Reverend Sir,

You will find enclosed copy of a letter dated October 1st written to Dr. McInnis in reference to his account for the month of August which includes the charges for the tonsil operations done for the school during that month. In reply to this letter Dr. McInnis among other things states that the Department has been very unfair in offering him the fee paid for giving the anaesthetics. He further states that unless he is paid a fee for visiting the school to vaccinate the pupils, in addition to that for the vaccination, it will be necessary for you to parade the pupils to his office. There should not be any hardship either for you or the children in this connection, and there does not seem to be any reason why he should have to come to the school for this purpose. He says that he paid Mrs. Yeadon, a nurse, \$15.00 for her services. If you will take a receipt from Dr. McInnis for this payment the Department will send him a cheque in your care. Kindly send this receipt to the Department at your earliest convenience.

With Cheque

Sir,

In reply to your letter of October 6th referring to payments made to you for professional services rendered to the pupils of the Shubenacadie Residential School in the month of August, I have to advise you that the Department has no intention of re-considering its decision.

With regard to the fees for anaesthetics given by you, you were paid precisely what the Department offered and what you presumably undertook the work for. The fee of \$5.00 for an anaesthetic for tonsil operation is that paid by the Department everywhere in Canada and accepted without complaint. It might well appear that a Doctor is not ill paid in earning \$155.00 for three days work, which can by no means be considered of a special nature and which was carried out within a very short distance of his office.

With regard to the fee for vaccination it is noted that you were paid for a visit to the school on August 12th and for vaccination of twenty-one pupils on the same day. There is no reason why you should have to visit the school for vaccinating pupils and the Principal is being advised of this fact.

With regard to the payment made to Mrs. Yeadon, I may say that the Department neither instructed nor authorized you to engage any nurse. If you will hand the receipt to the Principal you will be re-imbursed.

I may say further that the Department regards this matter as closed. You will find enclosed a cheque for \$215.00, in payment of your accounts for the months of August and September.

Dear Sir: -

Your proposition re Dental work for the Indian Residential School, Shubenacadie has been sent me by the Rev. J. P. Mackey, Principal of that school.

I notice by your letter that there has been no provision made for the care of anterior teeth, which it seems to me would be equally if not more important than the posteriors. Therefore, I am drawing your attention to this matter and hope you will make arrangements to allow me One Dollar Fifty Cents (\$1.50) per white enamel filling.

The Department could not expect a dentist to extract teeth for Twenty-five Cents (25¢) and use the humane methods in vogue to-day. This should be at least Fifty Cents (50¢) per extraction.

It was my privilege to do considerable work among soldiers and returned men for the Government, and I would say that the fees were substantially above those quoted in this letter.

ELLEN FRANCIS, age 12.

Examined September 22, 1930. T. 992, P. 96 to 100 R-22-5.55 p.m.

History of hemoptysis, shortness of breath and cough.

Physical signs of an advanced tuberculous lesion on right-side; evidence of Vomica upper lobe.

Left apex suspicious.

Diagnosis - Pulmonary tuberculosis.

Recommendation: Immediate bed rest and removal to Sanatorium or tuberculosis hospital as soon as possible.

ESTHER PHILLIP, age 14.

Examined September 22, 1930. T. 99, P. 72 - R. 20 - 9.10 a.m.

Recently discharged from River Glade Sanatorium in New Brunswick as an arrested case.

Apart from harsh apical breathing there was nothing special noted on physical examination.

Diagnosis: Pulmonary tuberculosis arrested -- No special treatment required at present.

KATE COPAGE, age 15.

Examined September 22, 1930. T. 98<sup>2</sup>, P. 84, R. 20, 3 p.m.

History of streaked sputum extending over four months, three years ago. On physical examination a few dry rales were heard from 2 to 4 r on the right side.

X-Ray plate shows an old organized lesion in the 1st and 2nd interspaces right side.

Diagnosis: Pulmonary tuberculosis apparently arrested.

Recommendation: A two hour rest period daily after dinner - Replate next year.

STEPHEN BADDISTE, age 9.

Examined September 22, 1930, T. 99, P. 72, R 18 - 5.30 p.m.

