2. Form 61B is to be used for each individual owner and all details indicated thereon must be filled in completely, otherwise the forms will be returned and cause delay in reporting the test.
3. Indicate in column 4 (months of pregnancy):
 - (a) The duration of pregnancy, if known or
 - (b) If pregnant, but duration unknown, indicate by positive (+) or
 - (c) If not pregnant indicate by negative (-) sign and
 - (d) If freshening occurred recently (within one month) indicate with (F).
4. Vial numbers should be marked on both cork and label. With each shipment these numbers should commence at 1 and continue consecutively to the last vial number in that shipment, regardless of whether the samples in that particular shipment are taken from one or several herds and owners.
5. Identify all shipments (boxes, packages) by enclosing name of the owner and veterinarian in each.
6. Pack vials carefully but do not use bran, sawdust or other like substances.
7. Shipment by railway express is preferable.

Dear Sir:

I wish to refer to your radiograms dated September 30 and October 9, in connection with cattle for the Cecilia Jeffrey School, and to report as follows:

I selected first 8 cows and one registered bull. All were tested for tuberculosis and Bang's Disease. All passed the tuberculosis test, but two went down on the test for Bang's Disease. I wanted to purchase seven cows, so selected two more and again one went down on the Bang's Disease test. However, I now had seven cows and one bull, all having passed both tests.

Four cows are fresh and three will freshen shortly. They are all well bred Holstein cattle, and with care and feed should produce a good supply of milk.

In Manitoba we have only a few herds tested for Bang's Disease. The cattle in these herds are all pure bred, and none was for sale. I was, therefore, obliged to select cows from unfixed stock, test them, and take those passing the test. The cattle will be shipped by truck today.

I was fortunate in securing the seven cows and 1 registered bull for \$700.00, and as that is the amount held in trust here I will issue a cheque as payment in full to Mr. Diamond. The draying charges will be vouchered for as soon as the account is received.

I sincerely hope the cattle will prove satisfactory. Attached are the veterinary reports.

Dear Sir:

You will remember our conversation of some time ago,
when I spoke to you of our need for a larger herd of Dairy Cows.

The herd which you purchased for us last October has
indeed proved excellent. We have been able to hold production
close to 150 lbs. per day all through the winter and spring.
They all proved to be still free of T.B. when recently tested.
We have not as yet had them tested for Bang's disease.

Is it the desire of your Office that we also have
these tested for Bang's Disease.

Although the present herd is doing very well it con-
sists only of seven cows. They produce about 15 gallons per day
But we consume about 21 gallons per day. This means considerable
extra expense.

Since we have all necessary feed, all necessary labour,
sufficient stable space, we feel that we could just as easily
handle more cows. The overhead for a small herd is practically
as great as for a larger herd.

I believe that everything possible is being done to
prevent further occurrence of disease in the cattle.

In view of our needs, and ability to handle more cows,
I would respectfully ask that you take whatever steps are necessary
to purchase for us (or allow us to purchase ourselves) at least a
further seven cows. We would ask that we might have these for
September, when school reopens.

Enclosed is a copy of a letter received from Mr. D. S. Pitts, Principal of the Cecilia Jeffrey Residential School, Kenora, Ontario.

You will note that Mr. Pitts is well pleased with the stock already purchased for the school. I would draw your attention to the third paragraph of his letter, where he requests instruction as to re-testing his herd for Bang's Disease. Kindly advise if yearly tests are considered necessary.

Good milk cows will, I am sure, cost \$125.00 each, f.o.b. Kenora, so that 5 cows would cost at least \$625.00. In view of the interest taken in the stock by Mr. Pitts and the fact that he already has feed, a considerable amount having been left over from last year, I would recommend that the purchase be authorized if funds can be secured.

Dear Sir:

I have your letter of the 4th instant enclosing copy of letter received from the Principal of the Cecilia Jeffrey Residential School requesting the Department to purchase 5 cows. I note that you could secure these at a cost of \$125.00 each f.o.b. Kenora.

In the current year's appropriation an amount of \$800.00 was provided for repairs, improvements and purchase of new equipment at the Cecilia Jeffrey School. We have already purchased a new stove for this school at a cost of \$246.00 and in today's mail I have a request for paint which will probably cost \$185.00. This makes a total expenditure of \$431.00 and leaves a balance of \$369.00 still available. In a letter from Indian Agent Edwards he states that the mattresses are in very bad shape and will have to be replaced. I do not know yet just how many are required and what they will cost. However, if a large number of mattresses are necessary the amount of the present year's appropriation still unexpended will be exhausted. I doubt if we can provide funds for the number of cows suggested by the Principal but I feel we can secure the amount necessary to purchase two additional cows at the price mentioned in your letter. You may, therefore, arrange for their purchase and delivery to the school.

