Dear Colonel Neary:-

In connection with the installation of the domestic hot water unit for this School I wish to advise that Mr. Hargreaves of the Department of Lands & Development, on his visit here a year ago, approached H. Giddens Ltd. of Kamloops, who were to get the contract for heating the Classroom Block, and asked them to quote on the domestic hot water unit. H. Giddens Ltd. had already figured, in their price on the heating job, to supply hot water for domestic use by increasing the size of their heating unit. Mr. Hargreaves did not favour that method of heating water and recommended a separate installation. He outlined what was required and asked H. Giddens Ltd. to quote a price on this separate unit. Since a separate unit for domestic hot water was being called for H. Giddens Ltd. would not need now to increase the size of their heating boiler. They suggested to re-quote on their heating contract price at a lower figure. Mr. Hargreaves thought it best for them to leave their heating contract price stand but asked them, in quoting on the domestic hot water unit, to arrive at a figure less the amount they saved in not having to increase the size of their heating boiler. H. Giddens Ltd. did this. The situation changes now with another Contractor coming into the picture. Carr & Son of Kamloops were asked to quote on the domestic hot water unit, by the local Superintendent and they, without sufficiently studying what was required, put in a price on a unit far too small at a much less figure, and got the contract. H. Giddens Ltd. were surprised but not disappointed because they effected quite a saving on their heating job.

In the quotation of Carr & Son on the domestic hot water unit it is the size of the heating tank that is far too small. To correct the situation Carr & Son subsequently quoted to install a heating tank to the amount of \$988.00. The domestic hot water unit would then be of the same size as quoted on by H. Giddens Ltd. which is the size required.

I hope the above explanation will clarify the situation of the contract mentioned in the preceding paragraphs and that some action can be forthcoming soon to proceed with the installation of the domestic hot water unit which is so urgently needed.

Does this mean that this firm considers themselves and will full for \$10957.00 hot water system?

Dear Sir:

Complying to your request for a statement of the damages to the 50 H.P., 2200 volt motor of the irrigation pump, we advise as follows.

On receiving a phone call that there was trouble in this motor, we went to investigate. On enquiry we were advised the pump was in normal operation and suddenly stopped. Smoke was seen coming from the motor and the starting compensator.

On examination we found several coils in the motor burned and decided to ship it to the repair shop. An examination at the shop showed the insulation was badly perished. This no doubt is due to the age of the motor, 23 years.

We were advised that a complete rewind job would be necessary.

The cost of repairs, rent of service motor, etc. will be approximately \$650.00.

We are advised by Supt. Bruce that after twenty three year's service the insulation on the 50 H.P. 2200 volt motor operating the above-mentioned pump has perished to such an extent that several coils in the motor burned out and a complete rewind at an approximate cost of \$650.00 is now necessary. This price is tendered by C.L. Wain & Son, reference their letter of May 31st attached, and includes the rental of a motor while repairs are being made. I would recommend that Supt. Bruce be authorized by telegram to have these repairs completed.





MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

KAMLOOPS INDIAN RESIDENTIAL SCHOOL,
KAMLOOPS, B.C.



With reference to your marginal request on Major MacKay's memorandum of the 1st of June in connection with the above, the following comment is provided.

2. Due to circumstances with which we have no connection or control, it would appear that a misunderstanding has arisen with regard to Father O'Grady's request for improvements to the domestic hot water system in the residential school. It is the purpose of this memorandum to review the circumstances known to us and to suggest a recommendation on which the Indian Affairs Branch may base their action.
3. Our Mr. Hargreaves visited this school a year ago in connection with changes to the Four Classroom Block then under construction. At that time Father O'Grady pointed out that the domestic hot water facilities in the residential school were inadequate to meet the requirements for his pupils and staff. Our officer inspected these services and verified the principal's contention. Father O'Grady was advised to submit his request for improvements to the Indian Affairs Branch through the local Indian Superintendent. Since the Superintendent was away on a business trip, Mr. Arneil who was present, suggested that Father O'Grady's request should be submitted to him for transmission to the Indian Affairs Branch.
4. Our officer outlined the requirements and it was agreed that since this work had nothing to do with the contract being carried out at the new Classroom Block, it should be classed as a maintenance item. Therefore, Father O'Grady was advised to obtain prices on the following equipment.

One - 1000 gallon domestic hot water storage tank with suitable steel supports.

One - High-Test cast iron jacket heater built for a working pressure of 75 p.s.i. having a capacity to raise 500 gallons of water per hour through 100 degree temperature rise.

One - pressure relief valve set to release at 60 p.s.i.

One - stoker to fire jacket heater having a capacity to burn coal at a maximum rate of 50 lbs. per hour. All necessary piping, valves and fittings as may be required to complete the installation.

5. Giddens and Sons were the contractors carrying out the plumbing and heating installation in the Classroom Block. They submitted a price for the work, which for reasons unknown to us, was not acted on by the Indian Affairs Branch.

6. After they had completed their contract and moved out, the local Indian Superintendent called for prices and the work was awarded to Carr and Son, whose tender was much lower than that of Giddens and Sons. After the work was awarded to Carr and Son, Father O'Grady discovered that they had tendered on equipment of insufficient capacity and not in accordance with the requirements suggested by our officer.

7. Father O'Grady's letter, a copy of which was attached to Major MacKay's memorandum, does not give sufficient detail for us to furnish complete comment. He states that the "Domestic hot water unit would then be of the same size as quoted on by H. Giddens Limited, which is the size required".

8. In order for us to recommend that the Carr and Son tender be accepted, it will be necessary to have Father O'Grady submit to us an itemized list of the equipment they propose to supply. This list should include the items mentioned in paragraph 4 of this memorandum. We would also be interested to know the contractor's price. Since this work is to be administered by the Indian Affairs Branch, no funds will be transferred to this Service.

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



MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

KAMLOOPS INDIAN RESIDENTIAL SCHOOL

Reference is made to Paragraph 8 of our memorandum of the 9th of June with regard to the domestic hot water facilities at the above.

2. Father O'Grady paid a visit to this office today and orally advised that he had presented a quotation to the Indian Affairs Branch covering the jacket heater. This data was in line with what we had requested.

3. Our original recommendation called for a cast iron jacket heater built for 75 p.s.i. and having a capacity to heat 500 gallons of water per hour through 100° rise. Since this type of heater is at present in short supply in the area, Father O'Grady was quoted on a steel type. The heater quoted on has somewhat more capacity than that specified and has equal or superior characteristics generally. The price of \$988.00 is not considered to be unreasonable.

4. Therefore, it is recommended that the Indian Affairs Branch consider the purchase and installation of this heater in lieu of that specified. Other items of equipment including the 1,000 gallon storage tank, 50 lb. per hour stoker and auxiliary items have already been paid for and are on the job according to Father O'Grady.

5. It would be appreciated if you would kindly forward this information to the Indian Affairs Branch for their further action.




