Dear Doctor Stone:

I am enclosing herewith a report on the inspection of Mount Elgin Residential School pupils and those of the Day school pupils at this Agency, conducted by Miss Murdoch and myself.

While there is no increase in Trachoma at Mount Elgin definitely established, the increased number of suspects will likely bring up our total when confirmed by Dr. Wall. Of the new cases I have to report that some of them are new pupils who have brought the disease in with them from their respective reserves. I note that most of our defective children are senior pupils on the school roll, just why, I am not prepared to state.

Rev. O.B. Strapp is quite anxious that the impaired vision found among his pupils, (and which he has mentioned several times before inspection), be attended to, and I suspect that several of the girls at least have feigned impairment in the test, under the impression that glasses will improve their appearance, which is not original on their part.

In connection with my report I would recommend;

1. Services of a dentist for six days at Mount Elgin Residential School and for four days for the pupils of Day Schools or any portion thereof as funds permit. Dr. Ackland of Mount Brydges has done excellent work in past years and is available this year.
2. Permission for extraction of tonsils of eight day school and fifteen residential school pupils. This can be carried out periodically during slack hospital months if preferred.
3. Refraction and glasses if necessary for six day school pupils and fifteen residential school pupils at an estimate by Dr. Babb if done in numbers at \$6 per pupils including glasses.
4. A visit by Dr. J.J. Wall to check my diagnosis and treatment of Trachoma.

Dear Sir,-

I have your letter of March 19th, with recommendations regarding attention required by school pupils. You may arrange for a four-day dental clinic at the Mount Elgin Residential School at the earliest possible date. Accounts will be received up to April 10th, but must be dated March in order to be paid from funds available for the present fiscal year. The rate should be \$30 per day, and I presume you will be able to assign Miss Murdoch for duty at the school if this is desired.

You may also arrange immediately for any absolutely necessary tonsil operations for pupils of the Residential School. This also should be attended to during the month of March, if possible.

I note that Doctor Babb gives an estimate of \$6 per pupil for examination and glasses, and you may arrange to have the fifteen Residential School pupils examined and fitted with glasses if necessary.

I realize that there is not a great deal of time left during the present fiscal year, but it will be appreciated if you will arrange to have as much work as possible done at this time for the Residential School pupils. It is necessary to leave work for the day school pupils until a later date.

Doctor Wall may possibly be at Muncey when you receive this. If not he will arrive there very soon.

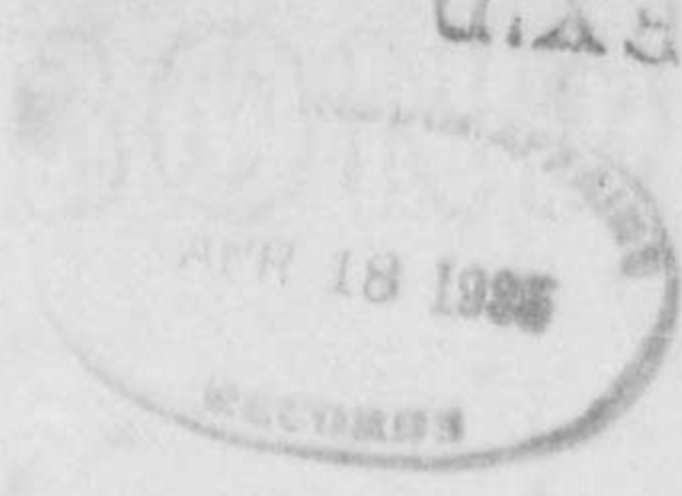

Dear Doctor Stone;

I am enclosing my monthly report for June. As you will note we have Measles and Whooping Cough at the Agency, and the situation compares very favorably with the surrounding townships. I regret to report that there are two cases of Measles at Mount Elgin Residential School detected July 7th. They are under strict isolation, and I have also arranged for isolation of any suspects. This will interfere with the usual closing of school for vacation, and I will hold all pupils as contacts until the legal quarantine has expired. There are several who had Measles while at the school three years ago, of which we have record, and these will be discharged when school vacation commences.

Rev. O.B. Strapp, Principal of the school, is I believe sending a wire to the Department regarding the proposed hospital room and its urgency. At present the school is quite capable of handling the cases, but if it assumes epidemic proportion there will be need of hospital accommodation in the building. I have always felt the need of this improvement at Mount Elgin, and trust that it will be soon constructed, but in passing might report that there is no cause for alarm which might be inferred from the wire from the principal.

I was absent on three days' leave, and in addition to a host of calls awaiting my return there will be accounts from district doctors called in by Mr. Moore as instructed by the Secretary.