On physical examination rhonchi were heard on the right side about 2 r.

X-Ray film shows old p.c. lesion of right upper lobe with moderate fibrosis of left upper lobe. No evidence of active disease.

Diagnosis: Pulmonary tuberculosis arrested. Avoid strenuous exercise and replate next year.

JOHN H. McDONALD, age 8.

T. 100, P. 72, R. 20, - 4 p.m.

History of frequent colds. Physical examination.

Scattered rhonchi over both sides front and back.

X-Ray film: Fibrosis of both upper lobes. No evidence of active disease.

Diagnosis: Bronchitis - Arrested Tuberculosis. Replate next year.

REGINA COPAGE, age 9.

Examined Sept. 23, 1930. T. 99<sup>6</sup>, P. 96, R. 20 -- 3.20 p.m.

Rales and rhonchi heard over both sides front and back, more marked in lower halves of chest.

X-Ray shows accentuation of ascending trunks right side and P. B. thickening throughout. No evidence of active tuberculosis disease.

Diagnosis: Bronchitis. No strenuous exercise and lots of rest indicated for this condition, which is marked.

BRIDGET MALONEY, age 16.

Examined Sept. 23, 1930. T. 98, P. 72, R. 20 - 2.15 p.m.

Breathing at right apex more of a bronchial character than normally.

X-Ray film shows fibrosis of right upper lobe, particularly second interspace trunk. Markings left upper lobe exaggerated.

Diagnosis: Probably an old lesion. No special treatment required at present.

THERESA BAEISTE, age 5.

Examined Sept. 23, 1930. T. 100, P. 100, R. 20, - 2p.m.

(Vaccination for Smallpox just taking.)

Rales heard in lower half of left chest behind and questionably few at right base.

X-Ray film shows diffuse mottling of upper lobes suggesting early P. C. changes.

Diagnosis: Suspected Tuberculosis.

Recommendation: Bed rest for two weeks then a 2 hour afternoon rest period for two months. Replate next year.

\* MARY FRANCIS; age 12.

Examined Sept. 22, 1930. T. 99<sup>2</sup>, P. 96, R. 20 -- 4.50 p.m.

Few fine rales heard at left hilum.

X-Ray film is a poor one as patient apparently moved while it was being taken. It nevertheless suggests some old trouble on the left side.

Diagnosis: Suspected Tuberculosis.

Recommendation: A two hour afternoon rest period and replate next year.

\* HARRIET BATHIE, age 7.

Examined Sept. 23, 1930. T. 99<sup>8</sup>, P. 90, R. 20 -- 11.40 a.m.

Rhonchi heard over both sides fron and back from apices to bases.

X-Ray film shows infection of Tracheo-Bronchial nodes both sides.

Diagnosis: Bronchitis which seems of a chronic nature.

Recommendation: No strenuous exercise with all possible rest.

Replate next year.

\* ANNIE BARK, age 10.

Examined Sept. 23, 1930. T. 98<sup>6</sup>, P. 72, R. 18 -- 4.40 p.m.

Questionable rales heard about 2 r. left side.

X-Ray film shows definite clear cut p.c. lesion about 3 r. left side which appears to be well organized.

Diagnosis: Pulmonary Tuberculosis apparently arrested.

Recommendation: Two hour afternoon rest period. Replate next year.

\* ELIZABETH PAUL; age 11.

Examined Sept. 23, 1930. T. 99, P. 84, R. 20, 11.45 a.m.

Rhonchi heard over both sides, more marked on left. Few rales at left base.

X-Ray Plate: Moderate fibrotic changes in both upper lobes. Markings accentuated throughout.

Diagnosis: Bronchitis and suspected Tuberculosis.

Recommendation: An afternoon rest period and replate next year.

EVA MAY PAUL, age 11.

Examined Sept. 23, 1930. T. 996, P. 80, R. 20 -- 2 p.m.

Apical sounds suspicious.

X-Ray film shows old lesion in left upper lobe and questionably one in right upper lobe.

Diagnosis: Pulmonary Tuberculosis not active.

Recommendation: A two hour afternoon rest period and another X-Ray next year.

GREGORY FRANCIS; age 11.

Examined Sept. 22, 1930.

