RE: OLD SUN SCHOOL

Dear Sir:-

The matter of placing the pupils of this Institution in school must be considered now. A suggestion has come from the M.S.C.C. that Anglican schools at Cardston, Brocket and Elkhorn are in a position to accept a large proportion of the pupils for such time as there is no school on this Reserve. This would be an excellent move, I believe, provided the parents give their full consent.

I have asked some of them and find that the younger people have no objections and rather favour the idea, whereas the older people are opposed. If the Department favoured the plan, I would be in a position to interview the parents at Treaty which is being paid on August 7 & 8th.

As an alternative, I suggest that the M.S.C.C. operate two Day-Schools here. At Gleichen, the Church would be used and Mr. Gibney says that he could teach the pupils who would attend this school. At the West end of the Reserve, known as Farm 3 area, the Church has a building which could readily be made into a school. In talking this over with Mr. Gibney, he states that Miss Hauver, Senior teacher would be glad to teach them and would live with Mrs. Geo Crane Bear (Nina Stonechild). The building is centrally located and would accommodate 30 to 40 pupils. The cost of equipping it and making it fit for use would not be great.

It would be appreciated if the Department would give me instructions in regard to this matter at an early date.



Sir:

I beg to submit the following report for the month of July 1928.

Regarding the pupils at Old Sun's it is hoped that the Department can suggest some way to get them into school for the coming school year. If the children are not sent to schools on other reserves I would suggest that two day schools be operated here. The Church at the school site could be used for pupils in the Gleichen area and a Mission building at the West end of the reserve could be used for pupils in that area. I believe this latter place would receive good attendance. The building is central and the parents for the most part are ex-pupils of Old Sun's.

Sir,

Re. yours of the 9th inst. file 104-1-1
the parents of children attending Old Sun School are
not willing to have them enrolled temporarily in the
St Cyprian and St Pauls schools.

Rev. Mr Gibney and I have individually
made enquiries and only two parents stated that they
were willing to send their children away. I stressed
the many advantages to the children, but to no avail.

The Chiefs interviewed me on the 13th
inst. and asked that the Department supply temporary
quarters on the reserve; they stated that the Band was
prepared to pay from their funds at Ottawa any expen-
ses necessary to working these temporary quarters.

Furthermore that if day schools were
established as I suggested in my letter of 27th ultimo
that they were prepared to pay for the transportation
of pupils to and from school each day, from the Band
Funds. They are familiar with this method as there is
a consolidated school at Arrowwood.

I believe this is the solution for
the existing school year and would recommend that
steps be taken, in conjunction with the M.S.C.C. to
carry it into effect.

Reverend Sir:

I wish to refer to your letter of July 4th and other correspondence, relative to the pupils at the Old Sun's Indian Residential School. Mr. Indian Agent Gooderham reports that Rev. Mr. Gibney and he have individually made enquiries, and only two parents stated they were willing to send their children to either the St. Cyprian or St. Paul's Indian Residential School. Our agent writes that he stressed the many advantages to the children, but, to no avail. The chiefs of the band have repeatedly urged the Department to conduct two temporary day schools on the reserve, and the Deputy Superintendent General has approved of the proposal. I am enclosing, for your information and guidance, a copy of my letter of today's date to Mr. Agent Gooderham.

You will note that Rev. Mr. Gibney and Miss Hauver will teach the two temporary day schools. For this service, they will be allowed salary as day school teachers. I should like to have a statement from you as to the cost of operating the residential school farm, caring for the stock, etc. I have to urge that no unnecessary expense be undertaken and that the interim costs until a new residential school is ready for occupancy be kept as low as possible.

Sir:

I have your B/12 of the 15th ultimo, with further reference to temporary day schools on the Blackfoot Reserve. The Department has given favourable consideration to your proposal in connection with the pupils at the Old Sun's Residential School, and I have to authorize you to arrange for two temporary day schools - one in the church at Gleichen and the other in a church building at the west end of the reserve. Rev. Mr. Gibney and Miss Hauver may be engaged to do the teaching. I note that the cost of preparation and equipping will not be great. If desks and blackboards are required, please make immediate requisition. Would it be possible to get along without regular school desks for the time being?

