

"The other thing I need is more milk. There is only five miserable milk cows here and two good cows will give me more milk than the five. It is easy to pick up cheap miserable stuff like what is now here. But it is not much of a training to boys to handle such stuff. I know from actual experience at Alberni that as soon as good cows came on the place the interest of the boys increased 100%. At Alberni I built up the very best herd of dual purpose Pure Bred Shorthorns in the Province. Just look up Report No. 18 of Pure Bred Dairy Cattle of the Dom. Government. There you will see in the 4 year old Shorthorn Section my cow "Augusta Glad Eyes" led all Canada in her class, and Roan Marie in the Mature Class occupied 4th place in Canada. In leaving Alberni, nothing grieved me so much as leaving them behind. I left over 30 head at Alberni that any one might envy, and that number is more than the present Principal needs, or can handle to advantage.

"I must have cows here after the summer vacation, my resources will only permit me to secure "just cows". I believe I can buy four cows or heifers from Alberni School for \$600.00 and pay the transportation. Will you allow me a grant of \$600.00 for this purpose?"




Sir:



Dear Sir:- Repairs needed to new barn at Alberni
Indian Residential School.

I beg to advise you that the new barn at the Alberni Indian Residential School is in need of some repairs to doors. This damage has, in my opinion, been contributed to by their failure to open freely, caused by the pulling out of plumb of the barn, caused by the weight of the manure conveyer which is attached to the upper portion of that structure and supported, originally, only by guys or stays which are fixed to the higher portion of upper structure. The weight of the conveyer with its load has pulled the building out of plumb endways and caused the doors to stick in closing or made it impossible to close them. The weight strain has recently been relieved by placing a post and beam support at the extreme end of the conveyer arm and I think will prevent the further movement of the building, but I think it would be advisable to have the building put back in to plumb and braced to prevent it again moving.



Sir:-

In accordance with instructions contained in your No. 15/9097, of 28th ultimo, re need of assembly hall or farmer's cottage for Alberni Indian Residential School.

I beg to report that I have carefully looked into this matter and in my opinion, which is concurred in by the new Principal, Rev. F.E. Pitts, there is more need of a cottage for the farming instructor than there is for an assembly hall at that school. The need of the assembly hall is not apparent and the purpose of such a building is not clear to me, while the need of a farmer's cottage is apparent. The present occupant of that position has held it for the past two years and during that time has only been able to be with his family for a few days on three occasions during the school holidays. He has tried to obtain housing accommodation for his family in Alberni but has failed to do so as there are no vacant houses in this vicinity.

There is at present a building which was erected in 1923 and is being used as a play and games room for the boys during the winter and in bad weather. It is approximately seventy-five feet long by thirty-five feet wide. It is constructed of rough lumber on a concrete foundation but it is not floored. If funds are available that building might be floored, windows repaired and screened and whatever gymnastic appliances deemed necessary installed if so desired. If you desire I will get an estimate of the approximate cost of a concrete or lumber floor for this building. I do not think a concrete floor is best suitable for a playroom or gym. The building is already fitted for electric light. The estimated cost of any kind of floor you prefer and the cost of window repairs and screening will be obtained and submitted at your instruction.

I may say that a suitable site for a cottage is available, less a hundred yards from the school in close proximity to farm buildings, just outside the school enclosure.

In reply I beg to say this matter was taken up with Mr. Indian Agent Frost and the Rev. Mr. Pitts, Principal of the School, and they both concur that the building of a cottage for the Farming Instructor is much more essential than is an assembly hall.

The Indian Agent informs me, however, that there is a building at present which was erected in 1923 and is now being used as a play and game room for the boys during the winter and in bad weather. It is constructed of rough lumber on a concrete foundation but is not floored. If funds were available the Indian Agent suggests that the building might be floored and the windows repaired and screened. This would answer the purpose of a gymnasium for some time. I would, therefore, beg to recommend that a cottage for the Farming Instructor be erected in preference to an assembly hall but if there were sufficient funds available a wood flooring might be put in the present gymnasium room and the windows repaired and a small amount of gymnastic equipment purchased.

I have your 15/9511 of the 6th instant, reporting that a farmer's cottage is the most urgent building requirement at the Alberni Indian Residential School. I am pleased to inform you that \$1,500 is available for this purpose, and I am enclosing a set of plans of a building that can be erected for this amount. You should secure a competent carpenter foreman, who would get out a list of the material necessary so that you could make the purchase, and who would then take charge of the construction of the cottage at the school. It would be well to engage local labour, and the school management should be given to understand that all hauling and rough labour should be provided by the members of the staff and the older boys, without cost to the Department. If any saving can be effected, the balance will be available for flooring the outdoor playroom and making other repairs.

I have also your 15/9512 of the 6th instant, regarding the barn at this institution, and in reply I beg to state that the Department will await the tenders that Mr. Indian Agent Frost is to forward.



I have your letter of the 16th instant, relative to the repairs required to the barn at the Alberni Indian Residential School.

In reply I beg to say that the Department will approve of an expenditure not exceeding approximately \$145 in the purchase of the material and fittings and for the labour in having the repairs mentioned by you as being required to the barn carried out. When the work has been completed, you should forward properly certified vouchers, in duplicate, covering the expenditure incurred.

Relative to the 45 panes of glass required for the windows, it is considered that replacements of this nature should be made by the school authorities from their per capita grant or other receipts. The Department is not prepared to authorize the expenditure required in having the glass replaced.

Sir:-

I have the honour to report for the information of the Department, in accordance with instructions received from Mr. Commissioner, W.E. Ditchburn, that certain repairs are needed to the barn at the Alberni Indian Residential School, Alberni, B.C. And I further beg to advise the Department that I have had the building examined by Mr George Forrest, of Alberni, Builder, and the following repairs are recommended by him,

1. New double doors to main driveway, doors to be constructed of V joint, double ply, built in frame diagonally, with small door in one of the main doors.
2. New door on bull pen constructed as above, without small door.
- 3 " " between feed room and cattle stalls, constructed as above.
- 4 " " Side entrance to cattle stalls " " "
- 5 " " To outside of horse stable, " " "
- 6 One 4"X 12" beam to be bolted across end of hay mow to brace the building back into place where it has been bulged by the weight of the manure carrier.

Estimated cost of all material labour and fittings for above \$, 145.00.

Also 45 panes of glass needed in windows, not included in the above estimate, approximate cost, \$ 10.00.

I respectfully recommend that this work, if approved by the Department, be carried out as early as possible as the end of the hay mow is being kept vacant as far as possible to facilitate the placing of the beam mentioned.