Father died of Tuberculosis/

T. 984, P. 74, R. 18, -- 5.25 p.m.

In hospital last year for tuberculous bone, right arm.

Physical Examination: Chest seems clear. Old healed scars right upper arm.

Diagnosis: Bone Tuberculosis, arrested. No special treatment required now.

JOHANNA BRADFORD, age 15.

Examined Sept. 23, 1930. T. 992, P. 72, R. 18 -- 5 p.m.

Mother, sister and three brothers died of Tuberculosis.

No physical signs of active tuberculosis in chest.

There is a mass of old scars on right side of back and involving the lower maxillary bone. All firmly healed for some years.

Diagnosis: Gland and bone tuberculosis - Arrested.

Recommendation: No special treatment required other than routine life of school.

STEPHEN BERNARD, age 10.

Examined Sept. 22, 1930. T. 992, P. 90, R. 20 - 9.45 a.m.

Mother has tuberculosis.

Chest clear.

One anterior cervical gland on left side enlarged.

Diagnosis: Infection suspected.

Recommendation: No special treatment other than routine of school.

GORDON PAUL, age 9.

Examined Sept. 23, 1930. T. 99, P. 90, R. 20 - 9.00 a.m.

Nothing found in chest.

Anterior cervical glands enlarged.

Diagnosis: Probably Glandular Tuberculosis

Recommendation: Restrict exercise and play.

MARY ELLEN BROOKS, age 6.

Examined Sept. 24, 1930. T. 98<sup>6</sup>, P. 84, R. 20 - 3.40 p.m.

Cervical glands in anterior triangles quite enlarged and rounded. Chest clear.

Diagnosis: Suspected Glandular Tuberculosis.

No special treatment other than routine life of school.  
Restrict play.

MELVINA PAUL, age 7.

Examined Sept. 23, 1930. T. 99<sup>8</sup>, P. 94, R. 20 - 3.30 p.m.

No definitely abnormal signs in chest.

Glands enlarged in anterior triangles of neck.

Diagnosis: Suspected Glandular Infection.

Recommendation: Restricted exercise and play.

VIOLET SMITH, age 11.

Examined Sept. 22, 1930. T. 100, P. 78, R. 20. - 4.10 p.m.

While physical examination did not reveal anything abnormal yet, Glandular infection is suspected.

Recommendation: Restricted play and more rest than normally.

MARGARET GOOGOO, age 8.

Examined Sept. 22, 1930. T. 98<sup>6</sup>, P. 96, R. 20 - 3.45 p.m.

Chest clear.

Glands of anterior triangles in neck rounded and enlarged.

Diagnosis: Probably Glandular Tuberculosis.

Recommendation: Restricted play and more rest than normally.

ISOBEL JOHNSON, age 11.

Examined Sept. 22, 1930. T. 99<sup>6</sup>, P. 90, R. 20 - 3.50 p.m.

Nothing special found in lungs. Glands palpable.  
Soft blowing systolic apical cardiac murmur noted.

Recommendation: Restricted play and observation.

BARNEY FRANCIS, age 7.

Examined Sept. 23, 1930. T. 99<sup>6</sup>, P. 78, R. 20 - 10.00 a.m.

Nothing abnormal noted in lungs.

Systolic cardiac murmur heard at second left costal cartilage.

Recommendation: Observation with restricted exercise.

SIMON FRANCIS, age 4.

Examined Sept. 24, 1930. T. 99, P. 30, R. 22 - 3.45 p.m.

Chest wheezy. Delayed expiratory movements. Rhonchi present.

Diagnosis: Asthma and Bronchitis.

Recommendation: Child to be removed from the school and sent to a general hospital for a short time with a view to having Pollen tests carried out.

ANNIE McDONALD, age 11.

Examined Sept. 24, 1930. T. 98, P. 78, R. 20 -- 9.20 a.m.

Rhonchi present in both bases.

Diagnosis: Bronchitis.

Recommendation: No special treatment other than restricted play.

LOUIS THOMAS, age 6.

Examined Sept. 24, 1930. T. 100, P. 90, R. 20 - 4.50 p.m.

No abnormal signs in chest. Discharging right ear noted.