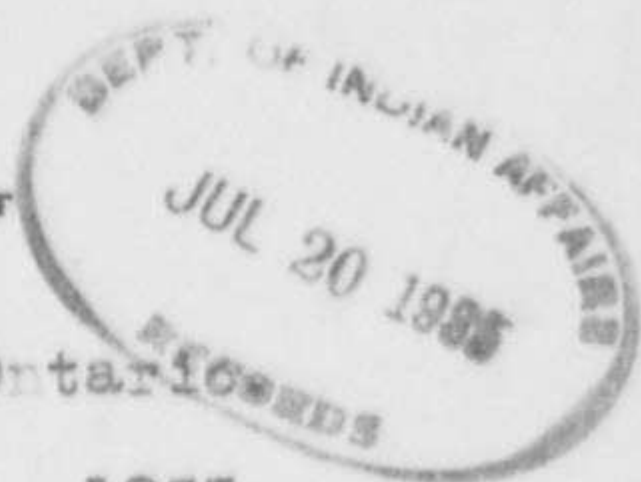

Dear Doctor Stone;

With further reference to the Measles situation, I believe that you will be interested in a report on Mount Elgin Residential School. I am happy to state that there has been no increase from the original two cases reported last week.

Immediately upon making the diagnosis July 7th, complete isolation of these two cases, both girls, was effected on the third floor attic. There was no doubt of the diagnosis, a text book rash being present. One other female suspect was isolated, and three boys, the latter on the attic of the boys' side of the building. These boys have shown no further symptoms other than the initial fever and sore throat, one now presenting an Ulcerative Stomatitis which is responding to treatment.

The Measles cases are convalescing and out of bed. The quarantine period for them has elapsed but they are still in isolation, partly in deference to Mr. Strapp, but mainly due to the fact that they can be discharged from the school on July 17th for vacation, and I fear to tempt Lady Luck who has been so good in this problem to date.

We have a record of approximately forty pupils who were down with Measles at the school in 1933. These I intend to release to their homes on July 17th school closing day. The remainder, providing that there are no new cases in the interim, will be released on July 23rd, which is the expiration of the sixteen day quarantine period for contacts, as prescribed by the provincial statutes, which are being followed throughout including release of immunes. I feel that my action will be approved, but if there is any change needed, in your opinion, I will be pleased to follow it. I did consider immunization of the pupils by injection of whole blood from a convalescent patient, as recommended by the Department of Health, but with the venereal situation as is here, I felt that it was risky to start pumping blood indiscriminately into school pupils. The doctor has to obtain the blood himself, as it is not supplied by the Department of Health.

When I reported Measles at Mount Elgin School, last week, I was aware that a telegram regarding the need of a hospital there was being drafted to the Department, although I had no hand in it. Between ourselves, the principal considered that the outbreak would be an excellent lever to expedite preparation of the hospital which he had long anticipated. In all fairness to him, I believe that he was concerned over an epidemic, which to his delight, and I rather suspect somewhat to his chagrin did not materialize. Frankly, there was no great cause for alarm, and had there been an epidemic the housing of the sick would not have permitted the necessary alterations, and presence of workmen. I am in favour of and have recommended the hospital accommodation, but feel that it can be constructed when there is a minimum of sick. I have had the fullest cooperation of the school staff in dealing with the Measles, and attribute much to the nurse in holding down our figures.

We have considerable Measles on the Chippewa Reserve but it is on the wane. Whooping Cough is present on all three reserves, and it is a very disagreeable condition to handle as you know. It is difficult to convince the natives that time must elapse for the cough to subside. I have obtained some very good results by the use of Pertussis serum as a prophylactic in contacts but note no difference with the treatment of positive cases.

I feel that you will be interested in the Mount Elgin report in view of the anxiety of certain parties expressed a few days ago.

Dear Doctor Stone;

I have to report that there is an outbreak of German Measles, at Mount Elgin Residential School, and to date there have been 42 cases. The symptoms have been very mild being mainly cervical and occipital adenitis, sore throat, conjunctivitis, a slight fever, in no case exceeding 100 degrees, accompanied by rash of varying intensity. The first cases were put down to overeating of fruit on the part of the pupils, and it was only when the numbers increased that my attention was called to the afflicted, some of whom had not taken to bed or reported their illness to the staff.

The average duration of indisposition on the part of the children has been two days, and recovery has been exceptionally rapid. I detected one case on the Chippewa Reserve today, and the young daughter of the Mounted Police Constable here has just recovered from a similar attack. With the co-operation of the Institute staff I have instituted such quarantine measures as are feasible under the sudden onset of the outbreak. I feel that this epidemic will likely sweep through the school and reserves, but it is of such mild character that there is no cause for alarm.

I am informed that this disease has been prevalent, and undiagnosed in the vicinity of Shedden, eight miles from here. Several of those pupils who suffered severe attacks of typical Measles last summer at the Residential School, including two who had the hemorrhagic type have been down and subsequently recovered from this latest illness.