I believe the Principal should arrange for yearly tests for Bang's Disease.

I acknowledge your letter 129-3-14 dated July 8, regarding the purchase of cattle for the Cecilia Jeffrey Indian Residential School, Kenora, Ontario.

In view of the closing paragraph, might it not be advisable to make our test for Bang's Disease prior to enlarging the herd, as one never knows what results might be obtained.

OK
I would also suggest, provided we find no reactors, that Mr. Pitts be allowed to purchase the two cows locally, subject to all tests. I am doing this because transportation on two head from Winnipeg to Kenora will, no doubt, be quite high. The last shipment was made by truck and was a full load, and thus shipping charges were kept at a minimum.

Kindly advise if my suggestions meet with your approval. If it is not possible to secure suitable cows near Kenora, it will then be necessary to purchase in Winnipeg.

I would refer to Departmental letter dated July 17, 1941, File 129-3-14, regarding cows for the Cecilia Jeffrey Indian School, Kenora.

Mr. Pitts, in a letter just received, states that the herd purchased last year has passed the Bang's Disease test with no reactors.

Suitable cows, tested for Bang's Disease, can be purchased at Kenora. I saw these cows and consider them a good buy. There are 3 registered Holsteins and one grade, together with one heifer calf eligible for registration. The price of these is \$400.00. Mr. Pitts can raise \$100.00. Will the Department supply \$300.00, which is only \$50.00 more than the amount already authorized? The cows are reasonably priced and should pretty well supply the school's needs.

The cattle purchased last year have received good care. There are 3 nice heifers which undoubtedly will make high grade cows. I trust consideration can be granted for this increased expenditure. Mr. Pitts assures me he has plenty of feed.

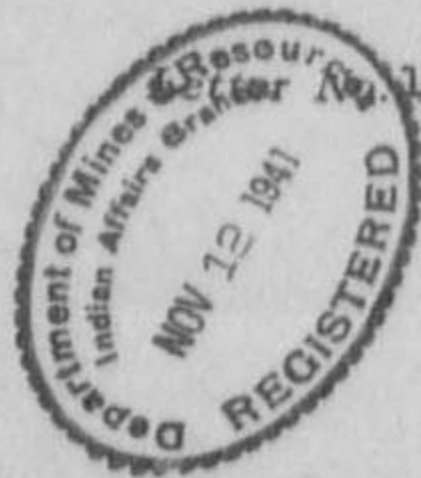

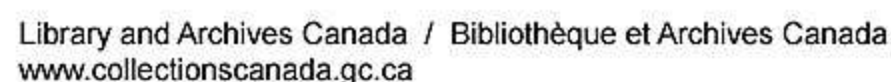

RE: HERD SIRE.

Following our recent conversation Re above noted, I wish to present the following information.

About the end of last June, we found it necessary to kill our Pedigree Bull for the following reasons:- (a) he was over two years as herd sire and was therefore approaching the time when his calves (heifers) needed to be bred. (b) he was becoming very dangerous.

While visiting in Ottawa in July, I mentioned that we were considering Artificial Insemination. The Department officials were quite interested. However after considerable delay in answering our correspondence at Guelph, (O.A.C.) we find that the Artificial method is doubtful in results.

Therefore, we are in need of a new Bull.

Further, in Consultation with Mr. Watt, who is with the Health of Animals Division, we have found that since we have a listed herd, (free of both T.B. and Bang's Disease) we may only bring a Bull from a listed herd into our herd. There is only one listed herd in Manitoba--Holsteins.

While in the East early in February, I found that Mr. Geo. F. Drennan, 15 College Ave., Guelph, fieldman for the Holstein Association, or Mr. Lorne Brubaker, 67 Weber St., Kitchener, Ont. would both be able to secure such animals. Also Mr. Ted Townsend, of Rockwood Holsteins, St. Norbert Man. might have some information re purchase in the West.

We wonder if the Department would assist in the purchase of this animal, since they appear anxious that we maintain our listing. We should need an animal, Registered, Listed negative, and ready for immediate service.