You may also ascertain what arrangement you could make for transporting the children to and from school each day. When your report in this connection is to hand, the Department will give it consideration. The funds necessary for these temporary day schools will not be taken from Band Funds, as it is the Department's practice to pay all educational costs from Parliamentary Appropriation. A copy of this letter is being directed to Dr. Westgate, of Winnipeg.

GENERAL REMARKS
(Under this heading give your opinion on the condition of the school in regard to management, progress, etc., and any matters of interest regarding the school)

Following Departmental instructions preparations were made to open two day-schools for Protestant children. An Anglican Mission at the West end of the Reserve was put in repair by boarding it up on the outside and removing a partition inside and building in long board desks. Benches and a few chairs will be used to seat the pupils and the capacity will be 35. The school supplied most of the material and a competent carpenter did the work. It was necessary to purchase a stove to heat the building. At Gleichen, long board desks were built into the pews of the church, and both schools were ready for October First. For some reason known only to the M.S.C.C. officials, Miss Hauver, the teacher for the West end school, did not arrive and on enquiry, I am informed that she will arrive in time to open on the 15th October. She will live in a good 4 roomed house near the school and a matron from Old Sun's will live with her. Mr Gibney has laid plans to give the pupils a hot mid-day meal at both schools. In this, he is getting our co-operation. Although the arrangements are of a temporary nature, the schools should be quite satisfactory and a good place for the children throughout the present school year. The Indians are interested and I expect their co-operation except in the extreme cold winter days. Both schools will open next week.

Sir:

I have today had a discussion with the Field Secretary of the M. S. C. C., concerning the financing of the two temporary day schools on the Blackfoot reserve. I explained that the Department would be responsible for the legitimate expenditure at these schools and that all accounts should be submitted to your office and forwarded to Ottawa for payment. Teachers' salaries will be paid upon receipt of day school quarterly returns. Food that is required for the noonday lunch, expenditure in connection with fixing up the classrooms, fuel, any transportation of children necessary, etc., should all be the subject of vouchers directed to Ottawa by your office. Any church expenditure should be limited to missionary activity and to the looking after of the property at the Old Sun site. Concerning this year's expenditure at the old residential school property, the Department will make arrangements with the church authorities. The Department considers that the parents should be responsible for the clothing of the children while they are living at home and whatever transportation they can provide.

I may say that salary will be allowed to the Rev. Mr. Gibney and Miss Hauver at the rates of \$80 and \$45 per teaching month, respectively. They should make arrangements for their living expenses with the M. S. C. C.

I am enclosing an extra copy of this letter to you, so that you can hand it to Mr. Gibney.

Dear Sir:-

Last summer when the Deputy Superintendent General visited Winnipeg, he presented to me a verbal request that the Acting Principals of the Old Sun, and the St. Cyprian Schools, as well as the Farm Instructor at the latter institution, should be replaced by more energetic and competent men. During my visit to your Department last month, further reference was made to this matter in my interview with the Superintendent of Indian Education, and I undertook to submit it to our Indian Residential Schools' Commission for their consideration. The Commission met on the 6th instant, and after carefully canvassing the whole situation, instructed me to inform you that, in their opinion, drastic action, of the nature contemplated, should rest on a written statement, embodying specific reasons for the same, and not merely on a verbal request. If, therefore, you will kindly furnish me with the statement suggested, I will submit it to the Commission at their next meeting. In making this request the Commission desired me to inform you of some of the major considerations which influenced them in connection with the same. Two of these were as follows:-

1. Their anxiety that no injustice or any appearance of such, should be done to any of the parties concerned, and
2. The necessity which is laid upon them themselves by the constitution setting forth their duties of submitting to the Society's Executive Committee, all matters relating to the appointment, transfer or dismissal of Principals.