Recommendation: Routine treatment for ear.

PETER JOE LOFFORD, age 10.

Examined Sept. 24, 1930. T. 99, P. 72, R. 18 - 11.00 a.m.

Nothing abnormal found in chest.

Anterior cervical gland slightly enlarged.

Patient's right eye has been removed.

Suggest having oculist

GILBERT FRANCIS, ag

Re-examined Sept. 24, 1930. T. 98<sup>6</sup>, P. 72, R. 20 10.40 a.m.

Has improved very considerably.

No special treatment required now.

ELSIE CHARLES

Re-examined Sept. 24, 1930. T. 99<sup>6</sup>, P. 74, R. 20 10.00 a.m.

Improved since last examination.

Would suggest however a continuance of rest period.

LUCY BROOKS

Re-examined Sept. 24, 1930. T. 98<sup>6</sup>, P. 72, R. 20 - 10.20 a.m.

When examined on April 8th, 1930. A short period of observation and study at Sanatorium was advised.

This was done and the case declared Bronchitis.

Present chest condition satisfactory. No special treatment required.

NICHOLAS DOHERTY.

Re-examined Sept. 24, 1930. T. 98<sup>6</sup>, P. 72, R. 20 - 10.35 a.m.

Improved since last examination. Advise a continuance of afternoon rest periods.

EDWARD SOCOBIE.

Re-examined Sept. 24, 1930. T. 99, P. 76, R. 20 - 11 a.m.

Recently shows improvement. If improvement continues no treatment required; otherwise an afternoon rest period.

JOHN BROOK

Re-examined Sept. 24, 1930. T. 98, P. 94, R. 20 - 11.20 a.m.

Improved since last examination.

I consider it important that he be given a two hour afternoon rest period for the next three months.

LOUISE PAUL

Re-examined Sept. 24, 1930. T. 99, P. 80, R. 20 -- 11.40 a.m.

Has improved very considerably.

Discharging and cough noted has cleared up.

Recommendation: afternoon daily rest.

Two things struck me rather forcibly on this my second visit to the school for purposes of chest examining the pupils, and roughly five and one half months after my first visit: firstly the improved nutritional and general appearance of those who were there in April and secondly the definite improvement in those for whom rest treatment had been advised in April.

It would seem that the Micmac children respond to the hygienic life which is, after all, the treatment for tuberculosis. The marked change from general poor home living conditions to a nearly ideal environment of the school, is apparently having effect. It will be interesting to watch this over a period of time and to note the ultimate result.

note

In the light of evidence obtainable it would appear that an average case of closed tuberculosis will do just as well at the school as at any tuberculosis institution. Of course I do not favor keeping open cases there; all such should be removed to institution or at least isolated.

I wish again to comment favourably on the efficient manner in which the pupils are being cared for at the school.

Dear Sir:

With reference to the enclosed accounts for Bridget Stevens. You will see from Dr. McInnis reports that this girl was examined twice. From observation and appearance it looked very much as if this child were pregnant. Under the circumstances the only thing to do was to have a thorough examination. I took her into Halifax with the Gonorrhoea case, intending to bring her back the following day. However I was laid up in the Hospital for three days myself and I brought her back when I came. The report on her case is negative. While I cannot contradict that report, well time will tell.

I had written the Agent, Rev. Father Rankin, and informed them at the Hospital where to send the accounts but they sent them to Agent Lawlor and he passed them over to me.

Also enclosed you will find the report of Dr. Campbell for the T.B. examination.

I have your letter of the 18th instant, with reference to dental work for the pupils at the Shubenacadie Indian Residential School. The Department will allow \$1.50 for white enamel fillings in the case of anterior teeth and 50¢ for extractions of permanent teeth. The rate for ordinary amalgam fillings will be \$1.00 and extractions in the case of temporary teeth, 25¢. These are the fees that are allowed at other Indian residential schools in Canada. It is true that they are substantially less than those for soldiers and returned men; but the Department feels that wholesale rates should be allowed for school children in residence.

If you accept this proposal, please inform Father Mackey, and you may make your first visit to the school at your earliest convenience. Father Mackey is receiving a copy of this letter to you.


