




Action taken On arrived at farm, superintendent, the Rev. Mr. Lett, informed me that the hogs took sick about Nov. 1st, there being about 70 hogs on the premises at that time.

The sickness was confined to the small hogs of about 2 months old. Dr. T.H. Jagger of Vancouver came to the farm on Nov. 18th and up to that time 6 had died, and he suggested lack of sodium content in the food. This was added to the food but the hogs still died. On Nov. 25th internal organs of one dead pig were sent to Dr. Bruce, Pathologist at Saanich. He diagnosed the case as haemorrhagic septicaemia, and in a few days Dr. Jagger came and inoculated the hogs with haemorrhagic septicaemia aggressin. On December 2nd notwithstanding

8 more had died, and on my visit to the premises there were 5 more sick. The hogs were well bred Berkshires. All the symptoms I could find were stiffness in the legs, and pain if almost any part of the body was touched. There was no patches on the body, no discharge from the eyes, no cough and no diarrhea, in fact the stool was normal, though in one hog I thought there was constipation. They had a normal appetite.

The hogs were fed on garbage from the institution, mixed with shorts. The garbage was well cooked. The older fat hogs, the boar and sows, which have all been quite well, (except one sow that Mr. Lett said died a month ago, but in a different manner, this one seemed to get gradually got thinner and weaker, he thinks from some obscure cause) have been, and are now fed on garbage alone, without any shorts. There have been no hogs purchased or brought on to the premises for three years. The farm is quite isolated on the Thomson River, 4 miles from Lytton, and no garbage is brought on to the farm. There are 140 Indian children in residence on the premises, with teachers, attendants, etc.

The hog pen is fairly clean, the pens have concrete floors, with not enough bedding in my opinion. I found no evidence or symptoms of hog cholera, and evidently from the non-success of the agressin, the trouble is not haemorrhagic septicaemia, and as the sickness is confined to the small hogs I came to the conclusion that the trouble was of a dietary nature, caused by some irritant in the garbage, but not violent enough to affect the mature hogs. I went to the kitchen of the institution

with Mr. Lett, and interviewed the cooks, but could not find the particular irritant. Finally I suggested that they take 6 of the little pigs that are now well, put them in a pen by themselves and feed them on shorts and skim milk only for a month, and if none of these take sick, I thought it would be a fair inference that the cause of sickness was in the garbage.

As I was also conducting the annual Accredited herd test of the dairy cattle I had to return to the premises 4 days later, and on that date I was informed that no hogs had died while I had been away, and in fact I thought the sick ones looked better. I also requested that they put more bedding in the pens, and as the weather was very mild for this time of the year, the pens seemed damper than they should be, and the trouble might be caused by that. The mature hogs were still all well.

Dear Sir,-

I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 21st February, fyle 165-0-14, and I regret to find that a copy of our officer's report concerning an investigation of sickness in hogs on the premises of the St George's Indian Residential School, Lytton, B C., was not forwarded to you.

I have had a copy made, and enclose it herewith, and in this regard would say that I do not consider the inspector was justified in coming to a conclusion that the diagnosis made by the Pathologist of haemorrhagic septicaemia was not correct.

There is no question that the organism producing that disease was isolated by Dr Bruce, as, otherwise, he would not have come to that conclusion. I may say, however, that it is not unusual to find that organism in the tissues of our domestic animals even though the disease may not be present. This is due to the fact that this particular organism only becomes disease producing under certain definite conditions.

Dear Sir,

I have your letter of the 31st ult.
together with a copy of Dr. Jagger's letter to you.

I am asking the Animal Husbandry Division
to write to you at greater length as to our experience
in cleaning up this disease on Experimental Farm
herds over all Canada. I, however, wish to make this
statement that I fully appreciate your difficulty and
your lack of desire to do away with your reacting cows,
especially if these are amongst your heaviest producers,
yet at the same time I fully appreciate your concern
regarding the feeding of this milk from infected cows
to the children in your school. This latter difficulty
however, seems to me could be readily overcome by
pasteurization, but the future of your herd is going
to depend largely on your effectiveness in isolating
reactors and maintaining a negative herd as a non-
reacting unit.

Your letter of January 31, together with copy of one from Dr. Jagger, has been referred to us by Dr. Archibald.

In this connection, I would say that we have had wonderful results in our herds from the application of the blood test for the eradication of contagious abortion. Starting in 1928, we put all of our herds on this test and in those herds where there were only a few reactors, we disposed of them at once. In three or four herds, we segregated reacting animals and saved the calves from these to put into the negative herd. We kept this up for three or four years in some cases until the herds were properly built up again but in 1933 we disposed of the last of our reacting animals and now have abortion-free herds on all of our farms.

Much of the credit for this work must be given to the Health of Animals Branch of the Department of Agriculture, with which Branch we had the heartiest cooperation in this work. They have recently issued a publication on abortion in cattle covering this system of eradication of disease and offering a service similar to that which they have given us to the rank and file of breeders in the country, provided they are prepared to carry out certain conditions and regulations. I am asking the Animal Diseases Research Institute of the Health of Animals Branch to forward you a copy of this bulletin and I think you will find many of your questions answered therein and I would suggest that you take advantage of their offer and put your herd under their supervision.

As you will note, the blood samples will be taken by your local practicing veterinarian and in your case they would be forwarded to Dr. Bruce at the Animal Pathological Laboratory, Saanichton, B.C., for examination and report.





I have, therefore, procured a few hundred pounds of ground limestone which is being fed, and has completely changed our dituation in regard to the hog pen. I have reported this change to the Health of Animals Branch and I feel this disease has now been eliminated.

Dear Mr. Strang:-

Regarding the barn situation here and the reports which I have received from the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa. The Department of Agriculture stipulates the dividing of the herd as a necessary method of dealing with the disease prevalent. We are unable to do this having no second barn on the school farm, nor any means of dividing the pasturage.

We are however, with what isolation available, making the best of the situation, keeping our calves away from the main herd and will if possible, isolate these in the pasture.

We are also butchering wherever possible and note that the Department calls for a quarterly blood test of those cattle not affected. I shall, therefore, ask Dr. Jagger to make these tests as he is the most capable veterinary to whom we have access. We have still six cows reacting to the test and shall exercise every care to keep them away from the remainder of the herd and also in so far as it is possible, keep the milk supply from these cows out of the school.



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



Dear Mr. Strang:-

Regarding the condition of our herd we have had one clean test and another one due on the first of next month and I am hoping that this also will be clean. We shall then be able to dispense with the regular services of Dr. Jagger. We still have three cows who are reacting but they are in complete isolation and just as soon as they drop their calves we shall dry and butcher, so that with no further outbreaks and with careful isolation from Indian herds we should be able to run free. I might mention in passing that this abortion trouble is very prevalent in the Fraser Valley and it might be well for the Department to take steps to have other school herds tested for abortion.



Sir:

The Department is in receipt of your voucher No. 354 T in favour of T. H. Jagger, V.S., for professional services for the dairy herd at the St. George's Indian Residential School. It is noted that on the last test all animals with the exception of one were negative. It is also noted that Dr. Jagger considers it advisable to test the herd again in about three months' time.

The Department understands from the above that the Veterinary Surgeon will only find it necessary to visit the herd once during the next three months. This will mean that he will only charge for one visit.
