase any materials. You should also state how you consider the work in the erection of the new chicken house should be carried out.

I shall be pleased to have as full information as possible regarding the best means of carrying out the above mentioned work. After your reply is received, the matter will be taken up with the Honourable the Minister, for approval, and you will be advised.

Dear Sir:

On Saturday morning, when I came across from the house to the school at a few minutes after six, I noticed a hole, about two feet square, in the east end of the horse barn at the point where the loft floor joins the wall. On investigation we found that a fire was burning just inside the wall. We immediately called the Fire Department and established a bucket line of boys and before the fire engine arrived we had the fire under control.

I had the fire chief and one of his men go over the situation very carefully and in view of the fact that the fire had commenced right against the wall and that it had evidently been smoldering for some hours, also in view of the fact that the loft is inaccessible, except to the bigger boys, and the entrance to it comes up through a feed chute, which is difficult to find, and that no sign of any tramp's bed was in evidence, the men of the fire department were quite satisfied that it was commenced by spontaneous combustion. Sweet clover and oat sheaves were run through the cutting box and blown in from the west gable last fall for winter feed. The floor of the loft at the east end had a thick covering of very fine sweet clover dust. This was about three inches deep at the wall. There was quite a heavy rain from the east during Thursday. The dampness from this had, no doubt, gone in through the cracks in the siding. Then, Friday was a very hot day, the sun beating in on that end of the barn, and while spontaneous combustion is a very rare occurrence, those who examined the situation think it quite possible and probable that this is the explanation of the fire.

Reverend Sir:

I have your letter of the 12th instant, informing the Department regarding a fire that occurred in the horse barn at the Brandon Indian Residential School and the action taken in extinguishing the fire. The Department is pleased that no extensive damage was incurred. It is noted that you had an investigation made by the Fire Chief and one of his men and they are of the opinion that the fire was caused by spontaneous combustion.

In order to prevent any recurrence from a similar cause, would it not be possible, after the hay and feed in the barn are used, to have the floors of the loft cleaned and all dust, seed and other rubbish removed? The lumber required for repairs can be included with the other repairs necessary before the barn is painted.

The Principal of the Brandon Indian Residential School reports that a fire occurred at the east end of the horse barn and that, on investigation by the Fire Chief and one of his men, they are of opinion it occurred through spontaneous combustion. He states it will require approximately 200 ft. of lumber, including siding, flooring, joists and studs, to repair the damage and this can be cared for in connection with other repairs, before the barn is painted.

In this connection I would refer you to official letter of the first instant, informing you of the amount available in our Appropriation for this school.

The Department is pleased that no extensive damage was incurred by the fire.
