Dear Mr. Scott-;

Re The possible numbers we would be able to secure for the New School. I am confident I should be able in the two agencies Lytton & Kamloops, -without taking into consideration the north where we should be able to recruit a number, one hundred & fifty children. I have talked this matter over with Mr. Indian Agent Graham & he is of the same opinion regarding the above mentioned Agencies. Mr. Inspector Cairns in stating his opinion said that the building should be built to accomodate two hundred. I am writing Mr. Cairns & will ask him to give you his viewpoint.

Accomodation for the following members of staff would have to be provided-

- Three Teachers possibly four
- Five Matrons
- Caretaker & Farm hand

It would be well to take into consideration two or three extra rooms for additional staff if circumstances arose warranting same. These rooms would have to be placed in positions where supervision could be easily given. The numbers would be divided about evenly between boys & girls.



Gentlemen:

I am at present preparing a plan for an Indian Residential School in B. C. and it will require for lighting purposes, and 8 K.W. Generator. I am enclosing, herewith, a rough sketch of the basement plan of the rear portion of the building, showing the location of the room proposed to be used for the electric lighting plant.

I would be very grateful if you would furnish me with a layout of your automatic plant. If the room as shown, is not large enough, I can arrange my plan to meet the size required.

I would also be glad to have your suggestions as to the best type of installation and whether you consider it more satisfactory to operate the laundry machinery by means of motor, or by a line-shaft operated from the gasoline engine used with the generator. The laundry machinery required approximately, three horse power when all machines are at work.

Please also attach a full specification of the plant.

Dear Sirs,-

ATTENTION OF MR. J. R. DAY.

I received your letter of the 12th instant this morning and am obliged for the information it contained. I note that you recommend two plants, one a three K. W. and one six K. W., both automatic.

I am enclosing herewith a blue print copy of the basement of the building, and you will note that I have left unfinished on my tracing the portion to be occupied by the electric lighting plant, and I can, therefore, arrange it to the size required. I may say that I believe that the only way to get the best results is by close co-operation with the manufacturers of the equipment used. I would be grateful if you would mark to a scale on the enclosed blue print, and return it to me, all of the equipment required, including the generators, switch board, tanks, etc. I would like this information as accurate as possible, in order that I can plot same on my tracings.

I agree with you that it is much better to operate the laundry machinery direct from the engine and not by means of motors. You might also indicate in the room to be used for the lighting plant the best location for the windows, also if you wish any ventilation installed.

You will note that I have outlined this room in pencil 20 x14. If possible to make it smaller it would be advisable, but I do not wish to cramp the machinery. There will be no pump required in this school, and this room will be used entirely to house the electric lighting equipment. I would also be obliged if you would furnish me with a full detailed specification for the entire lighting plant, in order that I may include same in my specification for the building.

You will notice by the blue print that it is intended to construct only a portion of the building this year, and the three K. W. generator will be more than ample to provide all the lighting required. I wish, however, to show and include both generators complete, but I will make a note in my specifications that only the three K. W. generator is to be installed at the present time.

Dear Sir:-

We have your esteemed letter to hand of the 5th, with a rough plan attached for an Indian Residential School in B.C. stating that your building will require an 8K.W. plant. We believe, in buildings that would require a plant of this size that the parallel lighting equipment which we supplied for Cardston and Edmonton, is the best thing which we can offer you as these plants are working out very satisfactory.

A detailed description of these plants, we believe, might be in order and might say they consist of the following:-

Two plants, one a 3K.W. and one a 6K.W. both automatic in starting and stopping, working as follows:-

When the small lighting load first comes on the 3K.W. plant starts up and carries the load up to 90% of its capacity. At this point the 6K.W. plant starts up and takes over the load and the 3K.W. stops when the 6K.W. plant has reached full load. The 3K.W. starts up again and they both work in parallel, carrying their load to the maximum limit. When the load is decreased to the point where the 6K.W. can handle it, the 3K.W. stops and when the load is further reduced to the point where the 3K.W. can handle it, it starts up and takes over the load, allowing the 6K.W. to stop and it continues to carry the load until it is reduced to minimum when it also stops. This feature is very economical as the small plant only runs a large portion of the time.