They would assure you of their hearty desire to conform to the wishes and instructions of your Department at all times, but would like to feel well assured before final and drastic action is taken in a matter of such great moment, as the one in

Dear Sir:-

During my recent visit to the Blackfoot Reserve, the Teachers of the temporary Day Schools who were members of the staff of the Old Sun School before it was destroyed by fire, desired to know if your Department would be responsible for their salary allowances during the two months holiday period. They directed my attention to your letter of Oct. 18th in which you stated that your Department would be responsible for the Teachers salaries for the 10 months of the teaching year. As the new building to replace the Old Sun School is not likely to be ready for occupation when the 10 months have elapsed, the Teachers and Miss Robson who is living with Miss Hauver who is in charge of the School at the West end of the reserve are naturally anxious to know whether they will receive any salary allowance for their holiday period or not. I undertook to ascertain this information from your Department, and will be obliged if you will furnish me with your decision in connection with the same. It seems to me that the 3 agents concerned, namely, Mr. Gibney, Miss Hauver and Miss Robson are deserving of every consideration which can be shown to them, as they are discharging a duty of the highest value and under exceptionally trying circumstances. It would be a comfort and an encouragement to them to know that their salary allowances would be provided for the two months in question, and I trust that this action may be taken by your Department.

This temporary day school is conducted as well as Mr. Gibney can but I hope it will not be long before a residential school is erected. The pupils come irregularly and when they come from a distance, often do not arrive until late forenoon. Advancement in class-work is slow under ideal conditions but is negligible under temporary arrangements.

A splendid mid-day meal is served but this is possible only as long as the threshing cook-car is available.

=====

OLD SUN'S WEST END DAY:

This temporary day school is not so bad. The building is used only for school work and is centrally located in a farming district. Good progress in school work is not possible as so many children attend irregularly despite our endeavours and inducements. Grades 1 to 4 are taught and most pupils are in the first three. The teacher and the Matron do their best with class work and mid-day meals. I feel, however, that the temporary arrangement should be replaced by the permanent school as early as possible.

The main building of the Old Sun Indian Residential School was destroyed by fire in June, 1928. The Indian Band, wishing to expedite replacement, petitioned the Department to take from its funds whatever was necessary to proceed with a new building at an early date. For the current fiscal year, Parliament provided \$40,000.00 towards the replacement. There will be expended this year at least \$120,000.00 for the purpose, and I wish to secure an Order in Council approving of a transfer of \$80,000.00 from the funds of the Blackfoot Band (Interest Account) to Indian Education 1929--30 Vote No. 226. The interest to the credit of the Blackfoot Band at the present time is \$880,474.79.

This loan will be repaid from the Appropriation for Indian Education during the next two fiscal years.

The Committee of the Privy Council have had before them a report, dated 18th January, 1930, from the Superintendent General of Indian Affairs, submitting that the main building of the Old Sun Indian Residential School on the Blackfoot Indian Reserve, in the Province of Alberta, was destroyed by fire in June, 1928. The Blackfoot Indian Band, wishing to expedite replacement, petitioned the department to take from its funds whatever was necessary to proceed with a new building at an early date. For the current fiscal year, Parliament provided \$40,000 towards the replacement.

As the amount required, however, is \$120,000, the Minister recommends that authority be granted for an expenditure of \$80,000 from the interest funds of the said Blackfoot Band, which now amount to \$880,474.79, under section 93 of the Indian Act.

The Minister states that it is proposed that this amount should be refunded to the band within the next two fiscal years in conformity with the department's policy that all cost of Indian education should be defrayed from public funds.

The Committee concur in the foregoing recommendation and submit the same for approval.



The new Old Sun's School is fast nearing completion. This is a wonderful building, and when completed will, in my opinion, be the finest Indian school I was ever in. I do not think for one minute that the present Principal is the man to take charge of an institution of this kind. He has been there for some time now and has never been satisfactory. The farming and gardening activities at the school have never been properly carried on under his management, and to put a man of this type in to take charge of this splendid new school would not be right. I am not alone in this opinion, all our officers who visit the reserve will agree that he is not the man for the position. If the Department agree it might be well to take the matter up with the proper authorities.

In view of the fact that the total population on the Reserve is very small, about sixty I believe, this combination should be both workable and satisfactory.
