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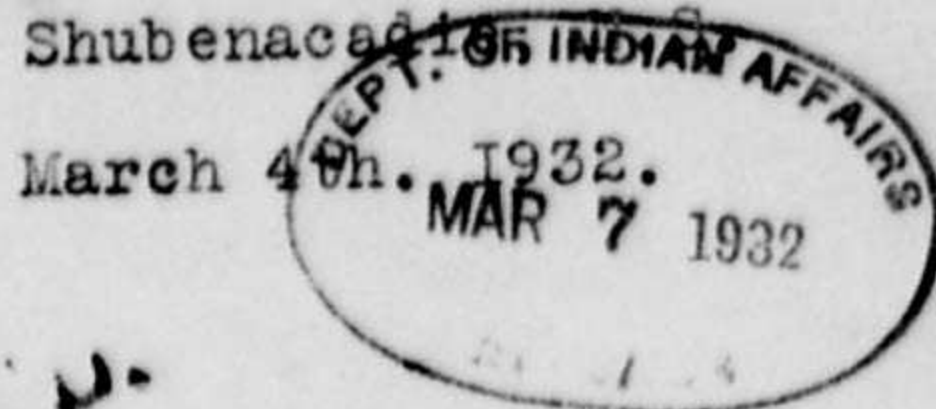

Dear Sir:

In connection with the enclosed report and Influenza. The Flu. has been in the locality for a month and in some places the Schools were closed. Our first case was on Feb .26th. and apparently it will go through the house. Most cases are very mild and we have not thought it necessary to call the Doctor for any of them. The average time is about two days in bed, although some of the older children have been confined to bed for four days. Another week I think will see it cleaned up. In conversation with the Doctor he suggested that it came from those coming to see their children, but the first ones to take it have not seen any visitors during the year.

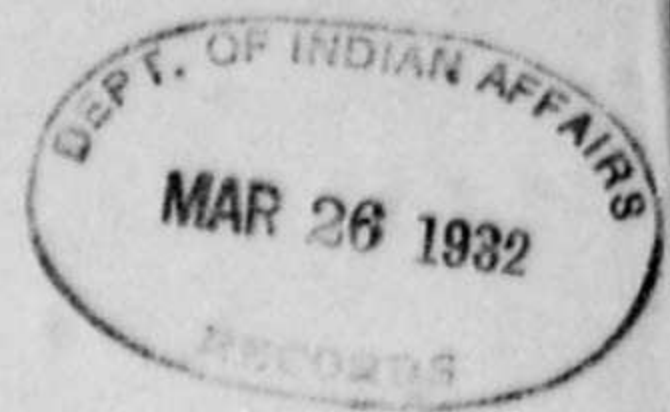


Dear Mr. MacKenzie:

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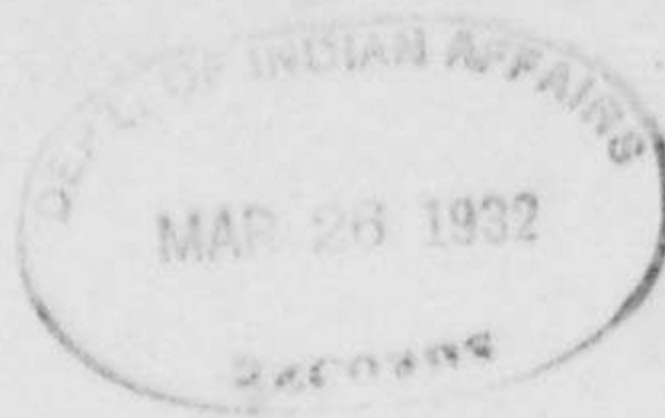

Reverend Sir,

In reply to your letter of March 22nd the Department is of the opinion that the MacDonald children should be got under treatment for syphilis without delay. A supply of neosalvarsan is being sent for this purpose and a further supply will be sent on request. Requisition for this drug should specify the strengths required and the number of tubes of each strength.

The Department has received a reply from the Provincial Department of Public Health in answer to its request for assistance in taking samples of blood at your school. The Provincial authorities do not wish to undertake this work for reasons which it is understood they expressed to you. It would be well for you to have a further discussion with Dr. McInnis on this matter. The Department considered that it was making a reasonably fair offer to him when it offered \$50 for this work. He is not bound to do it at any particular time and should derive a substantial amount of business from treating the pupils who are found to be affected. Dr. McInnis' co-operation in this matter would be appreciated. The Department is anxious to do what is right and considers this to be a fair offer.

Dear Sir:

Beg to let you know that the Scarlet Fever is as yet confined to the one case. But we are having a difficult time otherwise. There are four cases of *erysipelas* and quite a number of enlarged glands. Dr. McInnis ordered three to the V.G. Hospital, Clara Thomas, No. 027, for large gland, Mary A. Sark, No. 042, for Mastoid, and Juliana Bear, No. 081, possibly mastoid also. This condition of affairs is not peculiar to the School but is quite general in the Province. The attendance at the Public Schools has been the lowest for years. All this is due to the Flu. and its after-effects.

Dear Sir:

In reply to your letter of March 31st. ult. We had the first treatment of the MacDonald children today, that is of two of them, as Dr. McInnis could not locate the vein in the third. See enclosed note.

As for the Blood test for Fifty dollars, satisfactory to a certain degree. Dr. McInnis will take the test for that amount, but the treatment is \$ 5.00 per shot per child. Hence ten dollars today for the two MacDonald children, according as he says the schedule reads. The treatment is to continue for six weeks at twice a week, then twelve weeks with mercury treatment, and then back again for one treatment a week for twelve weeks. The way I figure it would cost \$ 120.00 per child for three months treatment. Which is two thirds of what you are allowing for their full years keep.

Please let me know if you want the MacDonald children treated at the rate of five dollars per shot, amounting to twenty dollars a week for the two of them, or better wire the Doctor .

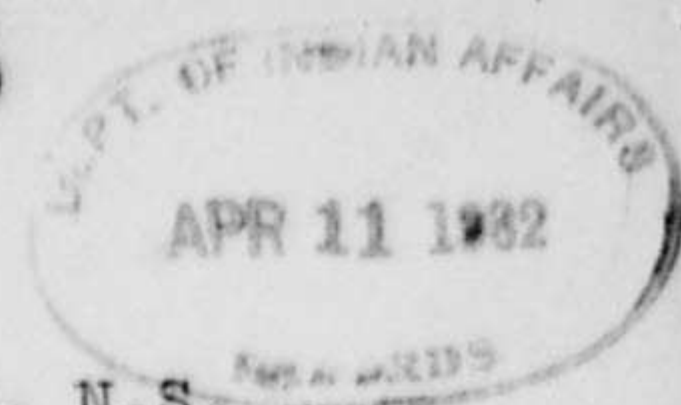