Further automatic features is incorporated in this system, that if at any time the small plant ceases to function, the larger one automatically starts and takes over the load, thereby safe-guarding the batteries.

This plant is equipped with a battery of 54 cells of 85 A.H. capacity on the 8 hour rating which is of adequate size to carry the required number of lights up to a point where it will be more economical for the plant to start up and take over the load.

We wish to point out that these features are absolutely automatic, requiring no manual attention in transferring the load from one plant to the other in any way. All the attendant has to do is to look after his lubricating oil, fuel and cooling water.

You ask what our recommendation is in the driving of a Laundry and might say we will not consider putting our plants up against a motor driven load for this work. We have found in every instance where we have done your work that the handling of a laundry machine is in the hand of inexperienced persons and if an electric motor were used for this work there would be times when the motor would be driven off the battery instead of having the plant running to supply the necessary current. This discharge for a 3H.P. motor taken from the battery until the plants got started, would eventually ruin the battery and on every laundry drive which we have hooked our engines up to, 3H.P. has not been adequate to drive them.

We might say the Edmonton Laundry, when in operation, takes from 5 to 5½H.P. Our other reason for preferring mechanical drive from the engine is that when the laundry is running, the engine can be used at the same time to give the required overcharge to the battery, thereby doing both these jobs at one time and safe-guarding your battery instead of taking the discharge from it.


We have been handicapped on the most of our jobs by making our machines fit the room and the line shaft drive and the opportunity which you are now giving us to place our space requirements before you is very acceptable. In the engine room shown on the plan which you sent us a line shaft will be running parallel with the long way of the laundry and will be running parallel with the short way of the engine room. This means that we have to place our plants then one behind the other which makes a more expensive installation and consequently is more costly to the department as it takes more piping and fittings, etc. If the engine room were placed the long way the same as the laundry, then our plants would be put end to end, making a cheaper method of installation and a belt would go from the pulley on the engine straight up to the pulley on the line shaft, instead of on the slant, thereby obstructing the movements of the operator around the machine. To make this a little clearer, we are making a drawing showing what we consider an ideal arrangement for this type of plant. However, on the other hand this might not suit your building requirements and we want to co-operate with you making any alterations which you would prefer and any suggestions we can offer we will be glad to do so and trust to hear from you further in reference to this. The dimensions of the engine room especially if a pump is to be located in the engine room requires to be 20 feet long by 14 or 15 feet wide.

Sir,-

The Department is contemplating the building of a new Indian Residential School at Iyton, B. C. to accommodate approximately 150 children. It is proposed to make a commencement this year by erecting a portion of the building. I would greatly appreciate it if you would instruct one of your officers in this locality to visit the site of the proposed new building, and furnish me with a report and plan for a septic tank and drainage system.


Regarding the water supply system for the building there is located to the rear of the proposed site, at a considerable elevation, a running spring, and it is proposed to use the water from this spring to supply the building. Two years ago when we were erecting a new barn at this point a six inch pipe was laid from the spring to the barn, and it is thought that this pipe can be tapped in order to provide water for the building. It will be necessary to construct a concrete reservoir at the source of supply, and I would be glad if your engineer would furnish a plan of the reservoir, and advise me the elevation of the spring above the level of the building site.

The principal of the Iyton School is the Rev. Mr. Lett, and he will be glad to co-operate with your officers in giving them any information that will assist them. There is an old school at this point at present. I am enclosing herewith a blue print of the basement plan of the building intended to be erected this year, and also a rough sketch showing the size of the building. It would be of great assistance if your officer would include a block plan showing the location of the proposed building, the existing barn and the spring, septic tank, etc.

As it is the intention of the Department to invite tenders early in the spring, I will be glad to have this information at your earliest convenience.


